**BACKGROUND:** The City Council on February 5, 2019 endorsed the creation of Citizen's Advisory Committees. As provided for in the Background section of the February 5, 2019 Staff Report, the creation of the Committees was one more step towards establishing an organizational culture that champions civic engagement in Suisun City by the current City Council. On February 19, 2019, the City Council established the Environment & Climate, Public Safety & Emergency Management, and Lighting & Landscape. On May 5, 2020 the Council approved the establishment of the Economic Pandemic Impact Citizen's Advisory Committee (EPIC).

**STAFF REPORT:** The COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting Health Orders have had a significant impact on the fiscal health of both the City and local businesses. Local businesses are the backbone of Suisun City's economy and a source of fiscal strength. The purpose of this committee is to discuss best practices in jumpstarting our economy in a safe and healthy way, ensure our businesses have the support they need to reopen, and identify ways to expand businesses or services in our City.

The EPIC Committee met multiple times in 2020 and several recommendations of the committee were implemented to assist businesses. The Mayor has requested that membership on the committee be amended to include a representative of the Napa-Solano Labor Council/Napa-Solano Building Trades Council as a stakeholder member.

The structure of EPIC will mirror the existing Citizen's Advisory Committees. Membership will be for one-year, confirmed by the full Council, and determined as follows:

- A. Total Membership: 18 members, 16 appointed by the Mayor and City Council with full voting rights, 2 non-appointed with no voting rights consisting of the Mayor and City Manager, as Chair and Vice Chair respectively.
  - a. At-Large Members: 5 members appointed by a member of the Council. These members should have expertise or experience which would add value to the discussion of economic recovery for Suisun City.
  - b. Stakeholder Members: 11 members appointed by the Mayor in consultation with the City Manager representing economic stakeholders in our community.

- i. 4 members. Small and large businesses of any type locating within city limits. Size of businesses is defined by number of employees small is 15 or fewer employees and large is more than 15 employees. The desire is to have 50% representation of each but is flexible depending on the nominations.
- ii. 1 member. Non-profit organization located within city limits.
- iii. 1 member. Locally owned Restaurant located within city limits.
- iv. 1 member. Business member of the Downtown Waterfront Business Improvement District.
- v. 3 members. A board member from the Fairfield-Suisun Chamber of Commerce, the Solano County Black Chamber of Commerce, and the Solano Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.
- vi. 1 member. Representative of the Napa-Solano Labor Council/Napa-Solano Building Trades Council.

## A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL AMENDING AN ECONOMIC PANDEMIC IMPACT CITIZEN'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE

**WHEREAS,** on February 5, 2019, the City Council endorsed the formation of Citizen's Advisory Committees, establishing an organizational culture that champions civic engagement in Suisun City by the current City Council; and

**WHEREAS,** on May 5, 2020 the City Council approved the establishment of the Economic Pandemic Impact Citizen's Advisory Committee (EPIC); and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council desires to amend the membership on the committee include a representative of the Napa-Solano Labor Council/Napa-Solano Building Trades Council as a stakeholder member; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the membership of the Economic Pandemic Impact Citizen's Advisory Committee will mirror the existing Citizen's Advisory Committees. Membership will be for one-year, confirmed by the full Council, and determined as follows:

- A. **Total Membership**: 47 <u>18</u> members, 45 <u>16</u> appointed by the Mayor and City Council with full voting rights, 2 non-appointed with no voting rights consisting of the Mayor and City Manager, as Chair and Vice Chair respectively.
  - a. At-Large Members: 5 members appointed by a member of the Council. These members should have expertise or experience which would add value to the discussion of economic recovery for Suisun City.
  - b. Stakeholder Members: 10 11 members appointed by the Mayor in consultation with the City Manager representing economic stakeholders in our community.
    - i. 4 members. Small and large businesses of any type locating within city limits. Size of businesses is defined by number of employees small is 15 or fewer employees and large is more than 15 employees. The desire is to have 50% representation of each but is flexible depending on the nominations.
    - ii. 1 member. Non-profit organization located within city limits.
    - iii. 1 member. Locally owned Restaurant located within city limits.
    - iv. 1 member. Business member of the Downtown Waterfront Business Improvement District.
    - v. 3 members. A board member from the Fairfield-Suisun Chamber of Commerce, the Solano County Black Chamber of Commerce, and the Solano Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** For FY 2020-21, the estimated maximum annualized cost to change the allocation of Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor to Police Support Services Manager is \$26,484 increase with comparison of the highest steps in the salary range. At this time, no additional budget is requested as the cost of the Police Support Services Manager can be absorbed within the current budget.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN IMPACT:

Ensure Public Safety:

• Section 3.1 – Establish an acceptable staffing level for police and fire services to maintain public safety and identify funding mechanisms.

#### Provide Good Governance:

- Section 4.7 Improve productivity, efficiency, effectiveness, customer service and citizen satisfaction in all areas of the municipal organization.
- Section 4.8 Continuously improve the City's governance process.

#### Ensure Fiscal Solvency:

• Section 5.2 – Leverage existing resources appropriately.

**BACKGROUND:** Currently, the City has allocated the classification of Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor to perform supervision of dispatch and records staff functions for the City. Since 2017, the incumbent has been assuming additional duties. The City requested a classification study to determine if the incumbent was working within the correct classification. The incumbent's duties include police, fire, and medical dispatch in addition to managing police records, public records act requests and retention requirements. The incumbent works closely with the Police Chief and Commanders to establish systems, policies, procedures, and functions that impact the entire police department, as well as other city departments and regional public safety partners. The result of the classification study indicated the incumbent has been working outside of her classification and recommended the incumbent be reclassified to the Police Support Services Manager.

**STAFF REPORT:** The City Manager evaluated the class study report and determined it would be beneficial to the City to restructure the allocations within the Police Department. Adding the allocation of the Police Support Services Manager reflects the duties performed by the incumbent

and also enables the department to build the structure needed to comply with state guidelines and reduce potential liabilities. To achieve this goal, it is proposed to eliminate the Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor allocation and add the Police Support Services Manager allocation. The recommended revised classification specification for the Police Support Services Manager classification is attached to the resolution for Council consideration. No change is recommended to the City's existing salary resolution for the Police Support Services Manager classification at this time.

Due to the nature of the work performed, the Police Support Services Manager classification is FLSA exempt. The position continues to be represented by the Suisun City Management & Professional Employees' Association (SCMPEA).

To implement the proposed change, the attached resolution is before the Council to:

- Adopt the revised Police Support Services Manager classification to the City Classification Plan.
- Add the Police Support Services Manager allocation to the following department operating budget:
  - o 2320 Police Support Services (1.0 FTE)
- Reclassify the incumbent to the Police Support Services Manager classification
- Delete the Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor from the following department operating budget:
  - o 2320 Police Support Services (1.0 FTE)

**WHEREAS,** Suisun City Code Chapter 2.40 establishes a Personnel System that includes Classifications to group positions with similar duties and responsibilities into categories, and Pay Ranges within a Compensation Plan to establish appropriate compensation for the various Classes; and

- The revised job Classification of Police Support Services Manager is adopted and is added to the City Classification Plan.
- The Police Support Services Manager is reallocated to the following department operating budgets:

- The Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor is deleted from the following department operating budgets:
  - o 2320 Police Support Services (1.0 FTE)
- The City Council authorizes the City Manager to reclassify the incumbent from the Police Dispatch and Records Supervisor classification to the Police Support Services Manager classification and adopt the updated Police Support Services Manager classification specification.

#### POLICE SUPPORT SERVICES MANAGER

Class specifications are intended to present a descriptive list of the range of duties performed by employees in the class. Specifications are <u>not</u> intended to reflect all duties performed within the job.

#### **SUMMARY DESCRIPTION**

Under the general direction of the Chief of Police, supervises and coordinates assigned non-sworn support services within the Police Department including dispatch, records, property/evidence, code enforcement, youth services, and volunteer clerical support programs, services, and operations; supervises, assigns, reviews, and participates in the work of staff responsible for providing assigned non-sworn Police Department support services and activities; ensures work quality and adherence to established policies and procedures; and performs the more technical and complex tasks relative to assigned area of responsibility.

#### **IDENTIFYING CHARACTERISTICS**

The Police Support Services Manager is considered a manager level with responsibility for planning, coordinating, and implementing assigned non-sworn support services within the Police Department. **MEETING DATE:** February 2, 2021

**CITY AGENDA ITEM:** Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2021-\_\_\_: Authorizing the City Manager to Execute a Professional Services Agreement on the City's Behalf with AECOM Technical Services Inc. to Prepare an Environmental Impact Report for the Highway 12 Logistics Center Project.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There would be no impact to the General Fund. The cost for retaining the firm of AECOM Technical Services Inc. to prepare and complete an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is \$299,730. Staff is requesting a ten percent contingency be added to the contract which would bring the total to \$329,703. This total cost will be fully borne by the developer/applicant.

**STRATEGIC PLAN IMPACT:** Provide Good Governance; Develop Sustainable Economy; Enhance the Environment.

**BACKGROUND:** In 2020, the City received a development application for the Highway 12 Logistics Center Project. The project as submitted would consist of approximately 1.25 million square feet of high-cube industrial development within the City's western Sphere of Influence which is west of the Downtown Suisun City and east of Ledgewood Creek. Due to prior proposed projects and reports specific to this property is already known that an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) will be required. For this reason, the City circulated a Request for Proposals (RFP) in which six proposals were received:

- First Carbon Solutions.
- AECOM Technical Services Inc.
- Raney Planning and Management.
- Rincon Consultants Inc.
- Analytical Environmental Services.
- Urban Planning Partners.

Staff then reviewed each proposal and determined AECOM had prepared the most comprehensive proposal and thus should be moved forward as the recommended consultant.

**STAFF REPORT:** Below is a listing of the proposed services that AECOM will be providing as a part of this contract. Details to each of the tasks can be found in Attachment 2 of this staff report, but below are some of the key tasks that staff identified:

- Project Initiation.
- Notice of Preparation and Scoping Meeting.
- Prepare Administrative Draft of the EIR.

- Screencheck and Draft EIR.
- Final EIR and Mitigation, Monitoring, and Report Program.
- CEQA Findings and Statement of Overriding Considerations.
- Public Hearings.
- Notice of Determination.

The time for completion of the project will depend on several factors that are controlled by other stakeholders in the process including applicable environmental agencies. A specific master schedule will be prepared when consultation with the city and other stakeholders is completed. However, the initial schedule approximates a 13 to 15-month process for the EIR.

This contract is for an amount of \$299.730 and authorizes the City Manager to approve up to an additional 10% for contingencies for a grand total of \$329,703.



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# **Section 1. Overview of Company and Project Team**



projects in Yuba County and our environmental work established locally relevant CEQA significance thresholds. Key issues include infrastructure and service provision, wetlands and other sensitive biological resources, traffic congestion and the need for transportation facility improvements, air quality and climate change, and other biological resources impacts.

## Solano County General Plan Update and EIR

### **Client: Solano County**

AECOM completed a comprehensive update to the County's General Plan covering a full range of statemandated topics (land use, housing, transportation, open space, resource conservation, safety and noise) as well as locally important issues such as agriculture, economic development, fiscal stability, sustainable growth, wind power resources, and climate change, as well as a comprehensive General Plan EIR.

## Woodland Park Specific Plan and Draft EIR, Woodland, CA

## Client: City of Woodland

Woodland Park was proposed as a 900-acre area to be annexed to the City of Woodland to develop a logistics and warehousing center within the city of Woodland. Because of stormwater drainage constraints on the site, a critical challenge was the location and design of detention and conveyance facilities to maximize development potential and offer pedestrian and recreational amenities. Key issues were wetlands and other biological resources, air quality, transportation, hazardous materials, infrastructure, and flooding.

## Wal-Mart Regional Distribution Center EIR, Merced, CA

## **Client: City of Merced**

AECOM prepared the EIR for a proposed Wal-Mart regional distribution center with approximately 1.1 million square feet of distribution/warehouse, 37,000 square feet of office/support area, related buildings, and 100 acres of paved area on a 230-acre largely undeveloped site. The project was fully operational within three years after opening, employing approximately 900 people. The facility operates 24 hours per day and 365 days per year, with 900 (450 in and 450 out) tractor-trailer truck trips per day.

## Woodland Research and **Technology Park Specific Plan** and EIR

#### City of Woodland

AECOM is preparing the Specific Plan and EIR for this 350-acre, mixed-use Specific Plan that will involve annexation to the City of Woodland and is expected to accommodate logistics, light industrial, retail, commercial services, offices, and residential uses. Our work on the City's General Plan, Climate Action Plan, and General Plan EIR are being used to frame the analysis and mitigation for this high-profile, job-generating proposal.



## **Subconsultant**

AECOM will be the prime consultant for this project and will perform the environmental impact analysis and project management out of our Sacramento office. We provide guidance and quality control review of all subconsultant work products. We have extensive experience working cooperatively with Fehr & Peers on numerous EIRs for similar development plans and projects, including projects for the City and other municipalities and agencies in the County. Fehr & Peers contracted with AECOM for the Fairfield Train Station Specific Plan and EIR and the Suisun City General Plan and EIR, as well as the Mt. Calvary Baptist Church Mixed-Use Project.

## Suisun City General Plan & Senate Bill 743 CEQA Vehicle Miles Travelled Implementation Support

#### **Client: City of Suisun City**

Fehr & Peers prepared the Circulation Element for the Suisun City General Plan Update, and the transportation impact analysis for the EIR on the update. Fehr & Peers' work included a complete description of the current roadway network, daily traffic volumes on major roadways, bicycle and pedestrian networks, and transit services. Fehr & Peers worked with City staff and the consultant team to develop traffic forecasts reflecting the anticipated development of the few remaining development sites in the City, incorporating regional growth and infrastructure changes being planned by the Solano Transportation Authority. Fehr & Peers also evaluated the current General Plan Circulation policies and helped draft modified policies to reflect current City objectives. The Suisun City General Plan update represents one of the first Senate Bill (SB) 743-compliant General Plan EIRs in the County and the Bay Area, and has provided streamlining opportunities for land use projects since the formal adoption of the updated CEQA Guidelines implementing SB 743 in 2019.

Subsequent to the General Plan update, Fehr & Peers provided SB 743 CEQA vehicle miles traveled (VMT) implementation support services for the City, including the development of locally-specific metrics, methods, and significance thresholds for the City. Outcomes included the selection of the City of Fairfield travel demand model for use in VMT analysis, and a CEQA threshold of 15 percent below the Citywide average VMT per capita for residential and employment-focused projects. Fehr & Peers prepared a summary document and presented the metrics, methods and thresholds for adoption at meetings of the City's Planning Commission and City Council.

## North Richmond Warehouse/Distribution Center Multimodal CEQA Transportation Impact Analyses

#### **Client: Contra Costa County**

Fehr & Peers was retained to perform CEQA-compliant multimodal transportation impact analysis for two logistics/warehouse developments in the North Richmond area of Contra Costa County. Fehr & Peers prepared an analysis of VMT per capita (per the requirements of SB 743) using Big Data to provide an understanding of VMT for similar nearby land uses. The study also analyzed multimodal impacts and analyzed key regional automobile corridors for delay and level of service. The VMT analyses for these projects represented two of the first VMT analyses for logistics/warehouse projects in Contra Costa County and California as a whole. Mitigation measures were developed to alleviate significant CEQA VMT impacts; circulation system improvement measures were also developed, and care was taken to ensure that the mitigation measures did not result in secondary impacts to bicyclists and pedestrians.

As part of the studies, a standalone memorandum was prepared documenting strategies to improve cut-through traffic conditions in the North Richmond residential neighborhood. A toolbox of traffic calming measures were developed to guide County staff in their efforts to allow development in the North Richmond area while minimizing the potential for cut-through traffic in the residential portion of the neighborhood. Specific measures were introduced to minimize heavy truck cut-through traffic and to promote the betterment of air quality in the North Richmond residential community.

## Section 2. Key Staff

AECOM's key project team members are based locally in Sacramento, and include staff with experience managing complex projects and evaluating large-scale projects with environmental issues that are similar to those that will be faced by the proposed project. We have proposed a team that is custom tailored to this project's needs.

AECOM's proposed Project Manager is Matthew Gerken, an experienced manager and CEQA specialist who has managed several projects for the City, for the County, for the City of Fairfield, and many other similar high-profile projects throughout California, including many projects with the same key issues as the Highway 12 Logistics Center. Matthew will be supported by technical staff with whom he coordinated on the City's General Plan, the Fairfield Train Station Specific Plan and EIR, and other relevant projects. The team we have assembled to assist the City includes biologists, archaeologists, architectural historians, air quality and GHG emissions specialists, noise analysts, engineers, geologists, hazardous materials specialists, environmental scientists, environmental and urban planners, graphic artists, GIS specialists, editors, and a strong document production team.

Our team was selected for their expertise on similar project issues, regional experience, experience on projects for the City, and expected availability. Resumes of key staff are provided in in the Appendix.

## Matthew Gerken, Project Manager

Matthew Gerken is an urban and regional planner with broad and deep experience, including leading all manner of environmental review for proposed projects and plans, including many high-profile and large-scale project with similar uses and similar key issues to the Highway 12 Logistics Center. He is familiar with Suisun City and Fairfield resources, issues, opportunities, and stakeholders from managing AECOM's work on the Suisun City General Plan Update, the Waterfront District Specific Plan and environmental review, the Zephyr Estates CEQA analysis and documentation, the Mt. He is experienced in providing

peer review, senior review, and data gap analyses for cultural resources reports prepared by others as well as providing impact assessments and CEQA documents sections from studies prepared by others. He has experience with the cultural resources and tribal contacts and resources in the County. Mr. Deis meets the Secretary of the Interior's standards for work in historic-era and prehistoric archaeology.

#### Chandra Miller, Architectural History and Cultural Resources Lead

Chandra Miller meets the Secretary of the Interior's standards for work in history and architectural history. She authors technical reports through historic research, writing historic contexts, and conducting cultural resource investigations including survey and evaluation of various historic resources throughout California from linear resources to 1970s modern commercial buildings for National Register of Historic Places and California Register of Historical Resources eligibility. Ian is also recognized throughout the industry as a leader in the implementation of SB 743 CEQA VMT analysis at the land use program and land use project level. #### Proposed Role: Transportation Planning & Analysis Associate-in-Charge

Ellen has over 30 years of experience managing and overseeing transportation planning and traffic engineering projects, including working on the Fairfield Train Station Specific Plan and EIR with Matthew Gerken. Her projects have included traffic impact studies, environmental impact report transportation chapters, general and specific plan transportation elements, neighborhood traffic calming studies, freeway interchange project reports, and university-related studies covering a wide array of issues, including origin-destination surveys, trip generation surveys, and policy analysis. Her particular areas of expertise include university and city planning studies, environmental review under CEQA, and development site traffic engineering review.

## **Section 3. Scope of Services**

AECOM prepared the City's General Plan, which gives us a unique understanding of Suisun City's history, central issues, and guiding principles and the City's requirement to evaluate the site's opportunities and constraints. The City's General Plan identifies most of the project site as Commercial Mixed Use, but as noted in the City's Request for Proposal (RFP), the project would require a General Plan amendment, among other entitlement approvals. While the project would require the General Plan to be amended, information we collected and analysis we conducted as a part of the General Plan and General Plan EIR will allow us to provide the most cost-and schedule-efficient process possible.

We will use information from the City's General Plan and EIR to efficiently prepare the Highway 12 Logistics Center EIR. We will use background and descriptive information from the General Plan and General Plan EIR in the Highway 12 Logistics Center EIR, where applicable, and would refer to available information to support the analyses of cumulative impacts and growth-inducing effects, with appropriate revisions that reflect the proposed General Plan amendment. We are able to focus on critical issues based on the project site and on key topics of interest for the City and other agencies. The General Plan and General Plan EIR also would be used throughout the Highway 12 Logistics Center EIR to support the impact evaluations for resource areas such as land use, biological resources, hydrology and water quality, utilities, and transportation, although updated surveys and measurements would be required.

The following sections describe AECOM's proposed approach to preparing the EIR, including working closely with the City to initiate the project, identify and obtain relevant data and information, prepare the project description and environmental evaluation, and complete the public review and CEQA certification processes.

## **Task 1: Project Initiation**

AECOM will attend one virtual kickoff meeting with the City to confirm and clarify the objectives for the project and the environmental review, confirm the schedule goals, review the scope of services and key milestones, and discuss the strategy for team communication. We will confirm at this kick-off meeting the appropriateness of our assumptions on data availability.

AECOM's Project Manager and senior CEQA staff members, as appropriate, along with representation from Fehr & Peers, will attend the kickoff meeting. Other topics for discussion could include a discussion of the key issues that should be the focus of this work, the approach for greenhouse gas emissions analysis and mitigation, including the potential for use of offsets, the approach to VMT analysis and mitigation, and the approach to proactively engaging key regulatory agencies.

We assume that technical studies addressing the following topics have been completed by entities other than AECOM, are underway, or can be provided to us prior to our completing the Administrative Draft EIR: biological resource assessments for the site, including aquatic resource delineation, protocol level brachiopod surveys, a biological resources evaluation, and rare plant surveys; geotechnical study; Phase I Environmental Site Assessment; water supply assessment; all site-specific infrastructure master plans; and grading plans. We assume that each of the utility master plans will identify any off-site improvements, as well as on-site improvements necessary to serve the proposed project. We assume the water supply assessment will not require substantial new off-site utilities or any curtailment analysis.

## Task 2: Notice of Preparation and Public Scoping

## **Task 2.1: Notice of Preparation**

We will prepare 1 draft and 1 final Notice of Preparation (NOP) that includes a project description for inclusion in the EIR (based on material supplied by the applicant team) and a vicinity map.

The NOP will describe where project documents are available for review, where written comments on the scope of the EIR may be sent, and the deadline for submitting comments. The NOP will also identify the date and location of a public scoping meeting. We recommend that the project description in the NOP also include preliminary project objectives, which we assume would be prepared by either the applicant, the City, or a combination of both. Given the importance of the project objectives in defining alternatives and supporting the eventual CEQA findings document, we will make ourselves available to discuss strategy for project objectives. We can review and comment on draft project objectives, if requested by the City.

We will circulate the NOP with the State Clearinghouse using their protocol for electronic-only documents. We assume the City will circulate the NOP among agencies and interested parties that would not be noticed through the State Clearinghouse process. Following the close of the NOP period and after the scoping meetings, we will review NOP comments and determine whether any issues require a modification to our scope of services. Environmental issues raised in the NOP will be briefly summarized (along with NOP comments) in the introductory section of the EIR.

## Task 2.2: Scoping Meeting

AECOM will attend 1 virtual public scoping meeting during the NOP comment period to gather additional public and agency comments on the scope of the EIR. We will prepare a PowerPoint presentation and will coordinate with the City to record the scoping presentation for the City to post to the City's website. The City may wish to work with us to contact representatives of Caltrans, the CDFW, the RWQCB, and other key interested agencies to arrange a brief virtual meeting so that they may share individual input on the scope of analysis, mitigation ideas, and suggestions for alternatives.

#### Task 2 Deliverables

- 1 draft and 1 revised NOP (electronic)
- 1 virtual public scoping meeting and short presentation

## Optional Task 2.3: Optional General Plan Consistency Review and Recommendations Memo

As an option, AECOM can review the project application materials and prepare an analysis of consistency with the General Plan and develop recommendations for additional information or revisions to the project to enhance consistency. As the authors of the General Plan, AECOM would be able to prepare such an analysis efficiently, and we believe that recommendations on consistency could be helpful for the EIR, as well as the City's action on the required entitlements. For some projects, our consistency review and recommendations lead to the formulation of feasible mitigation or project design features that reduce or avoid environmental effects. While many of the General Plan policies and programs would not be relevant to the proposed project, other policies and programs will be helpful to consider in detail early in the planning process.

## **Task 3: Administrative Draft EIR**

The EIR will include sections addressing each relevant technical issue with subsections briefly summarizing the relevant environmental setting and regulatory framework, as well as thresholds of significance and a summary of impacts. Significance thresholds will be based on guidance from our work on the General Plan, tailored as necessary for the Highway 12 Logistics Center. The EIR will provide analysis of potentially significant direct, reasonably foreseeable indirect, and cumulative impacts of the proposed project. The EIR also will identify

feasible mitigation measures, consistent with the City's General Plan and state and federal regulations, to reduce potentially significant impacts. The descriptions of mitigation measures will identify their timing, entities responsible for implementation, and performance standards, as applicable.

#### Introduction

We will prepare an introduction that describes the type and use of the EIR, the environmental process associated with the proposed project, organization of the EIR, focus of the EIR analysis, other documents used in preparation of the EIR, and identification of the lead and responsible agencies.

## **Executive Summary**

We will prepare an executive summary that presents the conclusions of the EIR using clear and simple language easily understood by the public. The executive summary will have a short introduction, project description, and descriptions of alternatives. We will draft summary discussions of each environmental issue evaluated in the EIR, with a focus on the most critical issues. The summary will discuss known areas of controversy, including issues raised by agencies and the public, and will discuss any issues remaining to be resolved. A summary table will identify each impact, the significance of each impact before mitigation, all mitigation measures, and the significance of each impact after mitigation.

## **Project Description and Project Objectives**

AECOM will prepare an EIR project description for review by the City. We assume the project applicant will provide additional detail on select project components to complete the project description. We assume that either the project applicant or City will provide AECOM with project objectives suitable for inclusion in the EIR project description.


## **Environmental Setting, Impacts, and Mitigation Measures**

Making the most efficient use of our extensive environmental databases for the City's Planning Area and this portion of the County, AECOM will prepare the Environmental Setting, Impacts, and Mitigation Measures Chapter of the EIR. The EIR will evaluate each of the issue areas described in Appendix G of the CEQA Guidelines, conforming to local direction provided in the City's General Plan and General Plan EIR. The specific environmental topics to be addressed in the EIR are described below.

#### **Aesthetics**

This section will describe the existing visual environment and General Plan guidance. As provided in the General Plan, the City does not consider changes to the existing visual character through urban development to be an adverse change under CEQA. However, General Plan policies are intended to preserve and enhance scenic views in Suisun City and increase visual access to the Suisun Marsh, the Coastal Range, Cement Hill, the Potrero Hills, and the Vaca Mountains. In order to reduce adverse effects, projects should be designed to retain or enhance views of locally important scenic resources, to the extent feasible.

We will describe the existing visual environment and summarize relevant guidance from the City's General Plan and CEQA Guidelines Section 15387, which will frame the impact analysis for aesthetics. Per CEQA Guidelines Section 15387, the project site is not in an "urbanized area," which is defined as "a central city or a contiguous group of cities with a population of 50,000 or more, together with adjacent densely populated areas having a population density of at least 1,000 persons per square mile." As discussed in the CEQA Guidelines, that determination can be made by looking to U.S. Census maps, which show that the project site is not within an urbanized area. The revised CEQA Guidelines Appendix G limits the visual character analysis for projects in urban areas to an analysis of whether the project would "conflict with applicable zoning and other regulations governing scenic quality." Since the project site is not in an urban area, we recommend full analysis of impacts related to changes in the visual character of the site and surroundings.




The project site is not within an urbanized area, and therefore the CEQA Guidelines would not recommend limiting aesthetics analysis only to conflicts with pertinent aesthetics regulations.

AECOM will conduct site reconnaissance and document site conditions through photographs and notation. The EIR will evaluate visual changes from current conditions relative to the General Plan's visual/aesthetic policies. Based on the proposed site layout and orientation, the Aesthetics section will provide a qualitative evaluation of impacts. The impact analysis will address potential effects on visual character and scenic resources and light and glare impacts given the existing ambient light sources. Our analysis would not try to evaluate whether the change in visual character is good, bad, or neutral. We assume no visual simulations are necessary.

#### **Agricultural Resources**

The EIR will analyze impacts related to the loss of grazing land, conflicts with County agricultural zoning, and indirect effects on agricultural practices. The conclusions in the EIR will be made based on Policy OSC 9.3 of the City's General Plan, which states that new developments do not require compensatory mitigation for loss of grazing land or conflicts with County agricultural zoning if the project or plan is consistent with the City's General Plan, City prezoning and zoning, and other General Plan policies and programs, as appropriate. We assume no need for analysis to support findings regarding the five tests of "prime agricultural land" as defined by Government Code Section 56064.



The project site is characterized as providing grazing land according to the Department of Conservation.

## **Air Quality**

AECOM will prepare an Air Quality section in accordance with the methodologies and thresholds of significance recommended by BAAQMD and the City. The section will describe air quality conditions in the project area (e.g., ambient monitoring data, attainment designations, and source types) and natural factors (e.g., meteorology, climate, and topography) that affect the transport and dilution of pollutants. It also will describe applicable standards, plans, rules/regulations, and significance criteria for evaluating emissions of criteria air pollutants and precursors, toxic air contaminants (TACs), and odors.

Modeling will be performed using the BAAQMD-approved California Emissions Estimator Model (CalEEMod). We will analyze and report construction-related impacts based on information provided by the applicant for assumed phasing for the project. Construction emissions will be modeled based on the amount of land to be disturbed/graded, types of equipment to be used, and the number of construction employees. We will use reasonable assumptions or model defaults regarding construction equipment and employees if estimates are not available from the applicant. The analysis will quantify long-term operational air pollutant emissions generated by the project's area, stationary, and mobile sources. Operational emissions will be generated primarily from mobile sources (worker vehicles and trucks). Area-source emissions will be calculated by CalEEMod using assumptions based on the amount and types of land uses. Stationary sources, if any are identified, will be quantified using information provided by the City and appropriate emission factors and methodologies.

Consistent with guidance in the California Supreme Court's decision in *Sierra Club v. County of Fresno*, it will be important to explain the health effects of criteria air pollutants, and explain the connection between the project's mass emissions, mass emissions-based thresholds, concentration-based health effects, and air quality attainment planning.

Based on our experience working with BAAQMD, and familiarity with CO screening approaches, we assume dispersion modeling for carbon monoxide "hot spots" will not be required, but we could provide this analysis with an amendment to our scope of services, if the City directs. Since there are no nearby sensitive receptors, the City

could elect to address toxic air contaminant effects associated with diesel emissions qualitatively and based on guidance from the ARB to, for example, avoid the siting of new commercial trucking facilities that accommodate more than 100 trucks per day, or 40 trucks equipped with transportation refrigeration units (TRUs), within 1,000 feet of sensitive receptors (e.g., residences). Odor impacts of the proposed project will be assessed qualitatively according to BAAQMD's recommended methodology and other applicable parameters, such as acceptable screening trigger distances, wind direction, and odor complaint history.

### Optional Task: Dispersion Modeling and Health Risk Analysis


As an option, the air quality analysis can evaluate the project's toxic air contaminant (TAC) impacts. AECOM can use a screening-level air dispersion model (such as AERSCREEN, the screening-level version of EPA's AERMOD) to quantitatively evaluate health risk impacts on sensitive receptors. AECOM can identify applicable mitigation measures if screening results show potentially significant impacts. If a detailed health risk assessment is requested, our air quality specialists have this expertise and could provide this service under a revised scope of services.

#### **Biological Resources**

AECOM's wetland specialists, wildlife biologists, and botanists will conduct a peer review of the technical reports on biological and aquatic resources commissioned by the applicant. The focus of the review will be to determine if the reports provide enough information to develop the Biological Resources section of the EIR. Upon completion of the peer reviews, AECOM will provide the City with a memo assessing the adequacy of the reports. If the reports do not provide sufficient information to support a CEQA analysis of impacts, the memo will specify what additional data or revisions are needed to achieve adequacy, and we assume the commissioned biologists will make such revisions. We assume the applicant's biologists will provide AECOM with GIS shapefiles, Google Earth KMZ files, and/or other GIS-compatible digital files depicting the location of plant communities, special-status plants, and aquatic resources described in the technical reports.

The Biological Resources section of the EIR will be developed based on the information in the technical reports and other existing background information. If the special-status species record search results from the technical report on biological resources are more than 90 days old, AECOM will conduct updated record searches for the California Natural Diversity Database and the California Native Plant Society's Electronic Inventory of Rare and Endangered Vascular Plants. AECOM will also obtain a list from the USFWS Information, Planning, and Conservation System of federally-listed plant and wildlife species that could occur in the area.

The Biological Resources section will describe the biological resources on the site, including plant communities, associated common and special-status plant and wildlife species, and sensitive biological resources. A land cover/habitat exhibit will depict locations of known occurrences of special-status species, wetland complexes, and any other sensitive natural communities, based on information provided in the technical reports. The environmental analysis will identify the acreages of affected habitat by overlaying the project on the resource map based



on the information provided in the technical reports. The section will also address any local policies or ordinances related to biological resources, as well as measures in the draft Solano Multispecies Habitat Conservation Plan (Solano HCP) to protect biological resources.

Based on AECOM's review of the applicant-commissioned technical reports, the Solano HCP, and our knowledge of the many sensitive biological resources in this part of the County, AECOM believes that the EIR analysis will require a thoughtful and creative approach to mitigation. The project site overlaps with designated critical habitat for the federally endangered Contra Costa Goldfields (*Lasthenia conjugens*), which has been documented on the site, and is immediately adjacent to critical habitat for federally endangered Suisun thistle (*Cirsium hydrophilum* var. *hydrophilum*). Critical habitat for vernal pool fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta lynchi*) and vernal pool tadpole shrimp (*Lepidurus packardi*) occurs in the area farther to the east, and northern claypan vernal pool habitat is overlaps with the site. Additionally, salt marsh harvest mouse (*Reithrodontomys raviventris*), which is federally- and statelisted as endangered has been documented on the site, along with other state wildlife species of special concern and plants assigned a California Rare Plant Rank by the CDFW. Based on a "windshield" survey of the project site conducted by an AECOM biologist, and on review of aerial photography, the portion of the project area east of the drainage canal is characterized by tidal marsh wetlands, and west of the canal, the site is dominated by alkali grassland with depressions that could support vernal pool habitat.

Given the presence of these sensitive biological resources, AECOM will work with the City and applicant to recommend that the EIR provide mitigation consistent with conservation strategies and avoidance/minimization measures proposed in the draft HCP. The EIR will discuss the extent to which on-site preservation and restoration in the open space portion of the project site could be used to mitigate impacts on special-status species and sensitive habitats. The EIR also will discuss options for mitigating impacts by using mitigation banks, such as the North Suisun Mitigation Bank.



There are sensitive biological resources in the vicinity of the project site that will be the focus of study in the EIR.

#### **Cultural and Tribal Cultural Resources**

Based on AECOM's familiarity with Suisun City, the project site has been previously identified as potentially sensitive for buried and surface cultural resources. In addition, as noted in the Suisun City General Plan, areas for

prehistoric settlement sensitivity include near year-round and seasonal waterways, such as Ledgewood Creek and a drainage within the immediate project vicinity. AECOM is also aware of the Suisun City Historic District outside of the project site boundary east of Railroad Avenue approximately 0.30-miles away. The district was determined eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) and the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) by the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) in 2010; therefore, the historic district is considered a historical resource for the purposes of CEQA. However, AECOM assumes that the proposed project will not result in direct or indirect substantial adverse effects to the historic district.

AECOM will have Northwest Information Center (NWIC) staff conduct a record search of the California Historical Resources Information System at Sonoma State University, Rohnert Park to find any previous cultural resources reports or studies completed within a 0.5-mile radius of the proposed project site. Additional pre-field literature review will include review of historic-era maps and aerial photographs; historic newspapers; online local history collections; property records; and other books and documents, as appropriate. AECOM cultural resources staff will prepare the appropriate ethnographic, prehistoric and historical context proportionate to the cultural resources and tribal cultural resources that may be identified in the project area. AECOM assumes no previously recorded prehistoric or historical archaeological resources and up to two built environment cultural resources are in the project area.

Assembly Bill 52 (AB 52) requires lead agencies to consider the impacts of proposed projects on Tribal Cultural Resources. We anticipate supporting the City with AB 52 compliance. In accordance with AB 52, AECOM will initiate contact with the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) in Sacramento to request a search of the Sacred Lands Files (SLF) and a list of Native American representatives and tribal organizations in the project area. The City may already have a list of tribes who have indicated they would like to be consulted regarding projects in the City – we recommend inviting input from both sets of contacts. AECOM will assist the City in the contact of suggested individuals or organizations by letter with up to two follow-up phone calls, if necessary, to inquire about the presence of Tribal Cultural Resources. The purpose of this consultation will be to solicit any information regarding sensitive cultural properties within and in the vicinity of the project site and to document any concerns of the Native American community. The results of this contact program will be incorporated into the technical report and EIR. We assume no need for site visits with Native American Tribal representatives, but we frequently provide this service, and can do so under an amended scope of services if directed by the City.

AECOM archaeologists will conduct an intensive pedestrian survey of the project site, including areas of proposed ground disturbance related to project improvements, including proposed laydown and applicant-identified staging areas for construction. Any identified archaeological resources encountered during field survey will be recorded on standard California Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) 523 site record forms. AECOM assumes up to three archeological sites/resources would be recorded. AECOM architectural historians will conduct a field survey of the project area to record buildings and/or structures more than 45 years old through photography and written descriptions and recorded on DPR 523 forms. The main purpose of this survey will be to determine whether any built-environment resources in or directly adjacent to the project area will be affected by the project, and if they meet the criteria for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) and/or the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) or otherwise are considered historical resources for the purposes of CEQA. AECOM assumes up to five historic-age built environment cultural resources would be recorded. Based on the results of the background research and cultural field survey, if archeological testing of the project site is required to determine the presence of buried cultural resources, this would be conducted under a revised scope of services.

AECOM will prepare a cultural resources technical report to append to the EIR. The report will include the project description, maps/figures of the cultural resources study area, background research and literature review including the result of the records search, field survey methods, Native American and other interested party outreach, results of the survey, findings and conclusions. The report also will include a summary of NRHP and CRHR eligibility findings for archaeological and built environment resources and management recommendations. It will discuss any further investigation that may be necessary but outside this scope of services. DPR 523 forms

will be appended to this report. This scope of services assumes that no more than five buildings/structures will require formal recordation and evaluation, and no more than three archaeological resources/sites will be recorded.

The cultural resources and Tribal Cultural Resources sections of the EIR will summarize the results of the investigation, address potential impacts on any significant cultural resources and tribal cultural resources that may exist in the project area, and will describe all direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts of the project on cultural resources tribal cultural resources. Where necessary, mitigation measures to reduce potentially significant impacts will be included.

As noted in Attachment 2 of the RFP, the project will require a Section 404 of the Clean Water Act permit, which triggers Section 106 of the Historic Preservation Act. Therefore, AECOM proposes to prepare the cultural resources and tribal cultural resources technical report for the EIR will be suitable to support the Section 106 permitting process, but active participation in Section 106 compliance is not included in this scope of work. If desired, AECOM can support the Section 106 section 404 permitting process, but a separate scope of services will be required.

#### Energy

Energy is an important impact topic to include in the EIR, particularly following the important *Ukiah Citizens for Safety First v. City of Ukiah* appellate court decision. The Energy section will describe the current utility provider(s) in the project area for electricity and natural gas. The regulatory framework will present the energy efficiency standards on the federal, state, and local levels, as applicable to the planned land uses. AECOM will analyze energy use and evaluate whether the proposed project would develop land uses and patterns that could lead to wasteful and/or inefficient use of energy. The analysis also will evaluate how the project would affect local and regional energy supplies with respect to total demand, peak demand, and energy efficiency.

Based on recent precedent case law, it is important that the topics outlined in CEQA Guidelines Appendix F are addressed (now included in the Appendix G checklist), including transportation and construction-related energy use. We propose to emphasize that energy use itself is not necessarily an adverse environmental effect, and that the environmental effects are analyzed in other topic-specific sections of the EIR, such as sections addressing air quality and greenhouse gas emissions.

## Geology and Soils, Minerals, and Paleontology

AECOM will build on the detailed research and setting information that we prepared for the County as part of the City's General Plan and EIR and the County Technical Background Report and General Plan EIR. We also will review the project's geotechnical report, which we assume will be prepared by the applicant.

Per the City's General Plan, the project site is underlain by Alviso silty clay loam and Sycamore silty clay loam, saline. The project site is also noted to have moderate shrink-swell potential and moderate liquefaction potential. We assume, based on our knowledge of the site and surroundings, that the site does not have economically valuable mineral deposits. The City's General Plan shows that the project site is underlain by Holocene Alluvium, which is not paleontologically sensitive. AECOM will complete the Geology and Soils, Minerals, and Paleontology EIR section including existing environment, potential environmental effects (e.g., shaking, liquefaction), design measures and best management practices, and mitigation measures.

#### **Greenhouse Gas Emissions**

The greenhouse gas (GHG) section will include a description of the current science surrounding climate change. The existing setting section will also include a summary of the applicable regulatory framework, including AB 32 (for 2020), SB 32 (for 2030), and Executive Order S-3-05 (for 2050) for GHG emissions and global climate change. The framework for climate action plans and GHG analysis under CEQA is framed by this State-level guidance and California Supreme Court decisions in *Center for Biological Diversity v. California* Department *of Fish and Wildlife*, commonly known as the "Newhall decision" and *Cleveland National Forest Association v.* 

SANDAG (as well as the Friends of Oroville decision, the Citizens for Responsible Equitable Environmental Development (CREED) v. the City of Chula Vista, and the Sierra Club v. the County of San Diego decision.

AECOM will develop assumptions that we can use to estimate construction-related and long-term GHG emissions based on the project description. We will use methods consistent with the air quality section to estimate short-term and long-term GHG emissions. We will consider relevant guidance from the Air District, but we anticipate updating this guidance with more recent case law and the updated Air Resources Board Scoping Plan. In addition, since the staff we propose to assist with this project have developed guidance and quantified thresholds for GHG analysis, we can propose appropriate augmentations to the analysis that may be required for this particular assignment. We will develop mitigation, if required, to address a potentially cumulatively considerable impact. This section will focus on GHG emissions and not the potential adverse impacts to the proposed project or project site from the foreseeable effects of climate change. This scope of services does not include hydrological or modeling of future climate conditions.

#### **Hazards and Hazardous Materials**

In the Hazards and Hazardous Materials section of the EIR, AECOM will summarize the types of activities and hazardous materials that would be used during construction and operation and will evaluate their potential impacts, including increased use, storage, and disposal of hazardous materials. Construction of the project would involve the storage, use, and transport of hazardous materials (e.g., asphalt, fuel, lubricants, paint). We assume that application of existing regulations, as described thoroughly for CEQA compliance, will reduce or avoid these hazards.

AECOM will evaluate potential hazards from known hazardous waste sites by searching the Cortese List and other database sources, such as Geotracker, and will order a report from Environmental Data Resources. No field verification is proposed. The EIR will describe the current closure status of any hazardous waste sites. This evaluation will rely on information contained in the City's General Plan EIR. The project's potential impacts on emergency response services and consistency with the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan will be addressed.

It may be helpful, if the applicant has not already done so as a part of due diligence exercises, to prepare a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) to identify any hazardous materials issues that may affect development of the project site. AECOM can prepare a Phase I ESA efficiently and if directed by the City, we can add this to our scope of services.

#### **Hydrology and Water Quality**

The project site is flat, vegetated pastureland and in the vicinity of the site are drainage canals that connect to Peytonia Slough and Suisun Slough. The Suisun Marsh wetlands, to which the project site drains, is listed as an impaired water on the CWA Section 303(d) list for mercury, nutrients, low dissolved oxygen, sediment, total dissolved solids, and chlorides. Water quality at the project site is under the jurisdiction of the San Francisco Bay RWQCB. The project site is within the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) designated 100-year flood. Flooding in the vicinity of the City generally occurs along waterways, with infrequent localized flooding also occurring due to constrictions of storm drain systems and/or surface water ponding. According to the sea level rise map prepared by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Office for Coastal Management, portions of the site may be at risk of flooding related to sea level rise.

AECOM will use existing studies to characterize existing surface and subsurface hydrologic conditions and water quality conditions. The EIR will evaluate potential hydrology and water quality impacts, including short-term impacts from construction of buildings and other features, grading and excavation and handling of hazardous materials, and potential dewatering effluent. The EIR also will address potential changes in the rate of stormwater runoff, as well as water quality impacts. The hydrology and water quality analysis will address the project's compliance with the State's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination Permit (NPDES) and applicable general construction permit. To the degree that treatment options and BMPs are identified, they will be incorporated into the EIR, and where necessary, additional feasible mitigation measures will be identified such as temporary

construction water quality BMPs (i.e., erosion, sedimentation, spills) and permanent, post-construction measures (e.g., landscaping, water quality treatment BMPs).

## Land Use and Planning, Population, and Housing

Based on the location, the project site will not physically divide an established community, and our EIR will briefly point this out. This section will briefly describe the existing land uses and potential land use and planning-related effects. We will briefly highlight conflicts with the City's General Plan, Solano LAFCo Standards and Procedures, or the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) and Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) Plan Bay Area 2040. Consistency with relevant plans is not necessarily a CEQA issue, but can provide helpful background in understanding how potentially significant effects could be mitigated through the implementation of relevant policies (*The Highway 68 Coalition v. County of Monterey*, et al. [6th Dist. 2017] Cal.App.5th). Land use compatibility issues, such as view obstruction, noise, air pollutant emissions, and traffic will be addressed in separate environmental topic sections of the EIR. We assume no need for analysis of non-CEQA, LAFCo-specific issues in the EIR or as a part of our scope of services.

The project would not directly increase population through construction of new housing. We assume a very brief analysis describing indirect changes in population and housing from creation of employment opportunities based on the U.S. Census Bureau, California Department of Finance, and ABAG projections. AECOM will document the existing and planned future jobs/housing conditions in Suisun City using our databases, information from the Department of Finance and Economic Development Department, ABAG and MTC's Plan Bay Area 2040, and others. The EIR will also include a brief discussion on jobs/housing balance.

#### **Noise and Vibration**

Noise in the vicinity of the project site is associated with roadway volumes along SR 12, Pennsylvania Avenue, and Cordelia Street, along with the railroad line. AECOM will collect ambient noise data through two 24-hour (long-term) and up to four 15-minute (short-term) noise measurements. We will document sources and locations of ambient noise in the vicinity of the project site.

The Noise analysis will compare construction noise and potential future operational noise with existing ambient noise levels. Construction noise will be estimated based on the types of equipment that would be used, percent utilization, intervening structures and topography, and distance to noise-sensitive receptors, using the Roadway Construction Noise Model. Operational noise will be estimated and its impact at existing adjacent noise-sensitive uses will be evaluated. Operational noise levels will be estimated using values presented in the literature for noise sources similar to those that the proposed project would create. The EIR also will evaluate construction vibration using average vibration level ranges for typical construction equipment developed by the Federal Railroad Administration. Groundborne vibration levels will be compared to the City's noise standards in the 2035 General Plan.

AECOM will estimate existing and future with project transportation noise using travel demand estimates prepared to support the transportation section of this EIR. A Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)-approved traffic noise prediction model will be used to determine roadway traffic noise levels for existing and existing-plus-project scenarios for affected roadway segments. The EIR will assess potential impacts using noise modeling and standard noise attenuation rates, as well as intervening barriers, distance, and ambient noise sources.

AECOM will propose appropriate mitigation strategies for construction and operation for potentially significant noise impacts based on General Plan guidance (Policies PHS-1.3, 1.4, 1.8 and Programs PHS-1.1 and PHS-1.2).

#### **Public Services and Recreation**

The Public Services and Recreation section of the EIR will analyze any increased demands on public services. The project would not provide any new housing that would generate new students or residents in Suisun City; therefore, there would be no impact on schools, parks, other public facilities (i.e., libraries), or recreation facilities.

This evaluation will address whether any physical facilities would need to be improved, constructed, or expanded to serve the project, including those outside of the project site, whose construction could have environmental effects. If so, the secondary effects of expanding, improving, constructing, and operating such facilities will be evaluated. The evaluation also will assess service capability and the potential for the project to adversely affect existing service levels elsewhere in their respective service areas. AECOM will contact relevant service providers to identify the project's service implications and the potential environmental impacts of additional facilities.

The analysis will refer to the Plan for Services, if available, and compliance with existing standards, standard City conditions, and regulations to address the financing and provision of public services, including sustainable water supplies, as well as adequate solid waste and wastewater services and capacity, with no adverse impact on existing ratepayers. The evaluation will assess whether the City would perform any services now being provided by another service provider, and whether substituting the City for that provider would adversely affect the previous provider's ability to maintain services elsewhere in its service area.

#### **Transportation**

AECOM, together with Fehr & Peers, will prepare a transportation impact analysis and the Transportation section of the EIR. The General Plan shifts away from CEQA analysis focused on level of service (LOS), but requires developments to maintain a LOS E standard for roadways and intersections, as feasible. The results of LOS analysis for projects may be used to identify fair-share impact fee contributions or necessary updates to the City's Capital Improvement Plan. Importantly, the City may wish to direct the AECOM Team to prepare a LOS analysis in the beginning of this planning process to identify off-site transportation areas that should be included for analysis in the EIR.

Fehr & Peers will complete an analysis of weekday home-based work (commuter) VMT per employee using the City of Fairfield travel demand model; this VMT metric and model calculation approach is directly consistent with the CEQA VMT analysis approach adopted by the City Council in mid-September 2020. Fehr & Peers will prepare model runs for the model Base Year (2020), Base Year plus Project, Cumulative (Year 2035) and Cumulative plus Project scenarios. Home-based work VMT per employee information for the proposed project and the average overall employment uses in the City will be computed. Plus Project scenario metrics will be compared against the No Project metrics and CEQA impacts will be assessed using the relevant project-level CEQA threshold adopted by the City.

If a significant CEQA impact is identified, Fehr & Peers will develop feasible mitigation measures and evaluate the effectiveness of those measures using data included in the California Air Pollution Control Officers Association (CAPCOA) Quantifying Greenhouse Gas Reduction Measures document; Fehr & Peers will supplement the information in the CAPCOA document with new research commissioned by the California Air Resources Board.

Fehr & Peers will also analyze the proposed project site plan to evaluate access and on-site circulation. Specifically, we will review the project site plan in terms of:

- Site access and interface with public roadway network including adequacy of turn-pocket lengths, driveway throat lengths, sight distance and operations
- Emergency vehicle access and circulation
- Vehicular circulation within the site
- Public parking layout within the site
- Pedestrian access and circulation within and adjacent to the site
- Bicycle access and circulation within and adjacent to the site

Fehr & Peers will also qualitatively evaluate the off-site pedestrian, bicycle and transit network to determine if the proposed project would result in CEQA impacts these facilities.

Fehr & Peers will prepare a Transportation section to summarize the data, analysis, calculations, and results. Fehr & Peers has allocated up to 16 hours of staff time to respond to City staff comments on the Administrative

Draft EIR Transportation section and prepare the Draft EIR Transportation section. Fehr & Peers has allocated up to 16 hours of staff time to respond to public comment on the Draft EIR Transportation section and prepare the Final EIR Transportation Section. Additional effort to respond to comments beyond that identified previously can be accommodated on a time-and-materials basis, subject to a scope and budget amendment.

## Optional Transportation Task 1: Supplemental "Big Data" VMT Analysis

As an option, Fehr & Peers will purchase location-based services "Big Data" VMT information for up to eight similar sites in the vicinity of the proposed project. Fehr & Peers will analyze the data to ascertain if the VMT estimates being provided by the City of Fairfield travel demand model are reasonable. Adjustments to VMT estimates may be made if the Big Data VMT estimates indicate that the model is under or over-representing home-based VMT per worker associated with the logistics center land use.

## Optional Transportation Task 2: Level of Service (LOS) Analysis

As an option, Fehr & Peers can prepare a LOS analysis. Based on the project description and layout of the surrounding transportations system, it is assumed that 10 study intersections would be included in the analysis. Fehr & Peers will request traffic count data from the City and/or City of Fairfield. It is assumed that Fehr & Peers would need to collect up to eight additional traffic counts; traffic counts will be downloaded for the StreetLight Data traffic count database, which provides data on Year 2019 (i.e. pre-COVID pandemic) traffic volumes.

Fehr & Peers will calculate intersection operations for the study intersections for the weekday AM peak hour and weekday PM peak hour using methodologies from the Highway Capacity Manual, 6th Edition, as applied in the Synchro software analysis package. The circulation analysis will include an analysis of Existing, Existing plus Project, Cumulative, and Cumulative plus Project Conditions. Cumulative conditions volumes will be based on information from the City of Fairfield travel demand model. Plus Project scenario traffic volumes will be based on updated trip generation calculations (using data from the ITE Trip Generation Manual, 10th Edition); these estimated project trips will be distributed through the roadway system and assigned to turning movements at the study intersections. Plus Project scenario operations will be compared against the relevant No Project scenario to assess if the project results in new deficiencies using criteria identified in the City's General Plan and other previously-completed transportation studies; if new deficiencies are found to occur, improvement measures will be identified to remedy the deficiencies. If improvements are identified, the AECOM Team can add analysis of the impacts of these improvements to the EIR scope of services.

#### **Utilities and Service Systems**


The EIR will describe water supply and conveyance, wastewater collection and treatment, solid waste, and natural gas and electrical services based on the City's General Plan and based on the utilities master plans commissioned by the applicant.

The EIR will address existing and future public utility demands and services that will be required to serve the project at buildout. This evaluation will focus on potential environmental effects associated with the construction and operation of new, extended, and expanded public infrastructure and services, including on off-site areas.

In accordance with SB 610 (codified as California Water Code Section 10631), the project will require a water supply assessment. We assume this report will be available for our use in preparing the EIR and that it will verify the availability of sufficient water supply to meet the project's projected water demands during normal, single-dry, and multiple-dry water years over a 20-year projection, which includes consideration of full buildout of the project and cumulative development. The water supply assessment will be an EIR appendix.

#### Wildfire

AECOM will summarize available information summarizing existing wildfire risk in the vicinity of the project site. We will evaluate emergency response, pollutant exposure to wildfires, and whether the project or required infrastructure improvements could exacerbate fire risk, along with indirect risks (flooding, landslides) associated with wildfires. The EIR will include reference to project design features and standards that have been developed in collaboration with wildfire risk management experts to reduce direct and indirect risks.



There are no Very High Fire Risk Severity Zones in Local Responsibility Areas in Solano County, though portions of the project site appear to be designated High Fire Risk.

## **Alternatives**

AECOM will coordinate closely with the City on alternatives development to ensure that the EIR evaluates a range of alternatives that will meet CEQA requirements. Our scope assumes that the EIR will address up to three alternatives, including the no project alternative, as required by CEQA. In accordance with the CEQA Guidelines, the alternatives will be ones that avoid or have less impact than the proposed project by avoiding resources or constructing smaller project features, while meeting the project's objectives. The environmental impacts of each alternative will be evaluated and the EIR will provide a comparative matrix. The EIR will provide sufficient information about the alternatives for a meaningful comparison with the proposed project, but at a lower level of detail, as allowed under CEQA.

We will present qualitative comparative analyses for most environmental topics, but we can also present some quantitative information on topics of critical concern. We recommend a discussion during project initiation to identify these topics. For example, we frequently develop tabular comparisons for criteria air pollutants and GHG emissions. For biological resources, we can prepare impact tables showing acreages of habitat type disturbed, and supporting habitat map overlays, will be prepared for each alternative.

## **Other CEQA-Required Sections**

This section of the EIR will address cumulative and growth-inducing effects. It will explain what constitutes a cumulative impact under CEQA and describe the methods used in the evaluation (CEQA Guidelines Section 15130). The Other CEQA-Required Sections discussion will address past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future projects, either approved or proposed, that could interact with the proposed project, including the City's General Plan, to evaluate future growth. AECOM will provide the cumulative context and a map and description of the cumulative context, which we assume will be based on the City's General Plan, Fairfield's General Plan, the Heart of Fairfield Specific Plan, and the County's General Plan. This section also will examine potential growth-

inducing effects (Section 15126.2[d]), significant and unavoidable impacts, and irreversible and irretrievable commitment of resources.

### **Administrative Record**

Concurrent with the Administrative Draft EIR, AECOM will collect references cited in the EIR. AECOM assumes that the City will be responsible for maintaining all other information that will become part of the administrative record as required by CEQA.

## Task 4: Screencheck and Public Review Draft EIR

Following final revisions of the Administrative Draft based on City comments, AECOM will prepare and produce a Screencheck Draft (showing changes in underline/strikeout) and then the Public Review Draft EIR. AECOM will submit the Public Review Draft EIR electronically to the State Clearinghouse, along with the Notice of Completion (NOC), and will provide a Notice of Availability (NOA) to the City for the City to circulate to interested parties that are beyond the Clearinghouse distribution and for the City to publish in the newspaper of record.

During the 45-day comment period on the Draft EIR, AECOM will assist the City in preparing for and conducting a public meeting to receive public comments on the EIR. AECOM's Project Manager will attend one meeting to listen to and record comments. The AECOM Project Manager will provide a brief presentation on CEQA, the findings of the Draft EIR, and next steps in the environmental process. Our proposal assumes that AECOM will arrange for recording and transcription of comments and that the City will arrange a meeting location.

- Public Draft EIR (electronic and 25 hard copies of the body only with the technical appendix in electronic format)
- Draft and Final NOA and NOC (electronic)
- Draft and Final Meeting presentation

#### Task 5: Final EIR

AECOM will meet with the City to discuss comments on the Draft EIR, develop strategies for responses, prepare responses to comments, and prepare an Administrative Final EIR. The Final EIR will consist of comment letters, responses to comments, and excerpts from the Draft EIR showing the resulting changes. AECOM has allocated up to 80 hours for preparing responses to comments and the balance of hours in the task for preparing and producing the Final EIR. AECOM will advise the City if additional effort will be required to respond to comments once all comments have been catalogued. AECOM will code all of the comment letters upon receipt in preparation for the meeting and will develop a comment tracking matrix of the comments and responsible party and due date, especially if numerous comments are received. Following City review of the Administrative Draft Final EIR, AECOM will revise and prepare a Screencheck Final EIR showing changes as underline and strikeout. Following final revisions, AECOM will prepare a Final EIR.

- Final EIR (electronic and 25 hard copies)

## **Task 6: Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program**

As a part of the Final EIR, we will summarize all mitigation measures in a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP). The MMRP will include all mitigation measures and will specify the party responsible for implementing the measure, including responsibility for payment of costs; the agency, department, or division responsible for monitoring compliance with the measure; the timeframe for compliance with the measure; and requirements for reporting to the director as necessary to ensure compliance with the measure. If the mitigation measure uses a performance standard to guide implementation, this will be identified, as well.

#### Task 6 Deliverables:

Draft and Final MMRP (electronic)

## Task 7: CEQA Findings and Statement of Overriding Considerations

AECOM will review an example CEQA Findings and Statement of Overriding Considerations document from the City, and we can provide the City with some examples, as well, that demonstrate different approaches. After we agree on the template, AECOM will prepare one draft and one final (electronic) version of the CEQA Findings and Statement of Overriding Considerations for use at the certification hearing.

## **Task 8: Public Hearings**

AECOM will attend up to three hearings with the Planning Commission and City Council at which the EIR is considered for certification and will be available to provide a brief presentation and answer questions on the EIR approaches and results. AECOM will assist the City with preparing for the public hearings and with meeting materials such as a PowerPoint presentation.

## Task 9: Notice of Determination

We will prepare one Notice of Determination (NOD) for the City to deliver to the County Clerk's office and for AECOM to hand deliver to the State Clearinghouse following certification.

#### Task 9 Deliverables:

Based on the above-described level of effort, not including optional tasks, our total labor cost estimate is \$246,990. Fehr & Peers' cost estimate is \$48,590 and our total estimate for other direct costs is \$4,150, for a

grand total of \$299,730. We assume this will be treated as a time-and-materials, not-to-exceed amount. We will only invoice for what is *actually* necessary to complete the requested work.

Fehr & Peers' cost estimate for Optional Transportation Task 1: Supplemental "Big Data" VMT Analysis is \$13,690 and for Optional Transportation Task 2: Level of Service (LOS) Analysis is \$37,335.

The following table provides a cost estimate.

## **Assumptions**

With the objective of ensuring clarity about the proposal, AECOM has prepared the following assumptions for our scope of work that explain the basis for the cost and effort to implement the work scope.

- Deliverables—We assume all electronic deliverables except as otherwise specified in our scope of services.
   Printing costs are an allowance we will only invoice the City for the actual cost of reproduction with no markup.
- Data—our scope of services and cost estimate relies primarily on existing studies, databases, and the available resources identified in our scope of services.
- Schedule—Our cost estimate is based on the proposed schedule. Should significant delay occur (more than 120 days) for reasons beyond our control, we will apply updated labor rates.
- Initiation—The budget is valid for up to 60 days from the date of submittal/opening.
- Review cycles—Review cycles for preliminary documents are presented in the scope of services and additional review cycles are assumed not to be needed.
- Meetings—Costs are included for the number of meetings and hearings specified in the scope of work, including up to four meetings with City staff, as identified in the City's RFP. If additional meetings or hearings are needed, they can be included with an amendment of the budget.
- Shifting budget—Costs have been allocated to tasks to determine the total budget. AECOM may reallocate costs among tasks, as needed, as long as the total budget is not exceeded.
- CEQA changes—The CEQA statutes or guidelines may change during the course of this EIR. If amendments require redoing work already performed or substantially increasing effort, an amendment may be warranted.
- Consolidated comments—The City will provide AECOM with one set of consolidated, non-conflicting comments on deliverables by City staff.
- Challenge—The proposed budget and scope does not include labor, reproduction, or other costs in the event the EIR is challenged or EIR certification is appealed.
- Stable project description—The scope of work and budget are based on the assumption that the project description does not change during the course of the work.

## **Section 6. Acceptance of Contract Terms**

AECOM has contracted with the City of Suisun City several times in the last few years. We have reviewed the standard agreement and would ask the City to consider the following edits. Yellow and underlined indicates text to be added. Redline strikeout indicates text to be removed.

## 1.1 Scope of Services.

In compliance with all terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Consultant shall provide those services specified in the "Scope of Services" attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference, which may be referred to herein as the "services" or "work" hereunder. As a material inducement to the City entering into this Agreement, Consultant represents and warrants that it has the qualifications, experience, and facilities necessary to properly perform the services required under this Agreement in a thorough, competent, and professional manner, and is experienced in performing the work and services contemplated herein. Consultant shall at all times faithfully, competently and to the best of its ability, experience and talent, perform all services described herein. Consultant covenants that it shall follow the highest customary professional standards in performing the work and services required hereunder and that all materials will be both of good quality as well as fit for the purpose intended. For purposes of this Agreement, the phrase "highest professional standards" shall mean those standards of practice recognized by one or more first-class reputable firms performing similar work under similar circumstances.

## 1.6 Familiarity with Work.

By executing this Agreement, Consultant warrants that Consultant (i) has thoroughly investigated and considered the scope of services to be performed, (ii) has carefully considered how the services should be performed, and (iii) fully understands the facilities, difficulties and restrictions attending performance of the services under this Agreement. If the services involve work upon any site, Consultant warrants that Consultant has or will investigate the site and is or will be fully reasonably acquainted with the conditions there existing, prior to commencement of services hereunder. Should the Consultant discover any latent or unknown conditions, which will materially affect the performance of the services hereunder, Consultant shall immediately inform the City of such fact and shall not proceed except at Consultant's risk until written instructions are received from the Contract Officer.

## 2.2 Method of Compensation.

The method of compensation may include: (i) a lump sum payment upon completion; (ii) payment in accordance with specified tasks or the percentage of completion of the services, less contract retention; (iii) payment for time and materials based upon the Consultant's rates as specified in the Schedule of Compensation, provided that (a) time estimates are provided for the performance of sub tasks, (b) contract retention is maintained, and (c) the Contract Sum is not exceeded; or (iv) such other methods as may be specified in the Schedule of Compensation.

#### 2.4 Invoices.

City shall independently review each invoice submitted by the Consultant to determine whether the work performed and expenses incurred are in compliance with the provisions of this Agreement. Except as to any charges for work performed or expenses incurred by Consultant which are disputed by City, or as provided in Section 7.3, City will use its best efforts to cause Consultant to be paid within forty-five (45) thirty (30) days of receipt of Consultant's correct and undisputed invoice; however, Consultant acknowledges and agrees that due to

City warrant run procedures, the City cannot guarantee that payment will occur within this time period. In the event any charges or expenses are disputed by City, the original invoice shall be returned by City to Consultant for correction and resubmission. However, only that portion of the invoice so contested may be withheld from payment and the undisputed portion will be paid as provided herein. Review and payment by City for any invoice provided by the Consultant shall not constitute a waiver of any rights or remedies provided herein or any applicable law.

## 3.3 Force Majeure.

The time period(s) specified in the Schedule of Performance for performance of the services rendered pursuant to this Agreement shall be extended because of any delays due to unforeseeable causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the Consultant, including, but not restricted to, acts of God or of the public enemy, unusually severe weather, fires, earthquakes, floods, <a href="health-emergencies">health-emergencies</a>, epidemics <a href="health-emergencies">and pandemics</a>, quarantine restrictions, riots, strikes, freight embargoes, wars, litigation, and/or acts of any governmental agency, including the City, if the Consultant shall within ten (10) days of the commencement of such delay notify the Contract Officer in writing of the causes of the delay. The Contract Officer shall ascertain the facts and the extent of delay, and extend the time for performing the services for the period of the enforced delay when and if in the judgment of the Contract Officer such delay is justified. The Contract Officer's determination shall be final and conclusive upon the parties to this Agreement. In no event shall Consultant be entitled to recover damages against the City for any delay in the performance of this Agreement, however caused, Consultant's sole remedy being extension of the Agreement pursuant to this Section.

## 4.1 Representatives and Personnel of Consultant.

It is expressly understood that the experience, knowledge, capability and reputation of the foregoing principals were a substantial inducement for City to enter into this Agreement. Therefore, the foregoing principals shall be responsible during the term of this Agreement for directing all activities of Consultant and devoting sufficient time to personally supervise the services hereunder. All personnel of Consultant, and any authorized agents, shall at all times be under the exclusive direction and control of the Principals. For purposes of this Agreement, the foregoing Principals may not be replaced nor may their responsibilities be substantially reduced by Consultant without the express written approval of City. In the event a Principal becomes unavailable due to separation from employment with Consultant, long-term illness/disability, or death, City may elect to terminate this Agreement or allow Consultant to nominate a replacement with equivalent qualifications for City's approval, which shall not be unreasonably withheld. Additionally, Consultant shall utilize only competent personnel to perform services pursuant to this Agreement. Consultant shall make every reasonable effort to maintain the stability and continuity of Consultant's staff and subcontractors, if any, assigned to perform the services required under this Agreement. Consultant shall notify City of any changes in Consultant's staff and subcontractors, if any, assigned to perform the services required under this Agreement, prior to and during any such performance.

## 5.1 Insurance Coverages.

(e) Subcontractors. Consultant shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and certified endorsements <u>provided by</u> each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall include all of the requirements stated herein.

## 5.2 General Insurance Requirements.

(a) <u>Proof of insurance</u>. Consultant shall provide certificates of insurance to City as evidence of the insurance coverage required herein, along with a waiver of subrogation endorsement for workers' compensation. Insurance certificates and endorsements must be approved by City's Risk Manager prior to commencement of performance. Current certification of insurance shall be kept on file with City at all times during the term of this Agreement. <u>In the event of a claim</u>, City reserves the right to <u>require-review</u> complete, certified copies of all required insurance

policies, redacted to the extent necessary to protect Consultant's confidential or proprietary information, at any time at the Consultant's offices.

- (c) <u>Primary/noncontributing</u>. Coverage provided by Consultant <u>which affords additional insured status</u> shall be primary and any insurance or self-insurance procured or maintained by City shall not be required to contribute with it. The limits of insurance required herein may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non- contributory basis for the benefit of City before the City's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.
- (f) <u>Waiver of subrogation</u>. All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this agreement, <u>except for Professional Liability</u>, shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against City, its elected or appointed officers, <u>authorized</u> agents, officials, <u>and</u> employees <del>and volunteers</del> or shall specifically allow Consultant or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. Consultant hereby waives its own right of recovery against City, and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subconsultants.
- (h) Requirements not limiting. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this section are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for purposes of clarification only as it pertains to a given issue and is not intended by any party or insured to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type. If the Consultant maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.
- (i) <u>Additional insured status</u>. General liability policies shall provide or be endorsed to provide that City and its officers, officials, employees, and <u>authorized</u> agents, <u>and volunteers</u> shall be additional insureds under such policies. This provision shall also apply to any excess/umbrella liability policies.

## 5.3 Indemnification.

To the full extent permitted by law, Consultant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its officers, employees and authorized agents ("Indemnified Parties") against, and will hold and save them and each of them harmless from, any and all-actions, either judicial, administrative, arbitration or regulatory claims, damages to persons or property, losses, costs, penalties, obligations, errors, omissions or liabilities whether actual or threatened (herein "claims or liabilities") that may be asserted or claimed by any person, firm or entity arising out of or in connection with to the extent caused by the negligent performance of the work, operations or activities provided herein of Consultant, its officers, employees, agents, subcontractors, or invitees, or any individual or entity for which Consultant is legally liable ("indemnitors"), or arising from Consultant's or indemnitors' reckless or willful misconduct, or to the extent arising from Consultant's or indemnitors' negligent performance of or failure to perform any term, provision, covenant or condition of this Agreement, and in connection therewith:

- (a) Consultant will defend any action or actions filed in connection with any of said claims or liabilities and will pay all costs and expenses, including legal costs and reasonable attorneys' fees incurred in connection therewith;
- (b) Consultant will promptly pay any judgment rendered against the City, its officers, <u>authorized</u> agents or employees for any such claims or liabilities arising out of or in connection with the negligent performance of or failure to perform such work, operations or activities of Consultant hereunder; and Consultant agrees to save and hold the City, its officers, <u>authorized</u> agents, and employees harmless therefrom;
- (c) In the event the City, its officers, <u>authorized</u> agents or employees is made a party to any action or proceeding filed or prosecuted against Consultant for such damages or other claims arising out of or in connection with the negligent performance of or failure to perform the work, operation or activities of Consultant

hereunder, Consultant agrees to pay to the City, its officers, <u>authorized</u> agents or employees, <u>any and all-costs</u> and expenses incurred by the City, its officers, <u>authorized</u> agents or employees in such action or proceeding, including but not limited to, legal costs and <u>reasonable</u> attorneys' fees.

Consultant shall incorporate similar indemnity agreements with its subcontractors and if it fails to do so Consultant shall be fully responsible to indemnify City hereunder therefore, and failure of City to monitor compliance with these provisions shall not be a waiver hereof. This indemnification includes claims or liabilities arising from any negligent or wrongful act, error or omission, or reckless or willful misconduct of Consultant in the performance of professional services hereunder. The provisions of this Section do not apply to claims or liabilities occurring as a result of City's sole negligence or willful acts or omissions, but, to the fullest extent permitted by law, shall apply to claims and liabilities resulting in part from City's negligence, except that design professionals' indemnity hereunder shall be limited to claims and liabilities to the extent arising out of the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of the design professional. The indemnity obligation shall be binding on successors and assigns of Consultant and shall survive termination of this Agreement.

## 6.3 Ownership of Documents.

All drawings, specifications, maps, designs, photographs, studies, surveys, data, notes, computer files, reports, records, documents and other materials (the "documents and materials") prepared by Consultant, its employees, subcontractors and agents in the performance of this Agreement shall become the property of City upon proper payment for the Consultant's services and shall be delivered to City upon request of the Contract Officer or upon the termination of this Agreement, and Consultant shall have no claim for further employment or additional compensation as a result of the exercise by City of its full rights of ownership use, reuse, or assignment of the documents and materials hereunder. Any use, reuse or assignment of such completed documents for other projects and/or use of uncompleted documents without specific written authorization by the Consultant will be at the City's sole risk and without liability to Consultant, and Consultant's guarantee and warranties shall not extend to such use, reuse or assignment. Consultant may retain copies of such documents for its own use. Consultant shall have the right to use the concepts embodied therein. All subcontractors shall provide for assignment to City of any documents or materials prepared by them, and in the event Consultant fails to secure such assignment, Consultant shall indemnify City for all damages resulting therefrom. Moreover, Consultant with respect to any documents and materials that may qualify as "works made for hire" as defined in 17 U.S.C. § 101, such documents and materials are hereby deemed "works made for hire" for the City.

## 7.2 Disputes; Default.

In the event that Consultant is in default under the terms of this Agreement, the City shall not have any obligation or duty to continue compensating Consultant for any work performed after the date of default. Instead, the City may shall give prompt written notice to Consultant of the default and the reasons for the default. The notice shall include the timeframe in which Consultant may cure the default. This timeframe is presumptively thirty (30) days, but may be extended, though not reduced, if circumstances warrant. During the period of time that Consultant is in default, the City shall hold all invoices and shall, when the default is cured, proceed with payment on the invoices. In the alternative, the City may, in its sole discretion, elect to pay some or all of the

#### 7.3 Retention of Funds.

Consultant hereby authorizes City to deduct from any amount payable to Consultant (whether or not arising out of this Agreement) (i) any amounts the payment of which may be in dispute hereunder or which are necessary to compensate City for any losses, costs, liabilities, or damages suffered by City, and (ii) all amounts for which City may be liable to third parties, by reason of Consultant's negligent acts or omissions in performing or failing to perform Consultant's obligation under this Agreement. In the event that any claim is made by a third party, the amount or validity of which is disputed by Consultant, or any indebtedness shall exist which shall appear to be the basis for a claim of lien, City may withhold from any payment due, without liability for interest because of such withholding, an amount sufficient to cover such claim. The failure of City to exercise such right to deduct or to

withhold shall not, however, affect the obligations of the Consultant to insure, indemnify, and protect City as elsewhere provided herein.

## 7.7 Liquidated Damages.

Since the determination of actual damages for any delay in performance of this Agreement would be extremely difficult or impractical to determine in the event of a breach of this Agreement, the Consultant and its sureties shall be liable for and shall pay to the City the sum of \$ ( Dollars) as liquidated damages for each working day of delay in the performance of any service required hereunder. The City may withhold from any monies payable on account of services performed by the Contractor any accrued liquidated damages. Not used.

## 7.8 Termination Prior to Expiration of Term.

This Section shall govern any termination of this Contract except as specifically provided in the following Section for termination for cause. The City reserves the right to terminate this Contract at any time, with or without cause, upon thirty (30) days' written notice to Consultant, except that where termination is due to the fault of the Consultant, the period of notice may be such shorter time as may be determined by the Contract Officer. In addition, the Consultant reserves the right to terminate this Contract at any time, with or without cause, upon sixty (60) thirty (30) days' written notice to City, except that where termination is due to the fault of the City, the period of notice may be such shorter time as the Consultant may determine. Upon receipt of any notice of termination, Consultant shall immediately cease all services hereunder except such as may be specifically approved by the Contract Officer. Except where the Consultant has initiated termination, the Consultant shall be entitled to compensation for all services rendered prior to the effective date of the notice of termination and for any services authorized by the Contract Officer thereafter in accordance with the Schedule of Compensation or such as may be approved by the Contract Officer, except as provided in Section 7.3. In the event the Consultant has initiated termination, the Consultant shall be entitled to compensation only for the reasonable value of the work product actually produced hereunder. In the event of termination without cause pursuant to this Section, the terminating party need not provide the non-terminating party with the opportunity to cure pursuant to Section 7.2.

## 8.3 Covenant Against Discrimination.

Consultant covenants that, by and for itself, its heirs, executors, assigns, and all persons claiming under or through them, that there shall be no discrimination against or segregation of, any person or group of persons on account of race, color, creed, religion, sex, gender, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, ancestry or other protected class in the performance of this Agreement. Consultant shall take affirmative action to insure ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, creed, religion, sex, gender, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, ancestry or other protected class.

## 9.4 Integration; Amendment.

This Agreement including the attachments hereto is the entire, complete and exclusive expression of the understanding of the parties. It is understood that there are no oral agreements between the parties hereto affecting this Agreement and this Agreement supersedes and cancels any and all previous negotiations, arrangements, agreements and understandings, if any, between the parties, and none shall be used to interpret this Agreement. No amendment to or modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and approved by the Consultant and by the City Council and signed by the parties. The parties agree that this requirement for written modifications cannot be waived and that any attempted waiver shall be void.

## 9.8 Waiver of Consequential Damages.

In no event shall either party or their parent companies, affiliates, and subsidiaries, and their respective directors, officers, and employees be liable to the other for any indirect, incidental, special, consequential, exemplary, or punitive damages of any kind or character, including, without limitation, lost profits, loss of revenue, loss of use, or interruption of business, arising from or relating to this agreement, even if advised of the possibility of such damages.

The specific plan area was the most substantial new growth area added to Yuba County's general plan in 2010 and represents a highly visible and important project for the county. Because AECOM worked on the general plan and EIR, AECOM's staff has an intimate familiarity with local environmental issues, county policies and standards, and the issues that should be the focus of project-level analysis for developments and infrastructure improvements. AECOM was selected, in part, because of its unique ability to provide the county with a predictable, efficient, and cost-effective environmental review of the specific plan. AECOM's policy work has established programmatic mitigation for development and infrastructure projects in Yuba County, including this specific plan, and has established locally relevant CEQA significance thresholds. **CITY AGENDA ITEM:** Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2021-\_\_\_: Authorizing the City Manager to Execute a Professional Services Agreement on the City's Behalf with David Wade and Associates to Process the Development Application for the Highway 12 Logistics Center Project.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There would be no impact to the General Fund. The cost for retaining the firm of David Wade and Associates to act as city staff and process the development application is \$66,000. Staff is requesting a ten percent contingency be added to the contract which would bring the total to \$72,600. This total cost will be fully borne by the developer/applicant.

**STRATEGIC PLAN IMPACT:** Provide Good Governance; Develop Sustainable Economy; Enhance the Environment.

**BACKGROUND:** In 2020, the City received a development application for the Highway 12 Logistics Center Project. The project as submitted would consist of approximately 1.25 million square feet of high-cube industrial development within the City's western Sphere of Influence which is west of the Downtown Suisun City and east of Ledgewood Creek. Due to current workload and the complexity of the proposed project, it is necessary to hire a contract planner to process the entitlements. For this reason, the City circulated a Request for Proposals (RFP) in which six proposals were received:

- AES/Management Advisory Services
- First Carbon Solutions.
- Raney Planning and Management.
- Rincon Consultants Inc.
- Urban Planning Partners.
- Wade Associates.

Following staff's review, Wade Associates was selected due to both his proposal and staff's familiarity in working with him.

**STAFF REPORT:** Below is a listing of the proposed services that Mr. Wade will be providing as a part of this contract. Details to each of the tasks can be found in Attachment 2 of this staff report:

- Review of Proposal Application.
- Comparison of Application to City Policies, Ordinances, and Existing Services.

This contract is for an amount not to exceed \$66,000 plus a 10% contingency (\$6,600) for a grand total of \$72,600.



Total Not to Exceed Labor \$66,000

Wade Associates will bill travel at \$0.575 per mile and a labor rate of one-half the quoted billing rate. Wade will bill materials and expenses at cost plus ten percent. Total materials and expenses shall be in addition to the Total Not to Exceed Labor cost but shall not exceed ten percent of that estimate without additional authorization from the City and the project applicant.

The proposed work will be under a contract with the City of Suisun City, however, it is understood that the project applicant reimburses such work. Wade Associates stipulates that in the event that such reimbursement does not occur, Wade Associates shall not hold the City of Suisun City liable for non-payment of the contract. In the event of non-payment of the contract for a period of 45 days following submittal of a monthly invoice, Wade Associates shall notify the city and cease work.

#### **UNANTICIPATED CONDITIONS**

Wade Associates bases the compensation proposal on the assumptions that:

- There are no legal challenges to the entitlement process, the LAFCO annexation process, the CEQA process, the wetland permitting process, or any other challenge.

The estimated time for completion of the entire process including entitlement including annexation processing and wetland permitting is estimated to be 12 to 18 months.

The master schedule will establish key milestones for assessing progress throughout the entire process. The master schedule will be documented and monitored with Microsoft Project or similar software.

Senior Planner, John Kearns presented the staff report explaining cannabis regulations, appropriate tax rates and user fees over the past few years and as a result Council gave direction for staff to begin working with the Shryne Group.

Council Member Hudson asked if anyone had made contact with Mr. Garcia, who spoke at the last council meeting with concerns of the dispensary's location. Mr. Kearns stated that he had spoken with Mr. Garcia on several occasions who also spoke with the applicant.

# Public Hearing opened

Brian Mitchell, applicant, stated that he has spoken with the neighbor, Mr. Garcia. He explained that landscaping and new fencing would be placed along that border. Mr. Mitchell also stated that they have 9 locations in California and have not had crime at any of their locations.

Donna LeBlanc stated that she hoped large trees would be planted rather than small saplings that would take longer to mature.

Steve Orly stated that with a skeletal police force how does the concept of security belong in this conversation.

City Clerk Skinner read email comment from Aaron Colyer showing support for a cannabis business zone. He is a disable veteran who uses medical marijuana and currently drives 30 minutes to Rio Vista; and this zone would be a benefit to Suisun City.

William Hampton experienced audio difficulties and Mayor Wilson indicated that if he sent an email before close of meeting it would be read into the minutes.

There being no further comments Mayor Wilson closed the Public Hearing.

Mr. Kearns stated that the landscape plans showed the planting of 9 trees and Council could mandate a specific size. He further explained that city required on site security 24-7 and the applicant was proposing more than that requirement to have little or no impact on City Police.

In response to Council Member Hudson's concerns of advertising, street scape Mr. Kearns stated with the fencing, age limitations to access property and 24-hour security school age children will not have access. **FISCAL IMPACT:** Some amount of City staff time will be incurred by the City Manager and planning staff to determine the future zoning of the heavy equipment storage and rental facilities.

**BACKGROUND:** The City has determined that heavy equipment rental and/or storage facilities ("Heavy Equipment Facility") have been established in the City but are currently unregulated by the Suisun Municipal Code. The proposed interim urgency ordinance would establish a temporary moratorium on Heavy Equipment Facilities to allow the City to determine the appropriate zoning regulations for such a use.

**STAFF REPORT:** Heavy Equipment Facilities have been established in the City's Commercial Services and Fabricating (CSF) Zone. Such Heavy Equipment Facility includes the storage and/or rental of heavy equipment, up to and including those used for construction projects, and diesel gasoline distribution facilities. Currently, the Suisun Municipal Code does not provide for any regulation of such Heavy Equipment Facilities.

Government Code Section 65858 expressly authorizes the City Council, in order to protect public health, safety, and welfare, to adopt an interim urgency ordinance prohibiting a use that is in conflict with a contemplated general plan, specific plan, or zoning proposal that the legislative body, planning commission, or the planning department is considering or studying or intends to study within a reasonable time, provided that the urgency measure shall require a four-fifths vote of the legislative body for adoption, and shall be of no further force and effect 45 days from its date of adoption, unless duly extended.

The proposed interim urgency ordinance would establish a temporary moratorium prohibiting Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City and halting the establishment, expansion, or modification of Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City. If the Council adopts the urgency moratorium, it would remain in effect for 45 days. Within that time, staff would begin work on a permanent ordinance to be presented to the Planning Commission. Staff would also return to the Council within 35 days with the required report on steps taken to address the issue. If a new, permanent ordinance could not be adopted within the 45 days, the Council could consider an ordinance extending the moratorium.

# **RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Conduct a Public Hearing on Interim Urgency Ordinance \_\_; and
- 2. Council Adoption of Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_: An Interim Urgency Ordinance of the City of Suisun City Establishing a Temporary 45-Day moratorium Prohibiting Heavy Equipment Storage and/or Rental Facilities and Related Uses and the Establishment, Expansion, or Modification of the Same in the City of Suisun City.

# INTERIM URGENCY ORDINANCE NO. \_\_\_

AN INTERIM URGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUISUN, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING A TEMPORARY 45-DAY MORATORIUM PROHIBITING HEAVY EQUIPMENT STORAGE AND/OR RENTAL FACILITIES AND RELATED USES AND THE ESTABLISHMENT, EXPANSION, OR MODIFICATION OF THE SAME IN THE CITY OF SUISUN CITY

**WHEREAS,** the City of Suisun City ("City") has the police power, pursuant to Article XI, section 7 of the California Constitution, to make and enforce ordinances to regulate the use of land within its jurisdictional boundaries, to the extent such regulations are not in conflict with the general laws of the State of California; and; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 65858 expressly authorizes the City Council, in order to protect public health, safety, and welfare, to adopt an interim urgency ordinance prohibiting a use that is in conflict with a contemplated general plan, specific plan, or zoning proposal that the legislative body, planning commission, or the planning department is considering or studying or intends to study within a reasonable time, provided that the urgency measure shall require a four-fifths vote of the legislative body for adoption, and shall be of no further force and effect 45 days from its date of adoption, unless duly extended; and

**WHEREAS,** Government Code Sections 36934 and 36937 expressly authorize the City Council to enact urgency ordinances, which take effect immediately upon introduction, for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, containing a declaration of the facts constituting the urgency, and which must be passed by a four-fifths vote of the City Council; and,

**WHEREAS,** the City Council of the City of Suisun City has determined that Heavy Equipment Facilities have developed within the City; and,

**WHEREAS**, Heavy Equipment Facilities are not currently addressed within the Commercial Services and Fabricating ("CSF") Zone in the Suisun City Municipal Code, and as such, may be established on a property with minimal regulation or City oversight; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has concerns regarding the potential health and safety effects of Heavy Equipment Facilities when not properly regulated due to the risks associated with unregulated use of heavy equipment and associated diesel gasoline dispensing, as well as the environmental, development, and economic standards applicable to Heavy Equipment Facilities; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds that the potential detrimental impacts of Heavy Equipment Facilities are not addressed by the City's current zoning regulations; and

**WHEREAS**, the City intends to update the Suisun City Municipal Code to further address the potential side effects of Heavy Equipment Facilities, and to ensure that they are properly regulated within the City; and

**WHEREAS**, City staff, the City Planning Commission, and the City Council, each requires a reasonable period of time to study regulations and developments for Heavy Equipment Facilities to determine the potential adverse impacts on the health and safety, environment, traffic, aesthetics, and economic quality of properties within the City, and to make recommendations on appropriate alternative regulations for Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to establish, on an urgency basis, a temporary moratorium prohibiting Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City and halting the establishment, expansion, or modification of Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City through the adoption of this Ordinance to further the purposes stated herein.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUISUN CITY AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** The forgoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

**SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.** As used in this Interim Urgency Ordinance, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

- a. "Establishment" means to bring into existence (a new Heavy Equipment Facility).
- b. "Expansion" means:
  - i. An increase of the total size of the floor area of any existing building area by 10% or more;
  - ii. Any expansion/intensification of a Heavy Equipment Facility;
  - iii. Construction of any new structure on the premises of an existing business;
- c. "Heavy Equipment Facility" means a facility where equipment and/or large vehicles are stored, rented, staged, or in any way used, including large equipment used on construction projects, as well as storage, dispensing, or distribution of fuel or of any other hazardous materials and substances regulated by state and/or federal law..
- d. "Heavy Equipment" means equipment or vehicles exceeding 5000 lbs, not including automobiles, boats, pickup trucks, or recreational vehicles.

- e. "Facility" means a temporary or permanent use of land or use of premises, a building or structure, or part of a building or structure.
- f. "Modification" means making any changes, remodeling, or alterations to an existing building or site that require permits. Modification shall include change in tenant at an existing facility requiring a business license. A change in tenant means any amendment to a lease agreement that extends the term of the lease for more than three years, or a new lease agreement with a term longer than three years.

SECTION 3. IMMEDIATE THREAT. The City Council finds that there is a current and immediate threat to public health, safety, and welfare posed by Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City, due to the insufficiency of regulations under the Suisun City Municipal Code. As stated above, the lack of regulation on Heavy Equipment Facilities poses health and safety risks to surrounding properties due the dangers associated with the unregulated operation of Heavy Equipment Facilities. Heavy Equipment Uses may be in conflict with a contemplated general plan, specific plan, or zoning proposal that the City Council and planning department is considering. This Ordinance is necessary as an urgency measure to address said threats to public health, safety, and welfare.

**SECTION 4. MORATORIUM**. Accordingly, the Suisun City Council hereby adopts a moratorium pursuant to California Government Code Section 65858 prohibiting Heavy Equipment Facilities and halting the establishment, expansion, or modifications of Heavy Equipment Facilities in the City ("Moratorium"). During the Moratorium, Heavy Equipment Facilities are prohibited and the City shall not accept any new applications, or issue any permits or entitlements, for such uses.

SECTION 5. DURATION OF ORDINANCE. This Moratorium is enacted pursuant to the authority conferred upon the City Council of the City of Suisun City by Government Code Section 65858, and therefore shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption by a four-fifths (4/5) vote of the City Council. This Moratorium shall continue in effect for forty-five (45) days from the date of its adoption and shall thereafter be of no further force and effect, unless, after notice pursuant to Government Code Section 65090 and a public hearing, the City Council extends the Moratorium for an additional period of time pursuant to Government Code Section 65858.

**SECTION 6. ENFORCEMENT.** The City may enforce any provision of this Ordinance by mandamus, injunction, or any other appropriate civil remedy in any court of competent jurisdiction.

SECTION 7. CITY ACTION. During the period of this Moratorium, and any extension thereof, the City Manager or his designees shall: (1) review and consider options for the regulation of heavy equipment storage and gasoline dispensing facilities and related uses, and (2) shall issue a written report describing the measures which the City has taken to address the conditions which led to the adoption of this ordinance with the City Council ten (10) days prior the expiration of this Moratorium, or any extension thereof, and (3) shall make said report available to the public.

SECTION 8. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW. Pursuant to Section 15378(b)(5) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), this Ordinance is an organizational or administrative activity of the City that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment, and therefore not a project. Additionally, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3), this Ordinance is exempt from CEQA review because there is no possibility that the Moratorium may have a significant effect on the environment, insofar as it prohibits the construction of or alterations to, Heavy Equipment Facilities within the City. Furthermore, even if the Ordinance is considered a project, the proposed moratorium is categorically exempt under CEQA Guidelines Section 15308, because it is clear that the Moratorium will not create an environmental impact and the action will assure the maintenance, enhancement, or protection of the environment through the eventual adoption of regulations and development standards on Heavy Equipment Facilities. Accordingly, no further environmental review is necessary.

Furthermore, as the Ordinance is an administrative procedure related to uses, facilities, and regulations identified in the Suisun City Municipal Code and General Plan, and given that the proposed Ordinance is not related to a specific project, the Ordinance (i) by virtue of the location of affected improvements, will not impact a sensitive environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern; (ii) will not have a cumulative impact on the environment through successive projects of the same type, in the same place, over time; (iii) does not have any unusual circumstances that will have a significant effect on the environment; (iv) does not impact a scenic highway; (v) is not located on a hazardous waste site; and (vi) will not adversely impact a historical resource. Accordingly, none of the exceptions to categorical exemptions set forth in the CEQA Guidelines, Section 15300.2, apply to this Ordinance.

**SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE**. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately and shall be of no further force and effect forty-five (45) days thereafter unless the City Council extends such Ordinance following a noticed public hearing.

**SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision will not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase not declared invalid or

unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of the ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 11. LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION.** The provisions of these Sections shall be liberally construed as necessary to effectively carry out its purposes, which are hereby found and declared to be in furtherance of the public health, safety and convenience.

**SECTION 12. PUBLICATION.** The City Clerk is directed to cause this Ordinance to be published within 15 days of its passage in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the City of Suisun.

# nterim Urgency Ordinance Orage

# Background

- The City has determined that heavy equipment rental and storage facilities ("Heavy Equipment Facility") have been established in the City, but are currently unregulated by the Suisun City Municipal Code.
- The proposed interim urgency ordinance would establish a temporary moratorium on Heavy Equipment Facilities to allow the City to determine the appropriate zoning regulations for such a use.







# Urgency Ordinance Key Points

- interim urgency ordinance prohibiting a use that is in conflict with the City's require a four-fifths vote of the legislative body for adoption, and shall be of no o Government Code Section 65858 expressly authorizes the City Council to adopt an planning documents or the planning department is considering or studying or intends to study within a reasonable time, provided that the urgency measure shall further force and effect 45 days from its date of adoption, unless duly extended.
- If the Council adopts the urgency moratorium, it would remain in effect for 45 days. During this time staff would begin work on a permanent ordinance.
- Ostaff would return to the Council within 35 days with the required report on steps taken to address the issue.
- If a new, permanent ordinance could not be adopted within the 45 days, the Council could consider an ordinance extending the moratorium.

**CITY AGENDA ITEM:** Elected Official Compensation and Benefits:

1. Discuss and provide direction to staff regarding Budget Ad Hoc Committee recommendations on elected official compensation and benefits.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** There may be a future fiscal impact depending upon direction provided by Council.

**BACKGROUND:** California Government Code Section 36516 provides for a base salary of a maximum of \$300 per month for city councilmembers for cities with Suisun City's population. Government Code Section 36516(c) allows compensation increases above the \$300 per month in an amount up to 5.0 percent for each calendar year from the operative date of the last salary adjustment. On September 3, 1991, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 597, which provided for a \$300 monthly salary for Councilmembers. On May 15, 2007, the City Council increased their salary to \$654.86 by ordinance pursuant to California Government Code Section 36516 and set the vehicle allowance by resolution. No changes to elected officials' salaries have been made since that time. Any changes in Councilmember salaries must be made by ordinance or ordinance amendment.

The City Council may adjust the salaries of the City Clerk and the City Treasurer by ordinance. Such adjustments may not take effect until a "new" Clerk or Treasurer is seated. While state law sets limits on the adjustment of Councilmember salaries, no such limits exist for these two elective offices. Currently, the City Clerk salary is set at \$416 per month and the City Treasurer salary is set at \$200 per month.

**STAFF REPORT:** During the election season last year, Elected Official pay and benefits came up as a recurring discussion point and staff was directed to bring this topic back after the new year for discussion and direction. Here is a summary of current Elected Official pay and benefits:

In addition, Councilmembers receive medical coverage benefits and life insurance benefits equal to regular city employees. Councilmembers can either receive the equivalent of the "Kaiser rate" towards selecting healthcare or can receive an in-lieu payment of \$500/month (single) or

\$700/month (family). Councilmembers also receive \$330 per month in deferred compensation and can opt-in to CalPERS or PARS, which the City pays for.

The City Clerk and City Treasurer also qualify for medical coverage and life insurance benefits, but not deferred compensation. In addition to direct pay and benefit costs, the City also bears the expense for Medicare and Workers Comp insurance for all elected officials.

The total cost in 2021 for pay and benefits for the City Council is expected to be \$145,658. The total cost in 2021 for pay and benefits for City Clerk and City Treasurer is expected to be \$37,571. Actual costs depend upon what benefits an elected official decides upon, but are expected to run between \$15,305 per year to \$37,426 per year.

**Healthcare benefit:** The cost of healthcare is the single highest cost, potentially running as high as \$25,385 per year per elected official who selects the family level of coverage. The following are the coverage payment levels:

- Kaiser Rate Single \$9,763.68
- Kaiser Rate +1 Dependent \$19,527.36/yr
- Kaiser Rate +2 Dependents \$25,385/yr
- In-lieu Single \$500
- In-lieu Family \$700

# **Comparisons to Other Solano County Cities:**

Staff reached out to the other cities in Solano County and reviewed various available documents to compare Elected Official Pay and Benefits and the chart is attached. Vallejo appears to have the highest Councilmember salaries. Suisun City has the most generous healthcare and retirement benefits. Benicia appears to have the highest paid elected City Clerk and also appears to provide health insurance benefits to the elected City Clerk. Suisun City and Fairfield appear to be the only cities to offer health insurance to the elected City Treasurer. However, it has been difficult to get information from some cities regarding elected official benefits.

### **Ad Hoc Committee Recommendations:**

Salary: The Ad Hoc recommends no immediate change to Council salary, but does recommend a change to the City Clerk and the City Treasurer. Ad hoc recommends the City Clerk salary be set at 50% of Council salary and that the City Treasurer salary be set at 25% of Council salary. This recommendation would reduce the Clerk salary from \$4,992 per year (\$416/month) to \$3,929.16 per year (\$327/43/month) and would reduce the Treasurer salary from \$2,400 per year (\$200/month) to \$1,964.58 per year (\$163.72/month). In addition, the Ad hoc recommends that the Council salary be reviewed on an annual basis during the budget process to consider increasing the Council salary by the CPI, not to exceed 5% per year. Council would not be obligated to increase salary, but if they did it would apply to the City Clerk salary and City Treasurer salary as well. Per Government Code, the increase would not take effect until new terms begin. The reduction in the City Clerk and City Treasurer salaries would save approximately \$1,500 per year once the current officials' terms expire in 2024.

<u>Vehicle Allowance:</u> The Ad hoc recommends no change to the Council vehicle allowances, but did recommend that the City Clerk and City Treasurer not receive a vehicle allowance but would be eligible for mileage reimbursement as allowed by the city travel policy. This action could take effect at any time designated by Council and would save approximately \$1,200 per year.

Medical Insurance: The Ad hoc recommends reducing the medical insurance benefit for Council members to 75% of the applicable (single/family) Kaiser rate rather than the current 100% of the applicable Kaiser rate and setting the "in-lieu" rate to 45% of the City-paid portion of the family Kaiser rate. For example, 75% of the current Kaiser family rate of \$18,936/year is \$14,202 so the City would now pay \$14,202 rather than \$18,936 toward an eligible Councilmember's health insurance cost. The in-lieu would also be reduced to \$6,390.90 per year from the current \$8,400 per year. A single Councilmember would see a slight increase from \$6,000 per year.

The Ad hoc also recommends that medical insurance and in-lieu payments be eliminated as a benefit for the City Treasurer position. The Ad hoc further recommends that these changes to the health insurance plans go into effect as of July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021 but that no changes to premiums for those on the health plan as of June 30<sup>th</sup> take place through December 31<sup>st</sup> so as not to adversely impact any elected official currently on the medical plan until after the next open enrollment period.

It is difficult to determine the exact savings since each elected official makes their own election whether to take the health insurance benefit or the in-lieu. The potential savings, assuming every elected official were to take the maximum benefit, is approximately \$61,542. This savings assumes a \$4,734 savings per Councilmember by reducing the health insurance payment to 75% of the Kaiser rate and a savings of up to \$25,385 by eliminating the Treasurer medical insurance benefit.

<u>Deferred Compensation:</u> The Ad hoc recommends that the City no longer pay \$330/month toward Council deferred compensation. This action could take effect at any time designated by Council and would save approximately \$19,800 per year.

<u>PERS/PARS</u> and Other Available Programs: The Ad hoc recommends that the City not pay anything above any required City contribution and that any "employee share" be paid by the elected official rather than the City. This action could take effect at any time designated by Council, but is difficult to determine the exact savings since each elected official makes their own election whether to participate in various programs. However, this action could potentially save up to approximately \$3,000 per year by the City not paying the employee's share of the Employer Paid Member Contributions to CalPERS, assuming all Councilmembers participated in CalPERS.

The overall fiscal impact of the recommendations of the Ad hoc committee would provide significant future savings. Theoretically, the recommendations could provide up to \$87,000 in annual savings if every elected official were taking the maximum benefit. That is not currently the case and the estimated savings in the short term based on existing benefits taken is around \$32,000 per year in the medical benefit and an additional \$25,000 in other benefits for a total of approximately \$57,000 per year.

# **STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the City Council:

**CITY AGENDA ITEM:** Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2021-\_\_: Resolution of the City Council of the City of Suisun City Authorizing the City Manager to execute the First Amendment of the Public Private Partnership (PPP) Agreement for Advanced Life Support (ALS) First Responder Emergency Services by and among the Cities of Fairfield, Benicia, Dixon, Vallejo, Suisun City (Member Cities) and Medic Ambulance Service, Inc.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** Currently, Suisun City is not a Member City of the PPP Agreement. If the Agreement is approved by the City Council, payments will be received quarterly on 1/15, 4/15, 7/15, and 10/15. The allocation for Suisun City will amount to \$66,712 in FY 20/21, \$183,413 in FY 21/22, \$227,460 in FY 22/23, \$248,179 in FY 23/24 and \$206,816 in FY 24/25. The current agreement expires on April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

**STRATEGIC PLAN:** Ensure Public Safety by pursuing cost recovery for first-responder medical calls. Ensure fiscal solvency by identifying new revenue options for consideration by Council.

**BACKGROUND:** Since 2000, Medic Ambulance Service, Inc. has been an authorized provider of ALS services within Solano County under Health and Safety Code section 1797.224 pursuant to a Master Services Agreement entered into with the Solano Emergency Medical Services Cooperative (SEMSC). In connection with entering into the Master Services Agreement, Medic Ambulance Service, Inc. also entered into the PPP Agreement with the participating Member Cities, under which these cities have provided ALS first response emergency service to their communities in order to improve the quality and level of emergency medical services.

**STAFF REPORT:** In 2010, Medic Ambulance Service, Inc. commenced a new county-wide exclusive contract for emergency ambulance services and new PPP agreement to reflect conditions at the time of the contract. The agreement was set to expire on April 30, 2020 but, pursuant to an amendment to the Master Agreement, SEMSC granted Medic Ambulance Service, Inc. an extension of the Master Agreement to April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The First Amendment to the PPP Agreement will implement changes to the agreement that both Medic Ambulance Service, Inc. and the participating Member Cities find necessary to fulfill the purpose of the partnership. Furthermore, the First Amendment of the PPP will add the City of Suisun City as a participating Member City and a party to the PPP Agreement. The First Amendment was approved by the Solano Emergency Medical Service Cooperative Joint Powers Authority on December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

**RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2021-Authorizing the City Manager to execute the First Amendment of the Public Private Partnership (PPP) Agreement for Advanced Life Support (ALS) First Responder Emergency Services by and among the Cities of Fairfield, Benicia, Dixon, Vallejo, Suisun City (Member Cities) and Medic Ambulance Service, Inc.

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# FIRST AMENDMENT TO PUBLIC PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT FOR ALS FIRST RESPONDER EMERGENCY SERVICES

This First Amendment to the Public Private Partnership Agreement for ALS First Responder Emergency Services, dated April 30, 2010, and hereafter referred to as the PPP Agreement is entered into on this 1st day of January, 2021 by and among Medic Ambulance Service, Inc., a California corporation ("Medic") and the Cities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, and Vallejo which are all existing parties to the PPP Agreement and the City of Suisun City which is being added to the PPP Agreement by this amendment (the "Participating Member Cities").

### **RECITALS**

- 1. Since 2000, Medic has been an authorized provider of ALS services within the Solano County EMS system under Health and Safety Code section 1797.224 pursuant to a written agreement (the "Master Agreement"), entered into with the Solano Emergency Medical Services Cooperative ("SEMSC"). In connection with entering into the Master Agreement for such services, Medic also entered into a Public Private Partnership Agreement with the Participating Member Cities (except the City of Suisun City) under which these cities have provided ALS first response emergency service to their communities in order to improve the quality and level of emergency medical services.
- 2. On May 1, 2010, Medic commenced a new county-wide exclusive contract for Emergency Ambulance Services. The 2010 Master Agreement between SEMSC and Medic required Medic to enter into a new, updated Public Private Partnership Agreement with the Participating Member Cities (except the City of Suisun City). The 2010 Public Private Partnership Agreement was entered into on May 1, 2010 to reflect the conditions at that time and to enhance the delivery of emergency medical services in Solano County.
- 3. The 2010 Master Agreement was set to expire on April 30, 2020. Pursuant to an amendment to the Master Agreement, SEMSC granted Medic an extension of this Master Agreement to April 30, 2025. There have been significant changes in the demands for the delivery of emergency medical services in Solano County in the last 10 years, including a significant increase in the level of medical calls required to be responded to by Medic and the Participating Member Cities.
- 4. This Amendment No. 1 to the PPP Agreement will implement changes to the Agreement that both Medic and the Participating Member Cities find necessary and desirable to achieve the purposes of the partnership.
- 5. In addition, this Amendment No. 1 to the PPP Agreement will add the City of Suisun City as a Participating Member City and a party to the PPP Agreement.

### **AGREEMENT**

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree to amend the PPP Agreement as follows:

1. Section 5(e)(ii) of the PPP Agreement is hereby amended to read:

"The value of Medic's annual dollar allocation to the Public Private Partnership shall be calculated according to the formulas below on the corresponding effective dates:

January 1, 2021: \$91.51 (Value of Unit Hour) x 23,768 hours (Unit Hour Reduction)=\$2,174,990.00 (Cost Savings)

July 1, 2021: \$107.58 (Value of Unit Hour) x 23,768 hours (Unit Hour Reduction)=\$2,556,878.60 (Cost Savings)

January 1, 2022: \$135.69 (Value of Unit Hour) x 23,768 hours (Unit Hour Reduction)=\$3,225,183.65 (Cost Savings)

January 1, 2023: \$160.67 (Value of Unit Hour) x 23,768 hours (Unit Hour Reduction)=\$3,818,755.20 (Cost Savings)

("Annual Dollar Allocation")"

2. Section 5(e)(iv) of the PPP Agreement is hereby amended to read:

"As provided in Section 7(a) of this Agreement, the term of this Agreement shall coincide with the term of the Master Agreement, including any extensions thereof."

3. Section 5(e)(v) of the PPP Agreement is hereby amended to read:

"Medic shall pay the Annual Dollar Allocation in quarterly installments to the Participating Member Cities, pursuant to the above formula and in the manner provided below, by no later than the 15th day of April, July, October and January of each year during the term of this Agreement. Payment shall be made by Medic directly to the City of Fairfield for disbursement to the Participating Member Cities in the amounts set forth in Exhibit C attached hereto. Fairfield shall make the quarterly payments to the Participating Member Cities within fifteen days of receipt of payment from Medic. Any reduction in the Annual Dollar Allocation made with respect to a defaulting city pursuant to Section 4(h) of this Agreement shall be applied by Fairfield to the defaulting city only. Fairfield shall deduct from the total amount of monies paid quarterly by Medic to the Participating Member Cities, an administrative charge to cover the costs of Fairfield being the administering party under this Agreement. The quarterly administrative charge shall be in the sum of \$7,500.

4. Effective January 1, 2021, the City of Suisun City shall become a Participating Member City and Party to this Agreement. By executing this Amendment No. 1, City of Suisun City agrees to be bound by and comply with all of the provisions of the PPP Agreement as amended.

- 5. If a local or state emergency is declared for a natural disaster or pandemic that results in a material decrease in transport volume and revenues, Medic shall provide written notice to the Participating Member Cities within 45 days of this event occurring. Upon giving such notice, Medic will provide a call and revenue comparison to demonstrate the materiality of the reduction in calls and revenues that would justify an adjustment in the payment obligations of Medic under this Agreement limited to the duration of the emergency. The parties will meet within 10 days of the notice to attempt to address the loss of funding in a mutually satisfactory manner. No payment modification shall be effective unless approved in writing by all of the Parties.
  - 6. This Amendment No. 1 shall become effective January 1, 2021.

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# PUBLIC PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT FOR ALS FIRST RESPONDER EMERGENCY SERVICES

This Public Private Partnership Agreement ("Agreement") is entered by and between Medic Ambulance Service, Inc., a California corporation ("Medic"), and the Cities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield and Vallejo, Members of the Solano Emergency Medical Services Cooperative ("Participating Member Cities"), with reference to the following facts:

### **RECITALS**

- 1. Since 2000, Medic has been an authorized provider of ALS services within the Solano County EMS system under Health and Safety Code section 1797.224 pursuant to the Agreement for Advanced Life Support Emergency Ambulance and ParaHospital Medical Services (the "Master Agreement"), entered into with the Solano Emergency Medical Services Cooperative ("SEMSC"). In connection with entering into the Master Agreement for such services, Medic also entered into a Public Private Partnership Agreement with the Participating Member Cities under which these cities have provided ALS first response emergency service to their communities in order to improve the quality and level of emergency medical services.
- 2. On or about -\_\_\_\_\_\_, by action of the SEMSC Board and following a competitive process to select the provider for emergency ambulance service, advanced life support and Parahospital Medical Services, Medic was awarded the new county-wide exclusive contract for Emergency Ambulance Services as the authorized exclusive provider of all 911 and ALS services within the Solano County EMS system. The Master Agreement between the SEMSC and Medic has therefore been renewed pursuant to the provision set forth as Exhibit "A" hereto.

- 3. As part of the renewal of the Master Agreement, Medic is required to enter into a Public Private Partnership (PPP) Agreement with those fire jurisdictions desiring to participate in a PPP with Medic by accepting responsibility for providing EMT-P first response. The Participating Member Cities desire to enter into a new Public Private Partnership Agreement based on the experience of the parties under the existing agreement.
- 4. Medic and the Participating Member Cities are mutually interested in continuing to provide quality prehospital emergency medical care in their communities and pursuant to the protocols and policies of the Solano County Emergency Medical Service Agency and believe that the relationship continued and modified by this Agreement will help them achieve this goal. Pursuant to this Agreement, therefore, Participating Member Cities will continue to provide paramedic first response and Medic will provide ALS transport services within the Participating Member Cities.

## **AGREEMENT**

NOW THEREFORE, the parties thereto agree as follows:

# 1. <u>Definitions</u>

- (a) <u>Advanced Life Support (ALS)</u>: Special services designed to provide definitive prehospital emergency medical care as defined in Health and Safety Code section 1797.52.
- (b) <u>Basic Life Support (BLS)</u>: Emergency first aid and cardiopulmonary procedures defined in Health and Safety Code section 1797.60.
- (c) <u>Emergency Medical Technician One or EMT-I</u>: Personnel as defined in Health and Safety Code section 1797.80.

- (d) <u>Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic or EMT-P or Paramedic:</u>
  Personnel as defined in Health and Safety Code section 1797.84.
- (e) <u>First Responder ALS Unit</u>: A unit staffed and equipped with a minimum of one California State licensed and Solano County accredited Paramedic capable of providing ALS at the scene of medical emergencies.

# 2. Purpose of this Agreement

The purpose of this Agreement is to continue provide high quality, cost effective prehospital medical services in the communities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield and Vallejo pursuant to a relationship between the Participating Member Cities and Medic as described herein. Medic shall provide emergency ambulance service with ALS vehicles staffed by one emergency medical technician (EMT-I) and one EMT-Paramedic and the Participating Member Cities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield and Vallejo shall provide paramedic first response within their jurisdictions.

# 3. Relationship between Medic and the Participating Member Cities

It is understood that this Agreement is by and between independent contractors and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association. The parties shall have full autonomy and responsibility for conducting their affairs with their work force, including managing personnel and resources fairly and effectively in a manner that assures compliance with this Agreement.

# 4. <u>Responsibilities of Participating Member Cities for ALS First Responder Program</u>

The Participating Member Cities shall provide ALS emergency response within their jurisdictions 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, subject to the response time

exceptions approved by the SEMSC in the ALS Non-Transport Agreements with the Participating Member Cities, using a currently licensed and locally accredited EMT-Paramedic in each paramedic response vehicle under appropriate clinical supervision. In connection with the ALS First Responder Program, Participating Member Cities also shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- (a) <u>Paramedic Accreditation and Training</u>: Participating Member Cities shall employ appropriately licensed and accredited EMT-Paramedic personnel. Each EMT-Paramedic shall comply with all training requirements established by the State of California EMS Authority, the County of Solano, all applicable provisions of the Emergency Medical Services System and the Prehospital Emergency Medical Care Personnel Act (California Health and Safety Code section 1797, et seq.), the regulations of the State EMS Authority and all applicable policies and procedures adopted by the Solano County EMS Agency.
- (b) ICS Training: All Medic employees shall receive Incident Command Training at the appropriate levels for their duties as required by the National Incident Management System (NIMS). While the lower level basic courses such as I100 and I200 are available on-line to Medic, the Participating Member Cities agree to provide instructors for the more advanced courses such as ICS 300 and ICS 400, as needed, at no charge to Medic. There shall be a minimum of one ISC 300 and one ICS 400 course offered as needed. The parties will discuss and agree upon the date, location and frequency of these courses.
- (c) <u>Patient Information</u>: Participating Member Cities shall record patient information as set forth in the policy and procedures of the Solano County EMS Agency,

including but not necessarily limited to EMS Policy Memorandum 6141, attached hereto as Exhibit F, and as subsequently modified by the Solano County EMS Agency, for each patient response made by the respective Participating Member Cities. Participating Member Cities shall retain such information and forms for at least seven (7) years and shall provide such forms to the Solano County EMS Agency as required by policy and to Medic upon request.

- (d) <u>Instructional and Educational Programs</u>: Participating Member Cities shall ensure that their EMT-Paramedics are advised of all ongoing instruction and educational opportunities timely noticed by Medic and provided by Medic and they shall cause their EMT-Paramedics to reasonably participate in those ongoing programs to the extent permitted by law.
- (e) <u>Compliance with Master Agreement</u>: The Participating Member Cities shall comply with the applicable requirements of the Master Agreement as necessary to permit Medic to comply with its obligations under the Master Agreement. Medic shall be excused for nonperformance under this Agreement to the extent that such nonperformance is caused by the Participating Member Cities' failure to comply with the Master Agreement, including all pertinent policies and procedures of the Solano County EMS Agency applicable to the Participating Member Cities.
- (f) <u>Core Businesses</u>: During the term of this Agreement, the Participating Member Cities shall not utilize the factors of production funded by Medic hereunder (i.e., vehicles, equipment, supplies or personnel), except as specifically provided in this Agreement to render services similar to the core businesses currently engaged in by Medic or which become part of the core businesses engaged in by Medic or any commonly

controlled or successor entity in such jurisdiction; provided, however, that the parties shall explore and consider ways in which they may collaborate and/or establish other agreements where feasible to provide additional health care services to the communities they serve. The core business of Medic is medical transportation.

- (g) <u>Supplies and Equipment</u>: Each ALS response vehicle of the Participating Member Cities shall carry such emergency supplies and equipment as may be required by the Solano County EMS Agency in order to render ALS first paramedic response to patients as contemplated by this Agreement. Vehicles, equipment and supplies shall be maintained in a clean, sanitary and safe mechanical condition at all times.
- (h) <u>EMS Policies and Procedures</u>: The ALS First Responder Program shall be subject to and shall conform to the requirements of the State EMS Act and Regulations, all applicable medical standards and all Solano County EMS policies, procedures and protocols including response time requirements.
- (i) Performance Standards: The SEMSC and the Solano County EMS Agency have established certain performance standards for ALS First Response Providers to be set forth in the Master Agreement and the ALS Non-Transport Agreements with each of the Participating Member Cities (Exhibits "B-1,", "B-2", "B-3" and B-4" hereto and incorporated herein by this reference) which shall be in force and effect upon implementation of this Agreement. Any modifications to any of these agreements shall be promptly delivered to the other party. Each of the Participating Member Cities agrees to comply with the applicable Solano County EMS Agency policy memoranda, including but not limited to EMS Policy Memorandum 6141 regarding the transfer of care, as is established in the Master Agreement, all applicable EMS Policy and Procedure directives,

and all applicable State of California and federal laws and regulations. Further, it is understood and agreed that this Agreement shall only become effective upon the execution by each of the Participating Member Cities of the ALS Non-Transport Agreement with The response time for the Participating Member Cities shall be seven minutes, ninety percent of the time (the "Response Time Standard"). In the event that there is a chronic failure by any one or more of the Participating Member Cities to meet its Response Time Standard, Medic shall be entitled to a reduction in the Annual Dollar Allocation as determined by the SEMSC after consultation with Medic only with respect to the defaulting city and only to the extent that the chronic failure results in increased costs to Medic. . Before any reduction is ordered by the SEMSC, the defaulting City shall first be provided written notice of the chronic failure by the SEMSC and given an opportunity to cure the default as provided by the ALS Non-Transport Agreement. In the event that the defaulting city fails to timely cure the chronic default, and the SEMSC requires Medic to shorten its response time standard in the defaulting city, the SEMSC shall determine the amount of the reduction in the Annual Dollar Allocation for such city based on the amount of the increased costs to Medic that the SEMSC finds were caused by the chronic failure, using the value of the Unit Hour (from time to time adjusted) as set forth in this Agreement, and considering Medic's System Status Plan. Chronic failure by any Participating Member City shall be defined as the failure to meet the Response Time Standard in three of five consecutive calendar months or four months in any calendar year within its jurisdiction. The Annual Dollar Allocation for the defaulting city shall be restored to the amount provided by this Agreement when the defaulting city cures the default by demonstrating compliance with the Response Time Standards for three consecutive months and the

SEMSC allows Medic to increase its response time back to twelve (12) minutes within the defaulting city's jurisdiction. Payment to the defaulting city shall then be restored in the following month. The right to obtain a reduction in the Annual Dollar Allocation with respect to the defaulting city shall be the exclusive remedy that Medic shall have against the defaulting city for failing to meet the Response Time Standard other than termination of the Agreement with respect to the defaulting city pursuant to Section 7 of this Agreement.

- (j) <u>Supervision</u>: Participating Member Cities shall provide and be responsible for, within their jurisdictions, all supervision to all fire department ALS first response paramedics twenty-four hours (24) per day, 365 days per year under the guidance, directives and policies of the Solano County EMS Agency.
- (k) <u>Cooperation</u>: Participating Member Cities agree to cooperate in a timely manner with all reasonable requests for information and assistance as may be necessary in order for Medic to comply with the terms and conditions of the Master Agreement, policy and procedure guidelines of the Solano County EMS Agency and applicable State of California and federal laws and regulations.
- (l) <u>Accreditation Records</u>: The Participating Member Cities shall be responsible for maintaining licensing, accreditation and continuing education records certifying course completion for their personnel according to the provisions of relevant State of California and federal laws and regulations and applicable Solano County standards as may be imposed. These records shall be available to Medic upon request.
- (m) <u>Access to Participating Member Cities' Records</u>: Participating member Cities agree to provide to authorized representatives of Medic, to the SEMSC and

to any federal or State of California department having monitoring or reviewing authority, upon reasonable notice pursuant to this Agreement, access to and the right to examine and audit all records and documents necessary to determine Participating Member Cities' compliance with the relevant federal, state and local statutes, rules and regulations and this Agreement and to evaluate the quality, appropriateness, and timeliness of the services performed by the Participating Member Cities under this Agreement, provided, however, that Medic shall comply with the applicable laws governing confidentiality.

## 5. Responsibilities of Medic

Medic shall provide, under the Master Agreement, an Emergency Ambulance Service Program throughout the geographical limits of Solano County, excluding the City of Vacaville and Travis Air Force Base, and the territory of Solano County known generally as Zone C, which will include continuous, uninterrupted emergency ambulance response using vehicles staffed by one paramedic and one Emergency Medical Technician - 1 (EMT-I). In connection with the Emergency Ambulance Services Program, Medic shall have the following additional duties and responsibilities:

- (a) <u>Compliance with Master Agreement</u>: Medic shall comply with the Master Agreement in a manner that permits the Participating Member Cities to comply with their obligations under this Agreement.
- (b) <u>Training Programs</u>: Medic shall provide at no cost to the Participating Member Cities, ALS and BLS continuing education for all Participating Member Cities' full time, paid paramedics. The level of training shall be sufficient to maintain licensing requirements (currently forty-eight (48) hours every two (2) years) and applicable Solano County accreditation requirements. Although the list of courses is subject to change over

the term of this Agreement, the course offerings shall at a minimum include any courses required by the Solano County EMS or the State of California EMSA. Required certification courses, including but not limited to CPR, ACLS, PALS and PHTLS, shall be taught through an applicable recognized training authority such as the American Heart Association, the American Red Cross, and the National Safety Council. In addition, the courses shall be recognized by the Solano County EMS. The training programs also shall include regular orientation programs for newly purchased equipment. To the extent possible, Medic agrees to incorporate innovative teaching methods into its training programs, including the use of video conferencing when appropriate to the course taught, and as authorized by the course certifying authority and which Participating Member Cities will make available at their fire facilities. Medic shall continue to use on-line advertisement and enrollment for EMS continuing education courses. Paramedics from the Participating Member Cities may utilize this on-line course enrollment system at no cost. Medic shall not be responsible for paying Participating Member Cities' paramedics for their training time.

(c) <u>Emergency Medical Service Supplies</u>: Medic shall exchange all disposable supplies (including backboards) with the Participating Member Cities' first responder paramedics on a one-for-one basis, for those supplies directly used on the patient, when Medic jointly responds to a medical call. Supplies that are consumed through training or shrinkage will be the responsibility of the Participating Member Cities. On the first weekday of each month, Medic will rotate ALS medications with the Participating Member Cities that are within nine (9) months of their expiration date (excluding narcotic medications). Medic and the Participating Member Cities shall stock identical patient

backboards for ease of field exchange and retrieval. A medical supply committee will be formed consisting of representatives from Medic and the Participating Member Cities in order to enhance medical equipment standardization, joint purchasing and field restocking.

(d) <u>Value Added:</u> Medic shall provide required ALS backup as needed on a city-by-city basis pursuant to the requirements, including response times, of the Master Agreement. Medic shall respond with a supervisor certified to the NIMS I400 level to all mass casualty incidents. Within 90 days of the execution of this agreement, Medic and the Participating Member Cities shall meet and confer for the purpose of reaching an agreement regarding Code 3 notification requirements.

#### (e) <u>Payment to Participating Member Cities</u>:

Cities reflects the estimated costs savings to Medic under the Master Agreement due to the first response of the Participating Member Cities under this Agreement. The SEMSC has approved the continuation of an increase in the urban response time for Medic, from nine (9) minutes to twelve (12) minutes or less, ninety percent (90%) of the time, with a fifteen (15) minute maximum in the Participating Member Cities. Consistent with the RFP issued by the SEMSC on or about November 2008, Medic developed a System Status Deployment Plan (SSDP) in the jurisdictions of the Participating Member Cities which allows for reduced response times in those jurisdictions. As a result of this reduction in response time requirements in the Participating Member jurisdictions, Medic has determined that fewer ambulances will be required and fewer employees will be necessary to service the Participating Member Cities than would otherwise be required if Medic was the first responder in these jurisdictions, and that those reductions will result in a reduction in the

cost of doing business by Medic in those communities only. Medic has estimated that as a result of those changes to its System Status Deployment Plan in the jurisdictions of the Participating Member Cities, there will be an estimated 17,000 unit hours saved each year. Medic has further estimated that the value of a unit hour is currently approximately \$86.51. The parties recognize that an exact figure is impossible to calculate, but this is the best estimate of the actual numbers which the parties agree will be utilized upon implementation of the Public Private Partnership and during the term of the this Agreement except as otherwise set forth herein.

It is further understood and acknowledged by the parties hereto that adjustments in the System Status Deployment Plan may be necessary from time to time. Medic shall be solely responsible for making those modifications and in making those determinations, the primary concern shall be the health and well-being of the members of the communities and the ability of Medic to reasonably comply with all terms of the Master Agreement, and in particular, the response time requirements of the Master Agreement. However, no adjustments to the Annual Dollar Allocation as set forth herein shall result from any adjustment or modification to the System Status Deployment Plan by Medic except as specifically provided by Section 5(e)(iii).

(ii) The value of Medic's annual dollar allocation to the Public Private Partnership has therefore been calculated according to the following formula:

\$86.51 (Value of Unit Hour) x 17,000 hours (Unit Hour Reduction) = \$1,470,670 (Cost Savings)

("Annual Dollar Allocation")

(iii) The Annual Dollar Allocation shall be distributed to the Participating Member Cities in the manner provided by a written agreement between them

and the SEMSC, attached hereto as Exhibit C. The parties agree that following implementation of this Agreement, the Annual Dollar Allocation to the Participating Member Cities shall be subject to modification upward or downward only under the following circumstances:

- (a) Any Participating Member City is removed from participation in the PPP for any reason after implementation of this Agreement. The adjustment shall be based on the allocation previously made to the removed City pursuant to the agreement between the Participating Member Cities and the SEMSC described above;
- Status Deployment Plan within the area(s) serviced by the Member Cities as required to comply with the response time standards of the Master Agreement or any additional requirements imposed by the SEMSC, state, or local government, which changes result in the need to increase the unit hours required in the Participating Member Cities. In that event, Medic shall notify the Participating Member Cities in writing of the proposed adjustment and the parties shall timely meet and confer in good faith to negotiate revised unit hours required to meet Medic's obligations under the Master Agreement. If the parties are unable to mutually agree on the revised unit hours, the matter shall be submitted to the SEMSC for its final determination as to whether the unit hours are required to be adjusted to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Master Agreement. The decision of the SEMSC shall be considered final and conclusive by the parties.
  - (c) Increases required by subsection (iv) below.
- (iv) The Master Agreement has a term of five years and is subject to one five-year extension. As provided in Section 7(a) of this Agreement, the term of this

Agreement shall coincide with the term of the Master Agreement, including any extensions thereof. During the initial five year term of this Agreement and any extension thereof, the Annual Dollar Allocation shall be adjusted in any year in which Medic receives a cost of living increase in compensation under the Master Agreement and on the effective date of that increase, by the increase, if any, in the Consumer Price Index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor for All Urban Consumers, for the San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose Metropolitan Statistical Area, All Items (1982-1984=100) measured from the commencement of this Agreement or the time of the last adjustment, whichever is later.

(v) Medic shall pay the Annual Dollar Allocation in quarterly installments to the Participating Member Cities, pursuant to the above formula and in the manner provided below, by no later than the 15th day of April, July, October and January of each year during the term of this Agreement. The first payment made under this Agreement shall be prorated and calculated at the rate set forth in the existing PPP Agreement for that period up to implementation of this Agreement, and at the increased Annual Dollar Allocation under this Agreement for that period beginning only upon the implementation of this Agreement. Payment shall be made directly to the SEMSC for disbursement to the Participating Member Cities in the amounts set forth in the agreement between the SEMSC and the Participating Member Cities, attached hereto as Exhibit C. SEMSC shall make the quarterly payments to the Participating Member Cities within fifteen days of receipt of payment from Medic. Any reduction in the Annual Dollar Allocation made with respect to a defaulting city pursuant to Section 4(h) of this Agreement shall be applied by SEMSC to the defaulting city only.

#### 6. <u>Joint Responsibilities</u>:

- (a) The parties hereto shall reasonably cooperate with each other in establishing communication protocols which allow for the success and efficiency of the ALS First Responder Program.
- (b) The parties shall actively participate in Solano County EMS Agency committees established by the Solano County EMS Agency or Medic, including but not necessarily limited to, performance improvement, CQI or review committees for the purpose of ensuring that the purposes of this Agreement are met.
- (c) The parties shall maintain and preserve all records relating to this Agreement and all records relating to the care and treatment of patients for a period of four (4) years from the termination date of this Agreement or for such longer period as may be required by Section 4(c) of this Agreement, the Master Agreement, the Solano County EMS Agency or applicable law or regulation.
- (d) The parties shall observe and comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes, and regulations of governmental agencies, including federal, state and municipal and local governing bodies, having jurisdiction over the scope of services or any part hereof, including the provisions of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1979 and all amendments thereto, and all applicable federal, state, municipal and local safety regulations. All services performed by the parties must be in accordance with these laws, ordinances, codes and regulations. The parties shall indemnify and save harmless each other from any and all liabilities, fines, penalties and consequences resulting from their own noncompliance or violations of such laws, ordinances, codes and regulations.

#### 7. Term and Termination

- (a) <u>Term</u>: The term of this Agreement shall be coterminous with the Master Agreement between Medic and the SEMSC, including any extensions that may be granted, subject to earlier termination as provided herein.
- (b) <u>Termination for Breach</u>: In addition to any other rights and remedies that either party may have at law or in equity, this Agreement may be terminated by either party for material breach by the other party, if such breach is not cured after written notice and an opportunity to cure is given in the manner provided by the terms of this Agreement.
- (c) <u>Material Breach</u>: The following conditions and circumstances shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement:
- (i) As to the Participating Member Cities: Operation by Participating Member Cities of the First Responder ALS Program in a manner which causes Medic to be in material breach of the Master Agreement.
- (ii) As to the Participating Member Cities: Failure to adhere to the Response Time Standard.
- (iii) As to Medic: Failure of Medic to make the payments to the SEMSC as described in Section 5(f) of this Agreement for a period of 45 days.
- (iv) As to Medic: Termination by SEMSC of the Master Agreement for breach by Medic; provided, however, that Medic shall not be in breach of this Agreement to the extent that such breach of the Master Agreement was caused by the acts or omissions of the Participating Member Cities or any of them.
- (v) As to either party: Material failure to comply with any other term or condition of this Agreement.

(d) Notice and the Opportunity to Cure: Prior to terminating this Agreement because of a material breach as defined herein, each party shall be required to provide (1) ninety (90) days' written notice of the intent to terminate this Agreement; and (2) a forty-five (45) day period within which the party receiving the notice has an opportunity to cure the material breach. In the event it shall have promptly and diligently commenced the efforts to cure the breach, upon a written request explaining why the alleged breach cannot be cured within the first forty-five (45) day period, the party receiving notice may request an extension of the forty-five (45) day period. Such request shall not be unreasonably denied.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if any Member City has been declared to be in breach of this Agreement as a result of its chronic failure to meet its Response Time Standards two or more times in any calendar year, this Agreement shall, at Medic's option, be terminated on the second such notice of termination. The Member City shall not, in that event, have a second opportunity to cure the breach, and no further amounts shall be paid under this Agreement as to that Participating Member City. The parties recognize that in order for Medic to meet its obligations under the Master Agreement with regard to both Response Time Standards and treatment of its workforce, it may as a result of Response Time breach by a member city be required to employ additional personnel and put on extra vehicles and those vehicles and personnel cannot be taken out of or put back into the system on an on-and-off basis.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, or anything in this Agreement to the contrary, in the event that Medic is given notice of material breach or notice of intent to declare Medic in material breach pursuant to the terms of the Master Agreement, due to the acts, omissions

or performances of a Participating Member City, the notice and opportunity to cure period shall be shortened to the extent necessary to permit Medic to timely cure or avoid its breach of the Master Agreement. By way of example, if the SEMSC or Solano County EMS Agency provides Medic with notice of material breach specifying acts or omissions of the Participating Member Cities or any of them as the cause thereof and states that the Master Agreement shall be terminated if such breach is not cured within thirty (30) days, then Medic shall only be required to afford the Participating Member Cities with a twenty (20) day cure period.

- (e) <u>Immediate Termination</u>: Notwithstanding subparagraph (d), this Agreement may be terminated immediately, subject to consent by the SEMSC:
- (i) By the Participating Member Cities if Medic loses the ability to provide the Emergency Ambulance Program under the Master Agreement;
- (ii). By Medic if all the Participating Member Cities lose the ability to provide the ALS First Responder Program under the ALS Non-Transport Agreement or as to any Participating Member City that loses its ability to provide the ALS First Responder Program under the ALS Non-Transport Agreement;
- (iii) By either party, upon loss or substantial diminution of the other party's insurance and/or liability coverage as required by this Agreement, effective upon the date of such loss or diminution, or loss of any permit or license required hereunder, effective upon the date of such loss.
- (f) <u>Mutual Termination for Legal Invalidity</u>: This Agreement may be terminated by either party, as soon as reasonably possible, if this Agreement or any material term or provision hereof is determined unlawful by any court or governmental

agency or becomes unlawful as a result of subsequently passed legislation; provided, however, that the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to amend this Agreement to conform with applicable law.

#### (g) <u>Effect of Termination</u>:

- (i) In the event of termination prior to the scheduled expiration date hereof, each party shall faithfully perform its obligations through the effective date of termination, and shall also perform any additional obligations which are stated herein as extending beyond the termination date hereof.
- (ii) In the event of termination by Medic due to Participating Member Cities' breach or failure to perform, Medic shall be entitled to all damages or other relief recoverable under law or equity.
- (iii) In the event of termination by the Participating Member Cities due to Medic's breach or failure to perform, Participating Member Cities shall be entitled to all damages or other relief recoverable under law or equity.

#### 8. <u>Extraordinary Changes</u>

extraordinary change in the cost or revenues available to Medic, including but not limited to a change in reimbursement methodology by Medicare, Medi-Cal or other major private or public reimbursement program which results in a notice of renegotiation of rates by Medic pursuant to the terms of the Master Agreement, then Medic shall also have the option of sending the Participating Member Cities a notice of renegotiation of this Agreement. In such event, the Participating Member Cities and Medic shall renegotiate in good faith in an attempt to reach agreement on amended financial and/or operational terms of this

Agreement necessary for each party to satisfy its reasonable, financial and operational needs in light of the reimbursement or other changes. In the event Participating Member Cities and Medic are unable to reach such agreement within ninety (90) days of the notice by Medic to the Participating Member Cities, this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon ninety (90) days' written notice, without penalty to either party.

#### 9. Indemnity

- (a) Mutual Indemnity: The parties agree that the Participating Member Cities shall indemnify, defend and hold Medic harmless, including its officers, employees, and/or agents from any and all acts, claims, omissions, liabilities, and losses resulting in injuries or damages to persons and/or property which result from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of Participating Member Cities or their officers, members, agents and/or employees in the performance of their duties under the scope of work set forth herein and under all applicable state, federal and local laws, rules and regulations. The parties further agree that Medic shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Participating Member Cities, including their officers, members, employees, and/or agents from any and all acts, claims, omissions, liabilities, and losses resulting in injuries or damages to persons and/or property which result from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of Medic, or its officers, employees, and/or agents in the performance of its duties under the scope of work set forth by this Agreement and under all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations.
- (b) <u>Comparative Negligence</u>: In the event a third party claim or suit alleges concurrent negligence of Participating Member Cities, their officers, employees, members and/or agents and Medic, its officers, employees and/or agents, then the liability

for any and all claims for injuries and damages to persons and/or property which arise out of this Agreement shall be apportioned under the established California theory of comparative negligence as it may be modified from time to time. The parties shall each immediately notify the other in writing upon receiving notice of a claim or suit which includes, or reasonably may include, the other party. Prior to the separate settlement of any third party court action against both Medic and any or all of the Participating Member Cities, the settling party or parties shall provide written notice to the other parties and the court pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure Section 877.6 of the settlement regardless of whether a confidentiality agreement has been entered into by the settling party or parties.

#### 10. Insurance

The Participating Member Cities and Medic agree to maintain the liability coverage and/or insurance as specified in Exhibit D, which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

#### 11. <u>Assignments and Subcontracts</u>

Neither party shall assign, nor employ subcontractors for, performance of essential aspects of its duties under this Agreement, without the written consent of the other which shall not be unreasonably withheld; provided, however, that either party may employ such consultants as it deems necessary.

#### 12. <u>Alteration of Agreement</u>

This Agreement, together with the exhibits (which are incorporated herein by this reference), constitute the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the matters herein discussed and contain all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No alteration or variation shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understanding or agreement shall be binding on the parties hereto. It is, however, contemplated that a joint operating agreement addressing the day-to-day working of the parties may be required and the parties agree to reasonably work together in adopting such agreement.

#### 13. Alteration of Joint Powers Agreement or Master Agreement

A copy of the Joint Powers Agreement is attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference. The Participating Member Cities shall not amend the Joint Powers Agreement in a manner which impairs the rights or legal recourse of Medic under the Master Agreement, or the collective obligations of the Participating Member Cities and its members under this Agreement without the written consent of Medic, which Medic shall not unreasonably withhold. A copy of the Master Agreement has been provided to all Participating Member Cities and is incorporated herein by this reference. Except as hereinbefore set forth, Medic shall not agree to an amendment of the Master Agreement which materially increases the burden of the Participating Member Cities which Participating Member Cities shall not unreasonably withhold.

#### 14. Compliance with Applicable Laws

All services to be performed by either party pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed in accordance with all applicable, federal, state, county and municipal laws, ordinances and regulations, including all policies and procedures of the Solano County EMS Agency.

#### 15. Notice

Any notice, request, demand or other communication required or permitted hereunder shall be deemed to be properly given when personally delivered or when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, or when transmitted by facsimile with confirmation of delivery, addressed to Medic or the Participating Member Cities, respectively, at the addresses set forth hereinafter. Any party may change its address for notice by written notice to the others.

#### 16. Controlling Law

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

#### 17. Venue, Attorneys Fees

In the event that suit shall be brought by either party to this Agreement, the parties agree that venue shall be exclusively vested in the state courts of the County of Solano. The prevailing party or parties in any such suit shall be entitled to reimbursement of all allowable court costs thereof, including its/their reasonable attorneys fees.

#### 18. Construction

The parties acknowledge that for purposes of construing this Agreement neither party shall be deemed to be the drafter.

#### 19. <u>Binding Effect</u>

This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and bind the respective parties, their successors, personal representatives and permitted assigns.

#### 20. Headings

The headings in this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and are not to be used in construing or interpreting any provision of this Agreement.

#### 21. <u>Counterparts</u>

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which shall constitute the agreement between the parties.

#### 22. Invalidity

If any term, provision, covenant or condition of this Agreement, or any application thereof, shall be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, all terms provisions, covenants and conditions of this Agreement, and all applications thereof, not held invalid, void, or unenforceable, shall continue in full force and effect and shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated thereby.

#### 23. <u>Force Majeure</u>

Neither party shall be liable for any delay nor failure to perform to the extent that such delay or failure is caused by a force or event beyond the control of such party, including, but not limited to, war, embargoes, riots, fires, floods, earthquakes, strikes, governmental restrictions, natural disasters, or other Acts of God.

#### 24. Waiver

The failure of either party to insist upon strict performance of any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Agreement in any one or more instances shall not be construed as a waiver or a relinquishment of any such terms, covenants or conditions and all of the same shall be in full force and effect.

### 25. Reference to Multiple Parties or Single Party

The plural shall include the singular and the singular shall include the plural throughout the terms of this Agreement.

## 26. Prior Agreement Terminated and Superceded

That certain Public Private Partnership Agreement for ALS First Responder Emergency Services, dated May 1, 2000, by and between the parties hereto is hereby terminated and superceded in its entirety by this Agreement.

#### 27. Effective Date of this Agreement

The effective date of this Agreement shall be the date of its execution by the last of the undersigned parties or May 1, 2010, whichever is latest. This Agreement shall be considered implemented on this effective date.

### INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

#### 1. Obligations of Participant Member Cities

Without limiting each Participating Member City's obligation to indemnify Medic, each Participating Member City shall maintain at all times the following coverage during the term of this Agreement:

- a. General liability coverage for its activities arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, in an amount no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence with a ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) annual aggregate, which may be provided by umbrella coverage.
- b. Automobile liability coverage for its activities arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, including coverage for scheduled autos, hired autos, and on-owed vehicles or, alternatively, code 1 (any auto) in an amount no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) combined single limit for bodily injury including death per occurrence, and property damage liability of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence.
- c. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance providing full statutory coverage.
- d. Professional liability insurance, including error and omissions, with minimum coverage of at least two million (\$2,000,000) per occurrence and six million dollars (\$6,000,000) annual aggregate.
- e. For general and automobile liability coverages, Medic will be endorsed as an additional insured (additional covered party) on each Participating Member City's policy(s). Each insurance policy required herein shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be canceled, except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice of cancellation has been provided to Medic.
- f. The coverage hereunder may be provided through commercial insurance, a self-insured retention or participation in a joint powers authority, or a combination thereof.
- g. Each Participating Member City shall furnish Medic with original certificates and amendatory endorsements effecting coverage required herein. Medic reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements effecting coverage required herein at any time.

### 2. Obligations of Medic

Without limiting Medic's obligation to indemnify the Participating Member Cities, Medic shall maintain at all times the following coverages during the life if this Agreement:

- a. General liability coverage for Medic's activities arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, in an amount no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence, and inclusive of umbrella coverage in the amount of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) annual aggregate.
- b. Automobile liability coverage for Medic's activities arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, including coverage for scheduled autos, hired autos, and on-owed vehicles or, alternatively, code 1 (any auto) in an amount no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) combined single limit for bodily injury including death per occurrence, and property damage liability of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence.
- c. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance providing full statutory coverage.
- d. Professional liability insurance, including error and omissions, with minimum coverage of at least two million (\$2,000,000) per occurrence and six million dollars (\$6,000,000) annual aggregate.
- e. For general and automobile liability coverages, each Participating Member City will be endorsed as an additional insured (additional covered party) on Medic's policy(s).
- f. Each insurance policy required herein shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be canceled, except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice of cancellation has been provided to each Participating Member City.
- g. Medic shall furnish each Participating Member City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements effecting coverage required herein. Each Participating Member City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements effecting coverage required herein at any time.
