MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 3, 2016**

Interim Recreation and Community Services Director Randy Davis called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

A. ROLL CALL

Present: Chairman Angel Borja, Vice-chair John Pierce, Commissioner Tom Conley, Commissioner Jan Davenport

B. PUBLIC COMMENT None

C. PRESENTATIONS, ANNOUNCEMENTS, AND APPOINTMENTS

Jeff Penrod, Public Works Superintendent: Mr. Penrod reported that Public Works has been busy cleaning storm drains around the City parks and residential areas to minimize potential flooding. He mentioned that a resident was concerned about Lawler Falls Pond overflowing and Mr. Penrod assured her that it would not overflow. Mr. Penrod stated that Public Works will prune and trim the waterfront palm trees this budget year and the plaza area trees will be pruned next fiscal year. Public Works is also starting to focus on weed abatement. In March, Public Works will be doing cleanup and landscape maintenance work in the Old Town area in addition to Highway 12 and bike path trash cleanup. The Department has also been working on a tree stump removal program in various locations throughout the City. The Driftwood Drive pathway project included the removal of nine mulberry and four sycamore trees that will be replaced with more manageable trees. There will be a Montebello Vista Maintenance Assessment District resident meeting tomorrow on February 4, 2016 and staff will report to City Council regarding issues related to Montebello Vista Park soon. Mr. Penrod responded to a question that was asked at the January Parks and Recreation Commission meeting and reported that the gate leading to marshland at McCoy Creek Park is not locked even though there is a warning/danger sign posted. Mr. Penrod stated that the sign is over 20 years old and has not been an issue. The gates were placed in the fence so that residents would not cut openings in the fence to walk their dogs in the marshland. Regarding Goepf Park, Mr. Penrod reported that Public Works will remove the concrete pads in the play equipment area and repair the fence around the play equipment. In addition, a backstop at Goepf Park will also be repaired. Mr. Penrod has located the old Carl Hall Park sign and it will be installed again at Hall Park. Suisun City did well in the report from the Water Board regarding water conservation. Last year the water use reduction mandate was 28% and it is anticipated that the required reduction will be 20% this coming year. Mr. Penrod asked if there were any questions and there were none. Chairman Borja thanked Mr. Penrod for his presentation.

D. CONSENT CALENDAR

Approval of Minutes:

The minutes of the January 6, 2015 meeting were approved with a 4-0 vote. Motion to approve made by Commissioner Conley and seconded by Commissioner Davenport.

E. GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Parks and Recreation Commission's Annual Park Clean-Up Day: Interim Director Davis discussed the Commission's previous two clean up days. Last year, the clean-up day was tied in to the National Kids to Park Day, which will be held this year on May 21, 2016. The purpose of Kids to Park Day is to encourage kids to enjoy and use neighborhood parks. Interim Director Davis suggested that the focus of Kids to Park Day is different than the clean-up day, so the Commission may want to consider using a different name for the clean-up event. Interim Director Davis reported that Amanda Dum in Public Works has announced that volunteers, including Girl Scouts, will be cleaning up the Grizzly Island bike path and Denverton curve on April 23, 2016. Commissioner Conley felt that last year's clean-up went well. Commissioner Davenport felt that there would be more participation if the event was called Community Clean-up Day as opposed to Kids to Park Day. Vice-chair Pierce would like to see a more robust turnout for the event. Chair Borja said the event was not advertised enough, but those that showed up had fun and picked up a lot of trash. Interim Director Davis asked the Commission if they would consider Montebello Vista Park for the clean-up day, but that may include more weed pulling and removal than just trash pick-up. Vice-chair Pierce reported that the Heritage Park clean-up included pulling weeds and trimming bushes. Chair Borja stated that there appeared to be a consensus to have the clean-up day this year at Montebello Vista Park and the date can be chosen at the next Commission meeting. Interim Director Davis stated that staff would include the Parks and Recreation Commission's Annual Park Clean-Up Day to the March meeting agenda so that the details related to the event could be worked out.
2. Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Update: Interim Director Davis discussed the information provided by Nick Lozano, project manager. The project update provided information about completed tasks, tasks that were started but not completed, and tasks not yet started. The rain has delayed construction and there is no set date when the project will be completed. Chairman Borja had concerns with a new rotating shade canopy already hitting a tree. Interim Director Davis said that will be an even bigger issue when the tree grows, so he will report the problem to the project manager. Chairman Borja asked if the budget would be effected by the weather delays and Interim Director Davis said that the budget would not be effected, just the time frame for completion.

F. REPORTS

1. Staff

- a. City Council Agenda: Interim Director Davis indicated that there was nothing to report at this time regarding Council agendas. The Montebello Vista Maintenance Assessment District resident meeting will be held tomorrow at 1101 Charleston at 6:30 p.m. The Montebello Vista Park topic will be on a City Council agenda in the next month or so.
 - b. Park Development Fund: Interim Director Davis stated that Lawler Ranch Park Phase II project expenses in the current fiscal year have so far totaled \$423,310 and that the Park Development Fund currently has a balance of \$752,861.
 - c. Cathy Rader discussed the Recreation Report that was included in the Commissioner's packets.
 - d. Marina Report: Interim Director Davis discussed the Marina report. The occupancy rate at the Marina is at 81%.
 - e. Senior Center Report: Interim Director Davis discussed the activities and events included in the Senior Breeze Newsletter for the month of February.
 - f. City Parks Inspection Reports: None
 - g. Other: Interim Director Davis announced that Kris Lofthus will be the new full-time Recreation and Community Services Director and will begin on February 16, 2016. Interim Director Davis thanked the Commission for working so cooperatively with him during his time in Suisun City.
2. Commission Members: Vice-chair Pierce thanked Interim Director Davis for his help.
 3. Chairman: Chairman Borja thanked Interim Director Davis for all he has accomplished in just a few months, especially with the more professional Parks and Recreation Commission agenda packets and bringing audio and visual Livestreaming to the meetings.

G. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 7:33 p.m. Motion to adjourn was made by Commissioner Conley and seconded by Commissioner Davenport. The motion was approved on a 4-0 vote.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION AGENDA ITEM: General Business 1. Discussion and possible action regarding the Parks and Recreation Commission's community park clean-up day.

BACKGROUND: For the last two years, the Parks and Recreation Commission has planned and coordinated a park or trail clean-up day. On May 17, 2014, the event was called "Suisun City's Get Out and Enjoy the Park Day" and focused on Heritage Park clean-up, large debris disposal, weeding and dead plant removal. Last year the event's name was changed to "National Kids to Parks Day". On May 16, 2015, the clean-up focused on the Highway 12 Bike Path between Wal-Mart and Pintail ending at Hall Park with a barbeque. At the Commission's June 17, 2015 meeting, it was reported that Commissioners and volunteers picked up debris and filled up 20 large garbage bags at last year's event

Kids to Parks Day is a nation-wide day of outdoor play organized by National Park Trust in cooperation with a host of local and national collaborators. This year's Kid's To Park Day will be held on Saturday May 21, 2016, the week before the official start of summer. The focus of Kids to Parks Day is to encourage children across the country to explore their neighborhood parks and discover science, history, nature, and adventure.

The Parks and Recreation Commission discussed "Suisun City's Get Out and Enjoy the Park Day"/ National Kids to Parks Day" vs. a community park clean-up day at the February 3, 2016 meeting. Chairman Borja stated that there appeared to be a consensus to name the event as a community park clean-up day and that Montebello Vista Park was a good choice to have the event.

STAFF REPORT:

Chairman Borja requested that the community park clean-up day be added to the March agenda so that the logistics related to the event can be discussed and a date can be chosen.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Commission discuss and make decisions related to the community park clean-up day.





The new parking machine will be installed next Tuesday and will be able to except credit/debit cards along with good old cash. The machine will be paid for with insurance claim funds from the destruction of the old machine. Two dilapidated house boats were removed from the marina on 03/11/2016 with the help of Sean Alexander Marine Services out of Discovery Bay, who won the bid for the removal and disposal of the vessels. The Discovery Channel will be shooting a Delorean hovercraft on land and in the marina on Monday 03/14/16. We are asking the state for a grant to put in a brand new ADA accessible kayak dock in at the launch ramp. A cost estimate has been submitted by The Dock Doctors LLC from Vermont.
