



## **Message from the Manager**

### **City Manager, Greg Folsom**

#### ***July 2023 Update***



I hope you are enjoying the summer so far. I actually caught Covid while on vacation in July, so please be aware that it is not gone and keep your guard up.

During my discussion in last month's update on the budget, I mentioned that Council had authorized a significant increase in police officer pay due to the continued loss of officers to other jurisdictions paying more. I'm very happy to report that we recently had four new officers start, including one lateral officer, so we are back on track to having a fully staffed department once these new recruits have completed their training.

July was significant for several other reasons:

- The Highway 12 Landscape Improvement Project began the week of July 10<sup>th</sup>.
- Senate Bill (SB) 1 road improvement projects also began the week of July 10<sup>th</sup>.
- The Suisun City Mobility Hub project began construction in July.
- The Downtown Suisun City Farmers' Market began July 15<sup>th</sup>.
- Take 5 Oil Change opened in July.
- Clallam Academy Childcare Center opened in July.
- The Lawler Residences (luxury apartments) opened in July.

In addition, the annual 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration on the Waterfront was a resounding success! Thank you to all who attended and all those city employees who had to work to put on the event and ensure safety for all who attended.

One of the biggest challenges that we face in Suisun City is dealing with homelessness. It is an increasing issue primarily because we lack the resources to provide alternatives for the homeless and because the laws around homelessness do not give cities many options. I will go into this in more detail in a future update, but I wanted to highlight a recent small victory. The City has been in litigation with a property owner regarding the property at Railroad and Sunset. Over the last year it has become a haven for homeless. Our litigation finally settled and the City now owns a portion of that property. After additional legal due process provided to the owners of an RV illegally parked on the property now owned by the City, we were successful in having the Sheriff's Office evict the squatters and we had the RV towed off the property on August 9<sup>th</sup>.

The Sheriff's Office also evicted the other individuals illegally squatting on the privately owned property. We are in the process of fencing the City's property to permanently keep people off that property.

On August 10<sup>th</sup>, we participated in an appeals hearing with the property owner regarding their appeal of the code enforcement actions we have filed against them. We will be anticipating the results of that hearing and will hopefully be able to take additional actions to have that property cleaned shortly thereafter. Stay tuned for more updates on this, although it is likely to be an ongoing problem as the property owner and their attorney so far do not seem very agreeable to addressing the issues on their property.

## Development Services Department

### **Dr. Nare Mixed Use**

The City Council approved the Planned Unit Development for the Nare Mixed Use project at their July 18<sup>th</sup> meeting. The applicant has told staff to expect construction drawings for the building permit in approximately 10-12 weeks.

### **Meridian West**

Construction of the sales office/model units is underway with building staff already conducting inspections.

### **Highway 12 Logistics Center Project**

Staff review of the Highway 12 Logistics Project Environmental Impact Report (EIR) is underway and staff is estimating that the release of the Highway 12 EIR will occur toward the end of August.

## Code Enforcement Code Update

### Pickering Property

On Wednesday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, the RV was removed from the Pickering property (see image to the right). The tow company was awesome in their assistance. The driver was a prior employee and was extremely patient and helpful. Thank you, Legal Team, for jumping on the fly and smoothing the issue regarding the court order out with County Counsel. In addition to the RV, the Solano County Sheriff's Office completed a sweep of the homeless and there are no individuals on the Pickering property, and they have been instructed to stay off the property, or face trespassing violation through our local PD, although we would still need to get Pickering approval to enforce. Shout out to our local PD officers and our PW staff for helping us out in a pinch with mechanical issues and cleaning our Right of Way (ROW) property (see image below). The fencing contractor is on-site installing the fence, but it could take the contractor up to one month to have the entire area fenced off.



The deputy who works with the county's behavioral health and social services teams informed Chief Roth that he will be in that area this week and next week, trying to connect the homeless individuals out there with service options to get them assistance. Chief Roth talked to at least two

individuals who were interested in getting help and spoke with the deputy Wednesday morning. They are also working on finding shelter for a couple with a dog.

- Trend Analysis via the STEEP model (sociological, technological, economic, environmental, political).
- Methods and benefits of stakeholder engagement and information sharing to address pending community needs.
- Procedural Justice and the impact of social systems on a global society.

The primary goal of the Command College is to provide sitting law enforcement leaders a course with a focus on futures forecasting and innovation. The program is presented at a master's degree level, based on student-centered adult learning theories, placing accountability and responsibility for success on the student.

## PUBLIC WORKS ENGINEERING

### McCoy Creek Trail Phase II Project

As of Monday, August 7<sup>th</sup>, the rebar and concrete pour for the bridge deck has been completed. The contractor anticipates completing the project on time. Per the contract and the contract change orders, the deadline to complete the project is October 27, 2023. The two current critical path items on the contractor's schedule are as follows:

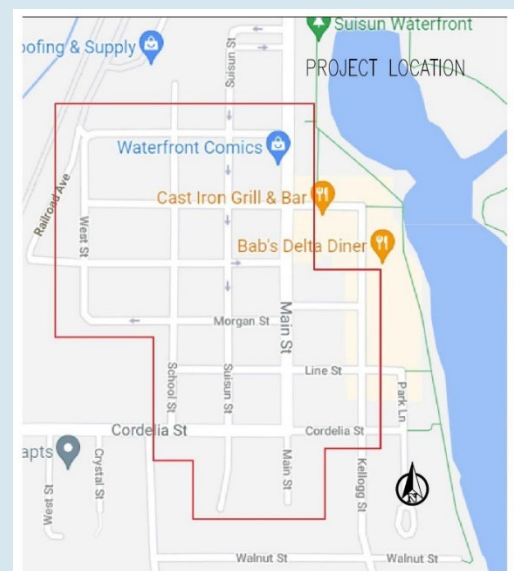
- Re-design of the foundation footing the monument sign which is made of granite. The contractor was not able to secure a stone matching the size in the contract documents. The alternative stone is slightly larger and requires a new foundation design.
- Paving at the three trail crossings, which are located at Pintail Drive, Worley Road, and Blossom Avenue. The work involves replacing the structural section of the roadway, which includes the asphalt, base, and subbase layers. The paving subcontractor's contract with the prime contractor only includes the paving layer. The contract between the two parties is currently being discussed for an amendment.

#### **Bridge Deck Concrete Pour:**



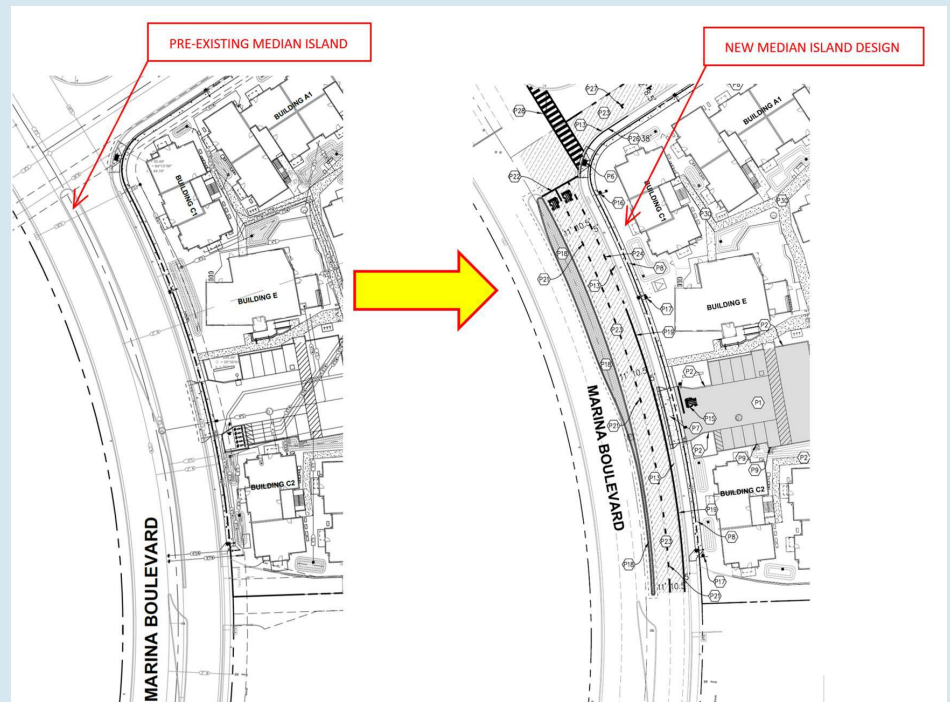
### PG&E Project

Last year PG&E completed gas main replacements on a few of the project's street segments (see map to the right). The remaining work on the main gas line will be starting shortly on segments of Sacramento Street, School Street, Solano Street, West Street, Morgan Street, California Street, and Cordelia Street. Gas main work is anticipated to be completed by November 2023. Work will then begin on the gas services to the houses through the end of January 2024. Restoration of pavement and sidewalks is anticipated after all gas services to the houses have been completed.



### *Marina Village Apartments*

The new 5-foot-wide sidewalk that was conditioned for installation along Marina Boulevard and Buena Vista Avenue fronting the Project will be completed soon. The new sidewalk segment along Marina Boulevard will be opened in time for the new school year, specifically for students who travel to and from the nearby Crystal Middle School. However, the new sidewalk segment along Buena Vista Avenue will remain closed for safety reasons as there is still exterior work on the buildings along that street that needs to be completed before the sidewalk segment can be opened up to foot traffic.



### *Victorian Harbor A Column & Masonry Wall Painting Project*

This Project started as of Tuesday, July 25<sup>th</sup>. The Project will patch and paint all columns within Vic Harbor A and will paint the section of sound wall between Lotz Way and Bay Street which is exposed with no vegetation attached to the wall. This Project was a request by the residents within this LLD. Vic Harbor A has sufficient funding available to cover the cost associated with this Project.

Project is now in the punch-list phase as all columns and sections of the masonry wall included in this Project have been prepped, primed, and painted. Staff will be walking all columns on the punch list as well as the masonry wall to ensure the job is completed per specifications. The project should be completed shortly.



## **PUBLIC WORKS MAINTENANCE DIVISION:**

The Maintenance Division does a lot of work throughout the city. Here is a snapshot of work performed during July:

Public Works Crew continues to work with two (2) people assigned to "Streets," five (5) assigned to "General Landscape," four (4) full-time people, and one (1) part-time person assigned to "LLD Maintenance."

- Monday and Thursday twice weekly trash runs and illegal dump pickups (approximately 186 trash cans).
- Monday and Thursday twice weekly trash runs in the LLD's.
- Addressed two (2) illegal dumps on Humphrey and Petersen Road
- Mowed the following areas on a weekly schedule.
  - Monday - Hall Park – 178,450 sq. ft. = 4.10 acres – Completed
  - Monday - Geopp Park – 199,430 sq. ft. = 4.51 - Completed
  - Tuesday - Downtown – 144,031 sq. ft. = 3.3 acres - Completed
  - Wednesday - Heritage Park – 270,000 sq. ft. = 6.20 acres –Not Completed
  - Thursday - Sports Complex – 313,596 sq. ft. = 7.1 acres Completed
  - Friday - Montebello Park – 274,724 sq. ft. = 6.3 acres – Completed
- Repaired hot water faucet at the new Train Depot for the new café owner.
- Weeded and cleaned up Bella Vista from Blue Jay to Walters.
- Responded to a possible sinkhole at 601 Emperor Drive.
- Responded to a large crack along The McCoy Creek Trail Phase 1 walking path.
- Repaired hole in fencing around the Lawler House.
- Repaired water leak in the Plaza area.
- Tuned off irrigation to Hall Park for a Library event.
- Mowed and weeded the South side of Highway 12 (Highway 12 Corridor) from Grizzly Island Road to Walters Road (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Performed irrigation checks and repairs at Heritage Park common area (Heritage Park LLD).
- Completed 26 USA requests.
- Cleaned, weeded, and trimmed in the Peterson Ranch LLD (Charleston and the Walking Path).
- Tree removal from right-of-way at 1763 Dover Circle (Peterson Ranch LLD).
- Removed broken tree limb at Waterfall Park (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Performed irrigation checks and repairs (Vic D LLD).
- Repaired pothole at 515 Suisun Street.
- Completed 11 SID patches on the following streets: Cackling, Decoy, Humphrey, Eider, Honker, Silk Oak, and Muscovy.
- Cleaned, weeded, and trimmed the Downtown area in preparation for the July 4<sup>th</sup> event.
- Set up for and clean up after the July 4<sup>th</sup> event.
- Mowed city-owned and maintained vacant lots (Lotz at Marina east side, Civic Center Lot, Denverton Curve Lot, and Boat Ramp Lot).
- Cleaned-up homeless encampments on the 34-acre lot (NW corner of Marina Blvd. & Hwy 12).
- Cleaned, weeded, and trimmed Victorian Harbors LLDs.
- Weeded and cleaned up Petersen Road from Fulmar Dr. to Walters Rd. (Walmart TZ#6).



- Repaired 19 streetlights
- Weeded and cleaned up Petersen Road from Fulmar to Walters (Walmart TZ#6).
- Removed 60 yards of trash and debris at the lot on the corner of Sunset Avenue and (Old) Railroad Avenue.
- Filled ponds at Waterfall Park so that aerators can be turned back on and address algae growth (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Repaired multiple broken sprinklers along the Walking Path (Petersen Ranch LLD).
- Repaired faulty irrigation controller (Vic D LLD).
- Mowed weeds along the north side of Old Railroad Avenue.
- Removed broken tree branch from 735 Bay Street (Vic A LLD).
- Replaced broken manhole cover at Walters and Pintail.
- Put up 5 National Night Out banners.
- Addressed six (6) illegal dumps on Humphrey, Petersen Road, Worley Rd., Hummingbird Dr., Hwy 12 Bike Path, and Harbor Park
- Removed broken tree limb at Waterfall Park. This means the aerators should be able to be turned back on. Solitude Lakes has been notified (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Performed irrigation checks and repairs (Vic D LLD).
- Cleaned up the newly purchased right-of-way (ROW) on the east side of the lot on the corner of Sunset Avenue and (Old) Railroad Avenue and installed temporary fencing around the property.
- Repainted the school markings at Crystal School and Crescent School.



- Cleaned up the homeless encampment at New Railroad and Sunset Ave.





#### **Heritage Park Soccer Field Update:**

- Public Works replaced dead areas with sod and expects the fields to be ready for play in August.
- Due to the high summer temperatures as of late, a higher-than-normal volume of water is being put on the turf to try to keep it healthy through the high temperatures.
- Staff is visually inspecting the turf twice daily to make sure the sod is taking and the other areas remain green and weed-free
- The two brown spots outside of the field area, at each corner of the Park have had their irrigation repaired and staff is working to get the areas to green back up. This generally takes at least three weeks to begin to see improvements.



## **BUILDING MAINTENANCE DIVISION**

### ***Lot 37 Fencing Project***

The contract for installing permanent fencing around the newly purchased right-of-way (Lot 37) on the southeast corner of Sunset Avenue and Old Railroad Avenue has been awarded to Morgan Fence Company. They have begun the fence installation.

### ***Safety Facilities Security Gate Project***

This Project continues to move forward in the design phase. The city has received 30% plans and will be meeting with the architect to review and discuss them.

### July Revenue Summary

The month of July turned out to be a great way to start the new fiscal year for the Recreation Department.

**Community Parks and Joseph Nelson Community Center Rentals:** July saw an increase in activity, with 36 rentals between local parks and the Nelson Center. These rentals generated a revenue of \$28,181.

**Combined Performance:** When we consolidate the revenues from rentals and program revenues, our Recreation Department generated a total of \$73,058 in July. This achievement demonstrates the effectiveness of our strategies and the commitment of our team.

As we progress into the new fiscal year, we will continue to explore new opportunities for growth and improvement.

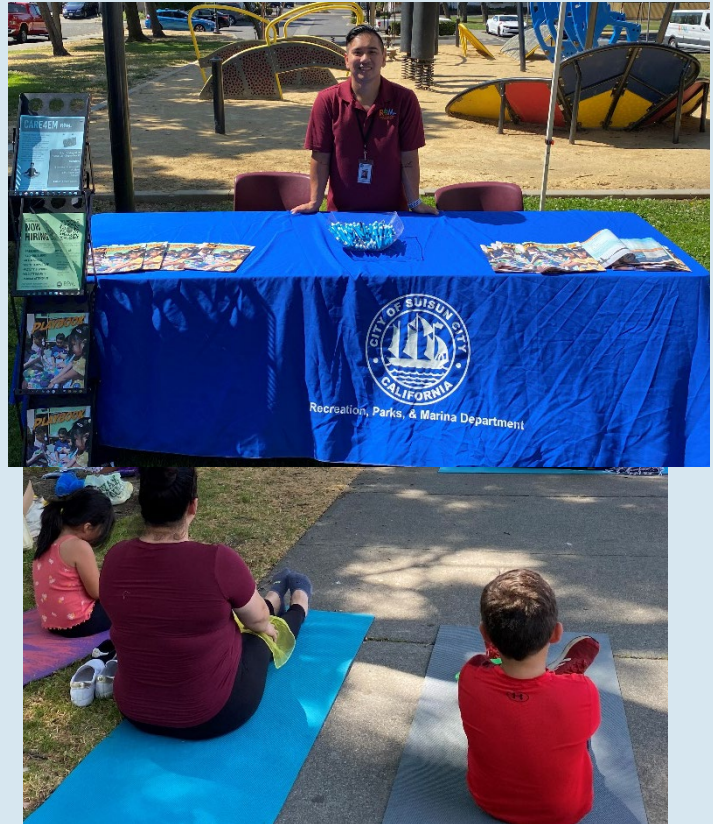

The league served over 150 total participants, and we are looking at ways to improve the program for next year.



## *Training on Working with Children with Intellectual and/or Developmental Disabilities*

On Friday, July 7<sup>th</sup>, training was provided to after-school, camp, and preschool staff on supporting children with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities in childcare programs. The training session was led by the local communication organization Special Care Services. The session included education on autism, crisis prevention institute (CPI) techniques,



and from an overall perspective, supporting all students (regardless of ability or disability) in a group setting program. The training was part of the 'Social Recreation Grant' awarded to the RPM Department by North Bay Regional Center (NBRC).

This training is a precursor to our very first Camp Chaos by the RPM Department from Aug 1<sup>st</sup> – 3<sup>rd</sup> but is also meant to give our program staff the necessary tools, knowledge, and techniques for serving all populations within our programs. According to Centers for Disease Control (CDC) data, 1 in 22 children in California are diagnosed with autism, so thank you to NBRC and Special Care Services for giving our staff great and necessary training!



## Camp Chaos

The first-ever 'Camp Chaos' program in Suisun City is underway at Lambrecht Sports Complex! The program is happening thanks to a grant from North Bay Regional Center and in partnership with Special Care Services. Camp Chaos is a summer program for youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and holds a higher camper-to-staff ratio. It is aimed at providing I/DD youth with opportunities to socialize, participate in activities, make new friends, and do so with ample support. Campers are having a blast, and the RPM Department looks forward to continuing this partnership and making this an annual offering to the I/DD population.

On Thursday, July 27<sup>th</sup>, we had two special events for seniors. In the morning, the Lions Center for the Visually Impaired provided 8 free eye exams. Then, at night we hosted the Summer Dinner Dance. This event was free, and 130 seniors joined us. # Marina

## Marina Update

The Sea Scout Ship *Makai* visited Suisun City Marina for two nights and docked at the guest dock. They visit Suisun City every summer and enjoy the waterfront events. Sea Scout Ship 700 (*Makai*) has been serving the youth of San Francisco Bay for over 65 years. Sea Scouts are a part of the Boy Scouts of America program. Instead of hiking or camping, Sea Scouts go sailing and cruising. The *Makai* ship is a 65-foot power boat, and the *Makai* began its life as a US Navy Torpedo Retriever. She now serves as the *Makai*'s main vessel and is operated by the Sea Scouts under the supervision of adult leadership.



Marina staff successfully completed the monthly fuel tank inspection, ensuring adherence to the stringent guidelines outlined in our Spill Prevention, Control, and Countermeasure (SPCC) plan. Additionally, staff took the initiative to enhance safety measures by installing new National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) diamonds on the fuel tank enclosure. Lastly, staff installed a Very High Frequency (VHF) radio on the harbor boat. The addition of this radio will significantly enhance communication capabilities, allowing for effective coordination and improved response times in case of emergencies or operational needs.
