





Emergency Operations Plan



The proclamation of a Local Emergency provides legal authority to:

- if necessary, requests that the Governor procisin a State of Emergency.
- Put forth orders and regulations to protect life and property, including orders or regulations imposing a curfew within designated boundaries.
- 3. Provide mutual aid to any affected area in accordance with local ordinances, resolutions, emergency plans, or agreements.

4. Request that regional and state agencies provide mutual aid.

5. Require the emergency services of any local official or employee,

6. Obtain vital supplies and equipment and, if required immediately, to commandeer the same for public use.

7. Impose pensities for violation of lawful orders.

8. Conduct emergency operations without facing liabilities for performance, note: Article 17 of the California Emergency Services Act provides for certain privileges and immunities.





AGENDA ITEM: Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2015-__: Authorizing the City Manager to Recruit and Appoint Police Officers.

FISCAL IMPACT: An existing police officer would likely be replaced with an officer at entry level pay scale, which would result in a salary savings of approximately \$7,000 for the remainder of this fiscal year. However, until the new officer completes training, this savings would be offset by overtime costs to backfill the vacancy.

BACKGROUND: With the adoption of the FY 2011-12 Annual Budget, the City Council established a policy of having the Council review and approve any requests to fill vacant positions. The Department is seeking City Manager authority to fill vacancies in the Police Officer job class should they occur during the current fiscal year.

STAFF REPORT: The Department anticipates two vacancies occurring within the Police Officer job class within the next 30-60 days.

The Police Chief has established minimum staffing levels in the General Orders, which are one supervisor and two officers on every shift. With two police officer positions frozen during the recessionary budget periods, two officers in field training and the filling of the SRO position, failure to approve the filling of any authorized position would result in the need for significantly increased overtime. In addition to the anticipated vacancy, the Department has an officer who is deployed as a Reservist for the United States Army.

Most overtime needs are met on a voluntary basis; however, if vacant positions are not filled timely, officers would be assigned mandatory overtime to ensure minimum staffing levels. Additionally, the training process for a new officer takes approximately 18 weeks. During the training period, the officer is not counted towards minimum staffing. Forced overtime would have a negative impact on officer fatigue and morale.

There is currently an eligibility list for the Police Officer job class. In order to streamline the filling of potential vacancies, staff is requesting the authority to fill police officer positions, with City Manager's approval, when vacancies occur during the fiscal year. As an alternative, it is requested that at a minimum staff be allowed to recruit for and fill the two anticipated vacancies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to recruit for and fill vacancies in the police officer job class, when one occurs, up to the level of staffing approved by the City Council in the currently adopted Annual Budget, for the remainder of the current fiscal year.

AGENDA ITEM: Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2015- __: Authorizing the City Manager to Recruit and Appoint Communications & Records Technicians, and Approve Provisional Hires When Warranted.

FISCAL IMPACT: Existing vacancies would be replaced with Communications & Records Technicians (CRT) at an entry pay scale, which would result in a salary savings. The estimated salary savings is \$12,000 during the fiscal year. However, this savings is expected to be partially offset by overtime to provide backfill coverage. The provisional CRT positions would be full-time, non-benefitted at an entry level pay scale.

Given past experience, it is anticipated the provisional CRT positions would be filled for 30-45 days prior to an actual vacancy. The cost for this amount of time is approximately \$5,096. Due to the uncertainty in candidates passing training, it may be necessary to increase the amount of funds for overtime in Support Services within the Police Department. This would be handled during the mid-year budget review, if necessary, and would likewise be a consideration in City Manager approval of provisional positions.

BACKGROUND: With the adoption of the FY 2011-12 Annual Budget, the City Council established a policy of having the Council review and approve any requests to fill vacant positions. The Department is seeking authority to fill vacancies that occur in the Communications & Records Technician job class, with City Manager approval.

STAFF REPORT: The Department anticipates two vacancies occurring within the Communications & Records Technician I/II-I (CRT) job class within the next 30 days. The vacancies are expected to occur in early August and early September.

The Communications Center of the Police Department is responsible for providing 24-hour dispatching services for the Police and Fire Departments, answering emergency and non-emergency phone calls, interacting with persons in the lobby and managing all records. In order to meet minimum staffing requirements and provide 24-hour coverage, without incurring overtime, the Center must be staffed by 6 CRTs. However, a staffing of 6 CRTs does not provide adequate coverage for on-going service demands, hence the authorized staffing of 7 CRTs, including 1 Senior CRT.

The training for a new CRT requires approximately 16-18 weeks. There is currently 1 CRT in training who is expected to complete training by the end of August. The failure to approve the filling of an authorized CRT position would result in an unreasonable and unsustainable level of overtime.

With the anticipated vacancies and the time required for training, the current CRTs will be forced to select new work schedules and be scheduled for weekly overtime. During this time, there will be minimal and in most cases, no overlap coverage, despite the increased service demands placed on dispatchers during busy times of the day. This will result in increased time to answer calls and perform basic job functions.

Recognizing these constraints, staff is requesting:

- a. Authorization to fill the vacant CRT positions, with City Manager's approval, when the vacancies occur.
- b. Authorization, with City Manager approval, to provisionally hire a CRT (i.e., hourly unbenefited) when certain conditions are met.

This secondary request will enable the training process to begin ahead of the actual vacancy and minimize the amount of time it takes for a new CRT to become fully functional. This provision would not be invoked if the Communications Center is fully staffed with no CRTs on training.

As an alternative, it is requested that at a minimum, staff be allowed to recruit and fill the <u>two</u> anticipated vacancies in the CRT class.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2015- __: Authorizing the City Manager to Recruit and Appoint Communications & Records Technicians, and Approve Provisional Hires When Warranted.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUISUN CITY AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO RECRUIT AND APPOINT COMMUNICATIONS & RECORDS TECHNICIANS, AND APPROVE PROVISIONAL HIRES WHEN WARRANTED

WHEREAS, the Police Department anticipates two vacancies in the Communications & Records Technician I/II-I job class; and

WHEREAS, the Police Department Communications Center is responsible for providing 24-hour dispatching services for the Police and Fire Departments, including answering emergency 9-1-1 and non-emergency phone calls; and

WHEREAS, the training for a new Communications & Records Technician requires approximately 16-18 weeks; and

WHEREAS, the Department will not be able to sustain 24-hour dispatching operations with 5 Communications & Records Technicians; and

WHEREAS, filling the vacancies will enable the Communications Center to provide the current level of service to the community, once the new Communications & Records Technicians have completed training; and

WHEREAS, authorizing the provisional hiring of Communications & Records Technicians ahead of expected vacancies will reduce the amount of overtime and fatigue of existing employees within the Center.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to recruit for and fill vacancies within the Communications & Records Technician job class, when they occur, up to the level of staffing approved by the City Council in the currently adopted Annual Budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to provisionally hire a Communications & Records Technician I/II-I whenever an expected vacancy date in the job class is known. The provisional hiring would only occur if the Communications Center was not at full staffing or was at full staffing but had one or more positions in training. City Manager will likewise consider budgetary impacts as part of the authorization process.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no negative fiscal impact on the General Fund. The developer, Seecon Homes, Inc., has currently paid the City a total of \$128,842.23 in plan check fees, map check fees, inspection fees and other fees for Zephyr Estates.

STAFF REPORT:

On September 16, 2014 the City Council approved the Tentative Map for Zephyr Estates. The City Subdivision Ordinance and the conditions of approval of the Tentative Map require that prior to the approval of the Final Map, that the following be done and/or submitted to the City:

- completed and approved Improvement Plans,
- signed Subdivision Improvement Agreements,
- post bonds and insurance, and
- pay appropriate fees.

To date, the appropriate fees have been paid, and the bonds and insurance have been posted by the developer. The Improvement Plans, Subdivision Improvement Agreement, and the Final Map have been completed/approved, but have not yet been signed pending council action. Staff recommends approval of the Final Map subject to conditions in the resolution, including but not limit to, that the Final Map and Improvement Plans be approved and signed by the City Engineer; and that the Subdivision Improvement Agreement be signed by the developer and the City prior to the recordation of the map.

The Solano Irrigation District has also reviewed the Final Map and Improvement Plans, and now considers these documents complete. Moreover, on Tuesday, July 21, 2015, the Solano Irrigation District will be submitting to its Board a recommendation to include Zephyr Estates in the Suisun-Solano Water Authority (SSWA) Joint Service Agreement. It is likewise being recommended to council, at this time, to include Zephyr Estates in the SSWA Joint Service Agreement.

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2014 the City Council of the City of Suisun City adopted the Tentative Map for Zephyr Estates; and

WHEREAS, the City Engineer has found the proposed Final Map to be in substantial conformance to the requirements of the City and the City's General Plan; and

WHEREAS, the design of the improvements for the proposed subdivision units is consistent with the Tentative Map, General Plan, and the Design Standards of the City of Suisun City; and

WHEREAS, on Tuesday, July 21, 2015, the Solano Irrigation District will be submitting to its Board a recommendation to include Zephyr Estates in the Suisun-Solano Water Authority (SSWA) Joint Service Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Suisun City does hereby resolve as follows:

- (1) The City Council does hereby approve the Final Map entitled "Zephyr Estates" for filing with the Recorder of Solano County, California.
- (2) The City Council does hereby accept all offers of dedication as shown on the Final Map entitled "Zephyr Estates"
- (3) The City Council does hereby approve the inclusion of Zephyr Estates in the Suisun-Solano Water Authority Joint Service Agreement.
- (4) The City Manager is authorized to execute the Subdivision Improvement Agreement on behalf of the City and to take other actions as necessary and appropriate to implement this resolution.

SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS, and all other Suisun City Codes and Ordinances:

- (1) Prior to the recordation of the Final Map, the Developer shall sign a Subdivision Agreement acceptable to the City.
- (2) Prior to the recordation of the Final Map, the Developer shall provide Performance and Labor & Materials bonds as well as Insurance as required by City Ordinance.
- (3) Prior to the recordation of the Final Map, the Developer shall pay all applicable fees and costs related to the Final Map, plan and map review, and inspections of the required improvements.

- (4) Prior to recordation of the Final Map, all Improvement Plans for the project shall be approved by the City and appropriate agencies, and be consistent with any existing Master Plans, the Suisun City Subdivision Ordinance, and the Conditions of Approval for Zephyr Estates.
- (5) Prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, the Developer shall annex Zephyr Estates into Community Facilities District No. 2 and establish required maintenance assessment district(s) for this subdivision in accordance with the Conditions of Approval for Zephyr Estates.
- (6) Prior to the issuance of Building Permits, the landscaping and irrigation plans for Zephyr Estates shall be approved by the City.
- (7) Pursuant to Condition of Approval RBLU-2 for Zephyr Estates, the Developer shall sign and record the required transfer document for the Commercial Parcel in a form reasonably acceptable to the City, concurrently with the recordation of the Final Map for Zephyr Estates.
- (8) In order to eliminate potential blight on the vacant Commercial Parcel and to create an aesthetically pleasing entryway to Suisun City until a commercial project is commenced, Developer agrees to commence with the improvements, as detailed in Condition of Approval RBLU-4 for Zephyr Estates, upon issuance of the first grading permit.
- (9) All conditions of the Resolutions, Planning Commission actions, Subdivision Improvement Development Agreement, etc., also apply unless explicitly changed by these conditions.



FISCAL IMPACT: There would be no fiscal impact. Funds to cover the program activities implemented by the City of Suisun City are payable through Solano County, which is the administrator of the PICH grant.

BACKGROUND: In April of 2015, the City Council authorized the City Manager to execute necessary documents related to Suisun City's participation in the Partnerships to Improve Community Health (PICH) grant.

The PICH grants provides a significant opportunity to engage residents and stakeholders in developing local policies and programs that can educate, heighten awareness, and increase the choices that individuals and businesses have to reduce chronic disease and elevate the quality of life for our residents.

STAFF REPORT: The total budget approved in April for the first six-month work effort was \$48,721, of which \$38,121 is estimated for personnel. Approximately \$7,800 was spent during FY 2014-15, leaving approximately \$40,900 in funding for FY 2015-16 to complete the requirements and objectives of the grant. It is necessary to appropriate funds for FY 2015-16 that were not expended in FY 2014-15 in order to carry out the objectives and requirements of the grant. Adopting the attached resolution amending the Annual Appropriation Resolution appropriates the remaining grant funds available pursuant to the approval granted last April.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council Adopt Resolution No. 2015-___: Adopting the First Amendment to the Annual Appropriation Resolution No. 2015-79 to Appropriate Funds for the Partnerships to Improve Community Health (PICH) Grant.

FISCAL IMPACT: None as this item is for information only.

BACKGROUND: Each quarter it is necessary to produce an Investment Report, showing how all City, Housing Authority, and Suisun-Solano Water Authority's available cash is invested, in terms of the type of investment, what institution it is invested in, and current value and interest earnings.

STAFF REPORT: The total cash and investments (par amount) equaled \$35,466,529 for the period ending June 30, 2015.

In terms of return on our investment, managed by PFM Asset Management LLC, the current yield to maturity at market is 0.80%. This compares very favorably with the LAIF return of only 0.299% for the quarter. As can be seen in the Pie Chart (Attachment 1), most of the cash is invested in federally insured CD's, US Treasuries or Agency Notes, all of which generate higher yields.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Council/Authority accept the Fourth Quarter Financial Officer's Investment Report.



CITY AGENDA ITEM: Award of the Construction Contract for the Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project and Approval of the Second Amendment to the Annual Appropriation Resolution to the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Budget:

- a. Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2015-____: Authorizing the City Manager to Enter into a Construction Contract on the City's Behalf with Sansei Gardens, Inc. for the Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project.
- b. Council Adoption of Resolution No. 2015-___: Adopting the Second Amendment to the Annual Appropriation Resolution No. 2015-79 to Appropriate Funds for the Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project.

FISCAL IMPACT: There would be no impact to the General Fund for this award. A total of \$974,000 in Park Development funds have been set aside for the development of Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project (Project). A total of \$792,400 has been appropriated and is available in FY2015-16's budget. In order to complete the base bid plus Additive Bid Alternates (Alternates) A through D, as recommended by the Parks and Recreation Commission, an AAR needs to be generated to appropriate an additional \$146,475 in Park Development Funds to the Project. This will cover the construction contract and staff time. Ongoing Maintenance of the additional park area would be paid for by the existing Lawler Ranch Maintenance Assessment District.

BACKGROUND: Development of the Lawler Ranch Park has occurred in phases. Phase I of the park was completed in early 2007. Phase II of the park began in late 2013 once it was determined that there were adequate funds available for maintenance of the additional developed park area. The first step of Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project (Project) was to hire a landscape architect to assist with the conceptual design phase for the Project. A contract was awarded on February 4, 2014, to Gates & Associates. The design contract included conducting several public outreach workshops and the preparation of the construction documents.

STAFF REPORT: When Gates & Associates completed the construction documents, the documents were advertised to the public for bidding on May 8, 2015. Bids for the Project were opened on June 3, 2015, at 2:00 PM, at which time three bids were received and read aloud. Staff has reviewed the three proposals and bid documents. Staff has determined that the bid submitted by Sansei Gardens, Inc. is a responsive and responsible bid and represents the lowest bid received. Sansei Gardens, Inc. submitted a base construction bid of \$695,627 for the Project. After adding a 10% contingency, the total award amount for the base construction contract is \$765,200. All bidders also submitted Additive Bid Alternates and Sansei Garden's bid remains the lowest overall bid regardless of the combinations of Additive Bid Alternates (Alternates) that could

be added to the base bid. Staff recommends that the base contract plus Alternates A through D are awarded for a total contract award of \$900,864. Inclusion of Alternate E, which is the screening of portable restrooms, was not recommended by the Parks and Recreation Commission. However, if included in the award, would increase the overall contract cost by \$9,460.

In general, the base Project will provide upgrades to the existing amenities in the Lawler Ranch Park, as well as provide additional improvements to the area of the park that is currently "native grasses" and/or undeveloped. The Project will include: patching of the existing rubberized playground surfacing, replacement of play equipment within the existing play area for the older children; constructing a basketball court (half court); creating an area for dogs including doggy bag stations; creating concrete paths, concrete mow bands, and decomposed granite paving; installation of streetlights, chain link fencing, drinking fountains, trash receptacles, benches, tables, and shade structures; and installation of irrigation and landscaping, including trees, shrubs, and turf (Attachment 3).

- Additive Bid Alternate B Expanded turf area "B" (contiguous with area "A").
- Additive Bid Alternate C Expand turf area "C" (contiguous with area "A+B").
- Additive Bid Alternate D In-ground solar LED lights within the existing perimeter concrete path.
- Additive Alternate E Construct screen and concrete pad for portable restrooms.

As stated above, Sansei Gardens remains the lowest bidder, even with the inclusion of all Alternates. Public Works Maintenance staff coordinated with the City's existing landscape contractor, New Image, to obtain realistic maintenance costs that will result from the additional build out of the park. New Image was provided with finalized park design plans including the Alternates. From those plans, New Image has stated that additional maintenance costs are as follows:

Maintenance costs for any combination of the base bid plus Alternates remains within Lawler Ranch's available budget. Yearly costs for the additional water, field supplies and major facility repairs are estimated to be \$25,000. These costs plus the annual maintenance contract cost (\$40,300) are within the available Lawler Ranch Maintenance Assessment District budget.

At the June 17, 2015 meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission, the Commission voted unanimously in favor of including Additive Alternates A, B, C, and D into the construction contract to expand the turf and dog areas and to add in-ground LED path lights. The cost for these four Alternates is shown below:

The staff recommendation is for the Council to approve the award of the construction contract to Sansei Gardens, Inc. for the base bid contract plus Additive Bid Alternates A through D along with an overall 10% construction contingency on all costs for a total contract award of \$900,864. Staff also recommends that Council approve the attached AAR appropriating Park Development Funds in the amount of \$146,500 for completion of construction, staff time and Additive Bid Alternates A through D.

WHEREAS, staff has prepared plans, specifications, and an Engineer's Estimate for construction portion of the Project; and

WHEREAS, three bid proposals were received by the City on June 3, 2014, by 2:00 pm, and bids were opened and read aloud; and

WHEREAS, Sansei Gardens, Inc. provided the lowest responsible and responsive bid of \$695,627 for the base Project; and

WHEREAS, Sansei Gardens, Inc. also provided the lowest responsible and responsive bids for the five Additive Bid Alternates included in the bid documents; and

WHEREAS, the Parks and Recreation Commission is recommending the inclusion of Additive Bid Alternates A through D as well as the transfer of additional Park Development Funds to cover the difference between the available funds and the amount needed to complete the base bid plus Additive Bid Alternates A through D.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Suisun City authorizes the City Manager to enter into a construction contract on behalf of the City with Sansei Gardens, Inc. for the Lawler Ranch Park Phase II Project in the amount of \$818,968 and to take any and all necessary and appropriate actions to implement this contract. The City Council further authorizes the City Manager to approve changes for contingencies not to exceed 10% (\$81,896) of the bid amount for a total contract award of up to \$900,864.


