


#### **Development**

Construction season is here and we celebrated two ground breakings in April (Tractor Supply and Starbucks) and one in May (Meridian West) for new projects! More details later in this publication on Meridian West. I met with our Development Services team and our Principal Planner, John Kearns, says that this is the busiest we have been in the 17 years he has worked for Suisun City. We are anticipating several ribbon cuttings in June or July, including the Lawler Residences and Take 5 Oil Change, so more info coming soon on those.

#### **Budget**

We are currently in the middle of labor negotiations and putting together our budget for fiscal year 2023/24. While I cannot go into details right now about the labor negotiations, I can tell you that this year continues to be a challenging year as our revenue increase are matched by increases in expenses. Measure S is the key to keeping Suisun City sustainable from a fiscal perspective. Below you will see a chart that compares our sales tax revenues with Solano County, the Bay Area, and California. While we are definitely increasing our sales tax revenues, we still lag far behind the average California city.

## **Development Services Department**

#### **Planning Commission**

The Planning Commission held a public hearing at a special meeting on May  $16^{\text{th}}$ . At this meeting, the Commission made a recommendation for City Council approval of the proposed adoption of the California Building Standards Code (CBSC). Staff hopes the City Council will be able to consider the ordinance by the end of June. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Planning Commission is June  $13^{\text{th}}$ .

#### **Meridian West Ground Breaking**

On May 10, 2023, Suisun City held another groundbreaking celebrate the beginning construction of the new Meridian West subdivision by the national homebuilder, Century Communities. The ceremony was attended by local officials, business leaders, community members. Meridian West will be a 71-unit single-family home community on the west side of Suisun City at the former location of Crystal Middle School. According to Century Community representatives, the new homes will likely start in the mid \$500,000's and model homes are expected to be ready for touring this summer.



#### Cannabissary

City staff provided the applicant with a letter documenting that the application remains incomplete and revisions to the plans are necessary prior to Planning Commission and City Council action. Cannabissary is a proposed dispensary to be located at Railroad and Humphrey.

#### Cllaimm Academy (formerly Caterpillar Clubhouse) - 1241 Anderson Drive

Staff has been made aware that a pre-final inspection is expected to be requested soon with hopes to begin summer school programming.

#### **Dr. Nare Dental Office**

The applicant, Dr. Nare, has proposed a dental office on the south side of Lotz Way directly in front of the One Harbor Center Office Building. Staff is awaiting a response from the applicant on the proposed conditions of approval. Once the applicant is in agreement with the conditions, a public hearing will be set with the Planning Commission (and then the City Council).

#### Element 7

City staff has been in contact with the ownership of Element 7 regarding initiating both tenant improvements, as well as site work for the property at 300 Railroad Avenue. Element 7 has approval to operate a cannabis dispensary at this location. Element 7 has indicated that they are eager to begin demolition work as soon as possible.

#### Suisun City 2023-2031 Housing Element

On May 23<sup>rd</sup> the City received a letter from California Housing and Community Development (HCD) finding the City's adopted 2023-2031 Housing Element in substantial compliance with State Housing Element Law.

#### **Olive Tree Ranch**

The applicant has submitted a revised subdivision layout for the project. This will require a new review of the project by each department. Meanwhile, with the new project layout, the CEQA document preparation will be reinitiated. Olive Tree Ranch will be located on Olive Road south of the mobile home park.

#### Take 5 Oil Change

Take 5 is in the final stages of construction and a grand opening is expected soon! Take 5 is located on Walters next to the 7-11.

#### **Lawler Residences**

Lawler Residences will be receiving their temporary occupancy permit soon so that they can begin pre-leasing their luxury apartments. These apartments will be among the nicest in Solano County. This project is located on Anderson Drive.

#### <u>Train Depot Vendor Lease Agreement</u>

Staff and the lessee are resolving the rest of the items that needed to be addressed in the lease. Staff expects the lease to come before the City Council by the end of June.

### State Route Highway 12 Landscape Improvements Project

The contract with the Landscape Contractor has been fully executed for this Project and a Notice to Proceed has been issued. Additionally, a pre-construction meeting has been conducted, and the contractor has submitted their encroachment permit application to Caltrans. Caltrans has returned its encroachment permit application with comments, which the contractor promptly addressed. The contractor is now waiting for the approved Caltrans encroachment permit before finalizing his project schedule and scheduling the construction start. Pending Permit issuance, the Contractor's schedule includes mobilizing shortly thereafter and completing the Project by October 2023. Milestones include clearing & grubbing, fence removal & replacement, minor grading, irrigation installation, planting, and mulch installation.

#### Senate Bill 1 – List of Streets

The City Council approved Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) List of Streets for calendar years 2023 through 2029. This was submitted this week to the California Transportation Commission via the CalSMART online reporting tool (<a href="https://calsmart.dot.ca.gov/login/auth">https://calsmart.dot.ca.gov/login/auth</a>) as required by the SB1 program. The List of Streets includes the names of streets that will be resurfaced with either slurry seal or asphalt rubber cape seal as the budget allows.

#### Meridian West Development

Construction work started in May, including onsite grading and utility installation. Currently, the replacement of the sewer line on California Street between two existing manholes has been completed at the following locations: 1) within the Union Pacific Rail Road (UPRR) property west of California Street, and 2) at the intersection of California Street and West Street. The developer secured the necessary UPRR permit prior to performing work within UPRR property boundary. The work within UPRR property included re-channelizing the Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District's sewer manhole. Utility work will continue to the next phase, which includes sewer manhole installation, new sewer pipeline installation, and sewer pipeline replacement.

#### PUBLIC WORKS MAINTENANCE DIVISION

The Maintenance Division does a lot of work throughout the city. Here is a snapshot of work performed during May:

- Trimmed all pass-throughs (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Mowed vacant lots due to fire danger (Civic Center, Marina and Driftwood, Denverton Curve, edge of the 34-acre lot, Grizzly Island Trail).
- Removed illegally dumped dirt in front of 809 Capistrano.
- Trimmed, weeded, and cleaned Blossom LLD.
- Trimmed and cleaned up the landscaping at Hall Park.
- Repaired irrigation leak at Hall Park.
- Repaired 2 streetlights.
- Removed graffiti along the Hwy 12 sound wall.
- Completed the annual Heat Illness Prevention Training.
- Completed 114 USA requests.

- Completed 4 Solano Irrigation District (SID) patches and 5 potholes (Hot Asphalt Cement).
- Sprayed weeds in the Downtown Area, City Hall, Plaza, Boat Ramp, and North Basin Parking Lot.
- Aerated the Sports Complex and Montebello Park.
- Weed abated the Vallejo waterline easement in the Blossom LLD.
- Set up and cleaned after the Mother's Day event.
- Repaired 4 streetlights.

- Removed graffiti along the Hwy 12 sound wall.
- Mowed the vacant lot next to the east end of Walnut Street in the court.
- Boarded up the window and wall at the old Cal Marine Sport building due to a fire from a homeless encampment.

- Responded to gas smell at the Courtyard fireplace and repaired the gas line.

### Lambrecht Sports Complex

On Saturday and Sunday, May 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>, we hosted our sixth tournament of 2023. Eighteen youth teams aged 12 and 14 from the surrounding areas battled it out for the championship. There was a grand total of 18 teams in the

tournament, and all

three fields were used over the weekend. The snack bar was also busy, with \$2,618 in revenue. Recreation staff members are now getting ready for the next tournament over Memorial Day weekend.





This month at the marina, marina staff replaced the plexiglass on the gate A door which needed repair. Staff continue to pressure wash the docks and pilings to keep up on cleanliness and presentation, and regularly check on docked boats.

The annual dock maintenance project is currently underway. This maintenance is being done by Bellingham Marine and includes balancing the docks, fixing broken whalers, adding floatation to fingers, and replacing and fixing fenders and corner bumpers.

### Proposition 64 Public Health and Safety Cohort 3 Grant Program

Recreation Supervisor Marvin Mora received word that the RPM and Police Department's application towards the Proposition 64 Public Health and Safety grant program was recommended to be funded! The Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) Executive Board will officially vote to fund all Cohort 3 recommendations on April  $13^{th}$ . It is anticipated that the BSCC Executive Board will vote to fund all recommendations. Suisun City will receive  $\sim $2.29$  million over a 5-year period. This was a competitive grant process for projects that address local impacts due to the legalization of cannabis in California. Eligible applicants for the program are local government agencies that do not ban either indoor and outdoor commercial cannabis cultivation or retail sale of cannabis or cannabis products.

The project will be officially called Suisun City's Teen Development & Cannabis Education Program. The project will establish a Suisun City Police Activities League (PAL) program for middle school and high school youth that combines existing PAL structure and resources with cannabis prevention and education curriculum developed by Suisun City RPM staff and the Solano County Office of Education. It will support a Recreation Supervisor to oversee the project and a School Resource Officer that will participate in school intervention efforts and will focus on mentoring, counseling, building relationships with youth, and acting as an extension of the program. The program will give Suisun City teens the chance to mature, gain valuable leadership and life skills, participate in unique enrichment and recreation opportunities, and set themselves for lifelong success – all with cannabis prevention and education as its nexus. The RPM and Police Departments are excited to receive this funding and can't wait to impact the teens of Suisun City.
