1. Suisun City's new City Manager, Greg Folsom, introduced himself to the RPMA Commission and gave a brief description about his background.

Approval of Minutes:

COMMISSION AGENDA ITEM: Selecting the Chair and the 15th member of the Lighting & Landscaping Districts Committee

FISCAL IMPACT: None

BACKGROUND: The City was established in the 1850s. The City has become a prosperous waterfront community and increasingly vibrant with one-of-a-kind shops and restaurants in historically authentic buildings. The City and property owners have formed several assessment districts within the community to provide for the continued maintenance and servicing of various improvements located within public right-of-way and dedicated easements.

Pursuant to the Act and Proposition 218, all parcels that receive a special benefit conferred upon them as a result of the maintenance and operation of improvements and services shall be identified, and the proportionate special benefit derived by each identified parcel shall be determined in relationship to the entire costs of the maintenance and operation of improvements. The Act permits the establishment of assessment districts by agencies for the purpose of providing certain public improvements which include the operation, maintenance, and servicing of landscaping improvements. Section 22573 of the Act requires that maintenance assessments must be levied according to benefit rather than according to assessed value. This Section states: "The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefit to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements." "The determination of whether or not a lot or parcel will benefit from the improvements shall be made pursuant to the Improvement Act of 1911 (Division 7 (commencing with Section 5000))." Section 22547 of the Act also permits the designation of zones of benefit within any individual assessment district if "by reasons or variations in the nature, location, and extent of the improvements, the various areas will receive different degrees of benefit from the improvement". Article XIII D, Section 4(a) of the California Constitution limits the amount of any assessment to the proportional special benefit conferred on the property. Article XIII D also provides that publicly owned properties must be assessed unless there is clear and convincing evidence that those properties receive no special benefit from the assessment. Exempted from the assessment would be the areas of public streets, public avenues, public lanes, public roads, public drives, public courts, public alleys, public easements and rights-of-ways, public greenbelts, and public parkways. The net amount to be assessed may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels. Proposition 218, approved by the voters in November 1996, requires the District to separate general benefit from special benefit, where-as only special benefit is assessed.

The method for apportioning the assessment is based upon the relative special benefit derived by the properties in each Maintenance District over and above the general benefit conferred on real property located in each Maintenance District or to the public at large. Assessed parcels within each Maintenance District receive special benefit from the maintenance and operation of the improvements. Particular and distinct benefit provided to parcels within each Maintenance District includes:

- Improving the livability, appearance, and desirability for properties within the boundaries of each Maintenance District.
- Ensuring that improvements do not reach a state of deterioration or disrepair so as to be materially detrimental to properties within each Maintenance District.
- The proper maintenance of the landscaping, ornamental structures, and appurtenant facilities also reduces property related crimes (especially vandalism) against properties within each Maintenance District.
- Providing beautification, shade, and overall enhancement to properties within each Maintenance District.

The above mentioned items contribute to a specific enhancement of the properties within each Maintenance District. Since these improvements, including parks, were installed and are maintained specifically for the properties within each Maintenance District; only properties within each Maintenance District receive a special benefit and are assessed for said maintenance. In addition to the special benefits received by the parcels within the Maintenance Districts, there are incidental general benefits conferred by the improvements. The proper maintenance of landscaping and appurtenant facilities within the Maintenance Districts, which includes the spraying and treating of landscaping, reduces the likelihood of insect infestation and other diseases spreading to landscaping located in other areas of the City. Additionally, the proper maintenance of landscaping and other ornamental structures provides a positive visual experience to persons passing by the Maintenance Districts, whether driving or walking. Each of the aforementioned constitutes incidental general benefits conferred by the improvements. The total benefits thus are a combination of the special benefits to the parcels within each Maintenance District and the general benefits to the public at large and to the adjacent properties. The portion of the total maintenance costs which are associated with general benefits will not be assessed to parcels within the Maintenance Districts but will be paid from other City funds.

STAFF REPORT: The Lighting and Landscaping Districts Committee will review the annual engineer's report for the Districts and to be a sounding board for issues such as levels of service and cost recovery for the Districts. A 15-member committee comprised of one member from each of the 11 Lighting and Landscaping Districts, the two Dredging Districts formed under the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913, and one appointed from an area of the City without a Landscaping District by the Mayor.

The Chair and 15th member will be a current Parks and Recreation Commissioner to be selected by members of the Commission. The Vice chair will be selected by the members annually.

STAFF RECCOMENDATION: Open nominations and immediately hold a vote, selecting the Chair and 15th member of the Lighting and Landscaping Districts Committee.

MONTH IN REVIEW

The Suisun Marina kicked off the boating season with the Solano Yacht Club's opening day and Blessing of the Fleet event. The event was for all boaters of Suisun City to come together to celebrate a safe boating season. A preacher went from one boat to a prayer and bless the boats individually. The Solano Yacht Club also invited all guest to the club for a BBQ.

Triton Construction began the Fuel System Replacement Project on May 13, 2019. They started by tearing out the old fuel dispenser and pay station, removing the old fuel lines and disconnecting the electrical from the old fuel trailer. They removed the old sump and are working to get the new sump in. In connection with the project, marina staff emptied and cleared out the old fuel trailer to prepare it for removal from the marina.

Two boat was surrendered into our Vessel Turn-In Program (VTIP). The marina has VTIP grant which allows boat owners to surrender their unwanted recreational boats to be properly disposed of. This in turn reduces the number of aging and abandoned boats in California.

Janet Hull, the marina manager attended two educational trainings. A Dockwalker training where she was trained to educate members of the public on clean boating practices. This training provided free safe boater kits to be distributed to the boaters at the marina. These kits include safe boating educational material, maps, tide book, bilge pillow, oil absorbent pad, and fuel bib. She also attended a Shock Hazards, Code Compliance and Corrosion in the Marina training seminar where she learned about electrical hazards, electrolysis, corrosion, and potential liability for Marina owners.

Marina staff installed three new regulation buoys at the marina to replace the old falling apart buoys.




