October 2022 Update

Hello Suisun City! How quickly one month goes by. I received positive feedback on the monthly newsletter so I'm glad that so many are actually reading this and find it informative. I'm open to ideas as to information that residents would find helpful in receiving.

So much has been happening in Suisun City this year. Events are back in Suisun City and October was an especially busy month! We have construction projects going on throughout the city with many more about to break ground or in the planning stages.

We have been hiring a significant number of new public safety employees as Council approved staffing for a second fire engine in the year's budget and we were able to fill some vacancies in the Police Department. Council also identified Code Enforcement as a priority in this year's budget and we hired our first employee dedicated to code enforcement.



We have also been investing significantly in technology to improve our efficiency, our transparency, and our ability to provide services to the community. The City of Suisun City now has a full-feature mobile app that provides all residents easy access to several City services, all at the palm of their hand. This interactive engagement tool allows City residents to connect electronically with City Hall for service requests, contact information, news, event calendars, and much more!

Use the "Report an Issue" section to report graffiti, potholes, and other issues directly to the correct city department right from your phone using GIS mapping. Learn about your city's elected officials, programs, and upcoming construction projects. Find parks, facilities, and points of interest along with information, phone numbers, maps, and directions. Stay informed on the latest happenings through the "News" and "Calendar" sections. The *MyCivic* application is available for download through the Apple App Store or on Google Play. Users can then select Suisun City as their city of choice.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Fire Prevention Week:

On October 15th, the Department hosted an open house in honor of Fire Prevention Week. The event was well attended by residents of Suisun City, as well as surrounding cities. Many compliments were received from guests who are already looking forward to next year's event. Events included live fire extinguisher training, firefighter combat challenge course, fire escape plan drawing table, static display of fire apparatus, rescue boats and rescue equipment.



Employee Recognitions:

The Fire Department's current firefighter staffing levels are: 6 Fire Captains & 3 Fire Engineers, with 3 Fire Engineers in the background process. During a recent City Council meeting, Chief Lopez held an official swearing in and badge pinning for two recent hires of Fire Engineers and recognized a promotion that occurred in early 2022. Due to COVID restrictions at the time, these recognitions were postponed.

Suisun City Fire Department hosted its 70th Annual Halloween Parade downtown. This was a spooktacular event where many children of all ages and families joined in our parade walk followed by awards for best costumes. Light and Air Unit:

Suisun City Fire Department showcased their new Light and Air Unit at the October 18th City Council meeting. The Light and Air Unit is an important new addition to the Fire Department for several critical reasons. It is a specialized piece of firefighting apparatus used by firefighters to provide supplemental lighting and the ability to refill Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) air bottles at the scene of an emergency. During prolonged emergencies, particularly structure fires, where firefighters must remain on air (wearing their SCBAs), these air bottles need to be replaced and refilled.



FSUSD Special Olympics Soccer Event:


On Friday, October 28, 2022, Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District (FSUSD) elementary school students participated in part one of the 7th Annual 2022 Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District/Special Olympics Soccer Event. FSUSD has partnered with Special Olympics Northern California to create a sports program to unify students with and without disabilities. This year, the event has been split into two days and spread out to two different locations. On October 28, Crescent Elementary School welcomed 120 students from Anna Kyle and Oakbrook Elementary Schools. Volunteers from the Crescent Elementary School Leadership class, Suisun City Fire Department, and Suisun Police Department were also in attendance to assist with running the various soccer skills stations.

The second part of this event will take place on November 3rd at KI Jones Elementary School and will host 160 students from Dover, David A. Weir Preparatory, and Laurel Creek Elementary Schools. These events provide attendees the knowledge, experience, and skills necessary to create and sustain school communities that promote inclusion, acceptance, and respect for all students.

Suisun Waterfront. There were 40 cars that participated and cruised around downtown and residential Suisun City. The participants had fun and people enjoyed watching the cruise downtown.

The following day was the Car Show from 9:00am-2:00pm. A total of 88 cars including hot rods, muscle cars, lowriders, and more filled the Main Street Waterfront Parking Lot. It was a





beautiful day at the waterfront with people of all ages admiring the classic cars, enjoying the vendors, and listening to live music performed by The Rhythm Method Trio. The awards were presented at 1:30pm and 8 people received awards. Congratulations to the winners and thank you to all the participants for coming to this event and supporting the RPM Department.

In-Person and Virtual Prosperity Park Community Garden Meetings:

On October 20th, the RPM Department hosted an in-person community meeting for the Prosperity Park Community Garden. Deputy Manager Kris Lofthus, Recreation Citv Supervisor Marvin Mora, and Melton Design Group (the contracted design firm for the project) were present. This meeting was attended by over 20 people, and included an overview and history of the project, presentation of the preliminary design, and an for attendees opportunity to give feedback. Attendees voiced their concerns over potential homeless presence, fencing to those whose homes are backed up to the garden, and gave ideas for additional amenities such as motion sensor lighting and



celling fans under the shade structure to combat heat. After the meeting, most concerns were addressed, and attendees came away with a clearer idea of the project.

A virtual meeting for those who could not attend the in-person meeting was held on October 26th via Zoom. The meeting was attended by 15 people and included a recap of the feedback from the in-person meeting the week before, overview and history of the project, presentation of the preliminary design, and an opportunity for attendees to give feedback.




Attendees voiced their concerns over cars speeding on Blossom Ave and potential parking issues. After the meeting, most concerns were addressed and attendees came away with a clearer understanding of the project. Melton Design Group will take all the feedback from the inperson and virtual meetings and implement that into an updated design, which will be presented at December's RPMA Commission Meeting on December 7th.






According to Police Chief, Aaron

Fleet Week:

The Suisun City Police Department Marine Unit assisted the U.S. Coast Guard with ensuring the safety and security of spectators and event participants during San Francisco's Fleet Week. SCPD's primary mission was to enforce the security zones that were established for the event in the San Francisco Bay. Numerous Military, Law Enforcement and Fire Department agencies participated in the effort, and SCPD spent three days assisting during the event. SCPD's assistance was paid for using grant funding already awarded to the PD for the Boat Program.

Stolen Vehicle Arrest:

On October 14th, officers received an alert from the License Plate Reader camera system of a stolen vehicle driving in the city. The vehicle was located by Officer Cardinalli at E. Tabor, just east of Walters Road. A highrisk style car stop was initiated, and two suspects were safely detained without incident. The driver of the vehicle was arrested for possession of a stolen vehicle and



possession of narcotics. He was booked into the county jail. The vehicle was released to the victim.

National Walk to School Day:

National walk, bike and run to School Day was on Wednesday, October 12th. Officers had fun walking with the Suisun Elementary School students and staff while cheering them on!





Trunk or Treats:


During this past week, SCPD staff participated in several Trunk or Treat events held at the schools and churches around Suisun.

Catalytic Converter Thefts:

Recently, there have been several reports of catalytic converter thefts from vehicles. During the early morning of October 21st, three victims reported their vehicle's catalytic converter were taken during the night. SCPD continues to be on the lookout for such activity and when staffing allows, officers conduct traffic stops during the early morning hours for vehicle code violations to make our streets safer and to further efforts in deterring such thefts.

Crime Mapping:

Just a reminder that SCPD posts all our incident location data (except domestic violence and other protected information) at https://scpd.crimegraphics.com. This information can also be found by going to the portal on the Suisun PD website. This allows anyone to search incident data by location and date. Below is a snapshot of the crime map from 10/16/22 to 10/19/22. A comment brought up this week by a community member saying the Daily Republic only shows an average of three incidents a day and that would not be an accurate reflection of the number of incidents SCPD responds to. We are reaching out to the Daily Republic to determine how they receive which calls to publish when they create their police blotter. We occasionally post reminders about our mapping information to our social media sites, and we will be sure to post this again very soon. This is a great tool for our community to see what is going on in our city.



Development Services Department

Parcel 11 (Dr. Nare):

The buyer/applicant has submitted a development application for a Planned Unit Development (PUD) for the property along Lotz Way (just outside of One Harbor Center). The application is being processed and the transaction to sell the property is moving forward. Documents are being executed to sell the property along Lotz Way outside of the One Harbor Center office building to Dr. Preeti Nare. Escrow is expected to close this month.

Marina Storage:

Staff is in receipt of the response to the CEQA solicitation for the proposed project. Staff is reviewing the proposal and will send to the applicant. An item will ultimately need to be scheduled for an upcoming City Council meeting to authorize the City Manager to execute a

professional services agreement.

Zip Thru Carwash

This project is now open! We wish Zip Thru Carwash great success!

Tractor Supply:

Staff continues to process the entitlement application for the proposed project.

Additionally, the environmental consultant is underway with their work and currently coordinating with the applicant on project details to make sure that the project is accurately represented. The hope is for the majority of the environmental work to be in draft form by the first of the year.

Blossom Avenue Apartments:

On October 5th, Suisun City elected officials and other VIPs welcomed another project with new groundbreaking ceremony for the Blossom Avenue Apartments, a new, marketrate, apartment community that will be developed by Red Tail Multifamily Land Development, LLC. The



project will be gated and fenced and will include 180 units ranging up to 3-bedroom units, as well as a clubhouse and a small park area for residents and their pets. Construction is anticipated to take approximately eighteen months to complete and is expected to open to new residents in mid-2024.

This is the third new residential development groundbreaking in Suisun City in the last thirteen months with several more expected soon. These projects, as well as the commercial projects under construction or planned, will be welcomed additions to our community.

Housing Element Update:

The draft Housing Element was sent to California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) on October 4th. The City's consultant, PlaceWorks, will be following up with HCD staff in the next week to attempt to schedule a preliminary meeting with them to discuss the document. The intent is to have this meeting toward the latter part of November.

PUBLIC WORKS ENGINEERING

McCoy Creek Trail Phase II Improvement Project:

To date, the bridge abutments and concrete walls have been completed. These improvements are on the critical path schedule and their completion is important to meeting California

Department of Fish & Wildlife permit deadline. The contractor's schedule includes completing the following improvements by the end of the week: Rip rap along channel embankment fronting the bridge abutments, backfilling against the bridge abutments, hauling additional soil at the north end of the bridge (the grade elevation in this area will be raised about 2.5 feet), and trenching around the bridge abutments for the preparation of block wall installation.



Asphalt Rubber Cape Seal & Traffic Calming Project:

The remaining work on this project was completed on October 3rd. The rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFBs) on Whispering Bay Lane fronting Crystal Middle School were installed on October 5th and are devices that complement the other improvements (concrete curb ramp, the high visibility crosswalk which replaced the pre-existing standard crosswalk, new roadway striping, and curb ramp upgrades) completed at this location. These improvements will be paid for by Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) grant funds.

Public Works Maintenance Division:

The Maintenance Division does a lot of work throughout the city. Here is a snapshot of work performed this month:

- Irrigation repairs at Heritage Park.
- Irrigation repairs at the Sports Complex.
- Cleaned up broken glass in the street at Civic and Almond.
- Responded to a broken water line at Driftwood (Vic A).
- Responded to a sewer complaint at Driftwood (no city side clean out).
- Cleaned up trash along the bike path from Village Dr. to Sunset Ave. (Heritage Park).
- Repainted the crosswalk on Lotz way.
- Repainted the crosswalk on Driftwood and Port.
- Removed and repainted the STOP sign on Brookside and Rodondo.
- Cut weeds and cleaned up Walters center median from Bella Vista to East Tabor.
- Irrigation repairs along Blossom Ave. (Blossom LLD).
- Irrigation repairs at Montebello Park.
- Repaired pothole by Chevron.
- Repaired sign on Sunset Ave.
- Weed, trim, and clean up entrances (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Installed new 4G Calsense irrigation controllers in the following locations: Waterfall Park, Lawler Ranch Park, and McCoy Creek Park (Lawler Ranch LLD).
- Completed installing security doors in both Heritage Park restrooms.
- Continuous irrigation repairs along Sunset Ave. (Heritage LLD).
- Trimmed and cleaned-up the Boat Ramp area.
- Trimmed and cleaned-up the North Basin Parking Lot.
- Set out No Parking signs for the Halloween Parade/event.
- Removed graffiti at the Geopp Park play structure.
- Completed multiple USA requests.
- Addressed two (2) illegal dumps on Petersen Road and Humphrey Drive.
- Repaired damaged GFI outlet in the Waterfront Plaza.
- Clean-up of the Pickering Lot (Sunset & Old Railroad).
- Weed, trim, and clean up along Blossom Avenue (Blossom LLD).
- Continuous irrigation repairs along Sunset Avenue (Heritage LLD).
- Completed the irrigation repairs and adjustments for the new Heritage Park soccer fields.
- Removed illegally dumped washer on Humphrey Drive.
- Removed illegally dumped tires from Old Railroad Avenue.
- Weeded, trimmed, and cleaned up Bella Vista from Blue Jay to Walters.
- Irrigation repairs at the Sports Complex and Montebello Park.
- Weed, trim and clean-up at Patriot Park and Independence Park (Petersen Ranch LLD).
- Continued installing security doors at the Heritage Park restrooms.
- Continuous irrigation repairs along Sunset Avenue (Heritage LLD).
- Completed the irrigation repairs and adjustments at the Heritage Park soccer fields.
- Trimmed and cleaned up in Hall Park.
- Removed illegally dumped mattress on the Pickering Lot.
- Started the trimming and clean up at Geopp Park.

Public Works Crew continues to work with three (3) people assigned to "Streets," six (6) assigned to "General Landscape," and four (4) assigned to "LLD Maintenance."

PUBLIC WORKS MOWING SCHEDULE:

 - Thursday Sports Complex
 - o Friday Montebello Park
